16 inches tall standing

MATERIALS

- Lion Brand Homespun bulky (chunky) weight acrylic/ polyester yarn (6 oz/185 yds/ 170g per skein):
2 skeins #311 rococo
- Black embroidery thread
- Size H/8/5mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle
- Sewing needle
- Matching sewing thread
- 8 x 10-inch sheet 7-mesh plastic canvas
- Matching 8 x 10-inch sheet felt
- 20mm black animal safety nose (see Pattern Notes)
- 15mm brown animal safety eyes: 2 (see Pattern Notes)
- Fiberfill
- Straight pins
- Stitch markers



GAUGE

20 sc = 6 inches; 23 rows = 6 inches

PATTERN NOTES

If making Bear for child 3 or under, embroider nose and eyes on Bear.

Work in continuous rounds, do not turn or join unless otherwise stated.

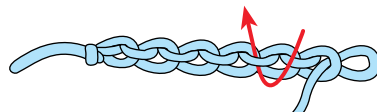
Mark first stitch of round.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

BEAR

Body

Rnd 1 (WS): Ch 1, 6 sc in **back bar of ch** (see illustration), **do not join** (see Pattern Notes). (6 sc)



Back Bar of Chain

Rnd 2: 2 sc in each st around. (12 sc)

Rnd 3: [2 sc in next st, sc in next st] around. (18 sc)

Rnd 4: [2 sc in next st, sc in each of next 2 sts] around. (24 sc)

Rnd 5: [2 sc in next st, sc in each of next 3 sts] around. (30 sc)

Rnd 6: Sc in each of first 14 sts, 2 sc in each of next 2 sts, sc in each of last 14 sts. (32 sc)

Rnd 7: Sc in each st around.

Rnd 8: Sc in each of first 15 sts, 2 sc in each of next 2 sts, sc in each of last 15 sts. (34 sc)

Rnd 9: Sc, mark last st for top of tail placement, sc in each st around.

Rnd 10: Sc in each of first 16 sts, 2 sc in each of next 2 sts, sc in each of last 16 sts. (36 sc)

Rnd 11: Sc in each of first 10 sts, mark last st for top of right leg placement, sc in each of next 19 sts, mark last st for top of left leg placement, sc in each of last 7 sts.

Rnd 12: Sc in each of first 17 sts, 2 sc in each of next 2 sts, sc in each of last 17 sts. (38 sc)

Rnd 13: Rep rnd 7.

Rnd 14: Sc in each of first 18 sts, 2 sc in each of next 2 sts, sc in each of last 18 sts. (40 sc)

Rnd 15: Rep rnd 7.

Rnd 16: Sc in each of first 20 sts, **sc dec** (see *Stitch Guide*) in next 2 sts, sc in next st, sc

dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of last 15 sts. (38 sc)

Rnd 17: Rep rnd 7.

Rnd 18: Sc in each of first 19 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of last 14 sts. (36 sc)

Rnd 19: Rep rnd 7.

Rnd 20: Sc in each of first 18 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of last 13 sts. (34 sc)

Rnd 21: Rep rnd 7.

Rnd 22: Sc in each of first 17 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of last 12 sts. (32 sc)

Rnd 23: Rep rnd 7.

Rnd 24: Sc in each of first 16 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of last 11 sts. (30 sc)

Rnd 25: Rep rnd 7.

Rnd 26: Sc in each of first 15 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of last 10 sts. (28 sc)

Rnd 27: Rep rnd 7.

Rnd 28: Sc in each of first 14 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of last 9 sts. (26 sc)

Rnd 29: Rep rnd 7.

Rnd 30: Sc in each of first 12 sts, mark last st for top of right arm placement,

[sc in next st, sc dec in next 2 sts] twice, sc in each of next 7 sts, mark last st for top of left arm placement, sc in last st. (24 sc)

Rnd 31: Rep rnd 7.

Rnd 32: Rep rnd 5. (30 sc)

Head

Rnd 1 (WS): *2 sc in next st, sc in each of next 10 sts, [2 sc in next st, sc in next st] twice, rep from * around. (36 sc)

Rnd 2: Sc in each of first 14 sts, [2 sc in next st, sc in next st] 3 times, sc in each of next 11 sts, [2 sc in next st, sc in next st] twice, 2 sc in last st. (42 sc)

Rnd 3: Sc in each st around.

Rnds 4–12: [Rep rnd 3] 9 times.

Rnd 13: [Sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of next 16 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in next st] around. (38 sc)

Rnd 14: [Sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of next 14 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in next st] around. (34 sc)

Rnd 15: [Sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of next 12 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in next st] around. (30 sc)

Rnd 16: [Sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of next 10 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in next st] around. (26 sc)

Rnd 17: [Sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of next 8 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in next st] around, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) in beg sc. Leaving long end for sewing, fasten off. (22 sc)

Ear

Make 2.

Row 1 (RS): Leaving long end at beg for sewing, ch 10, sc in 2nd ch from hook and in each ch across, turn. (9 sc)

Row 2: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.

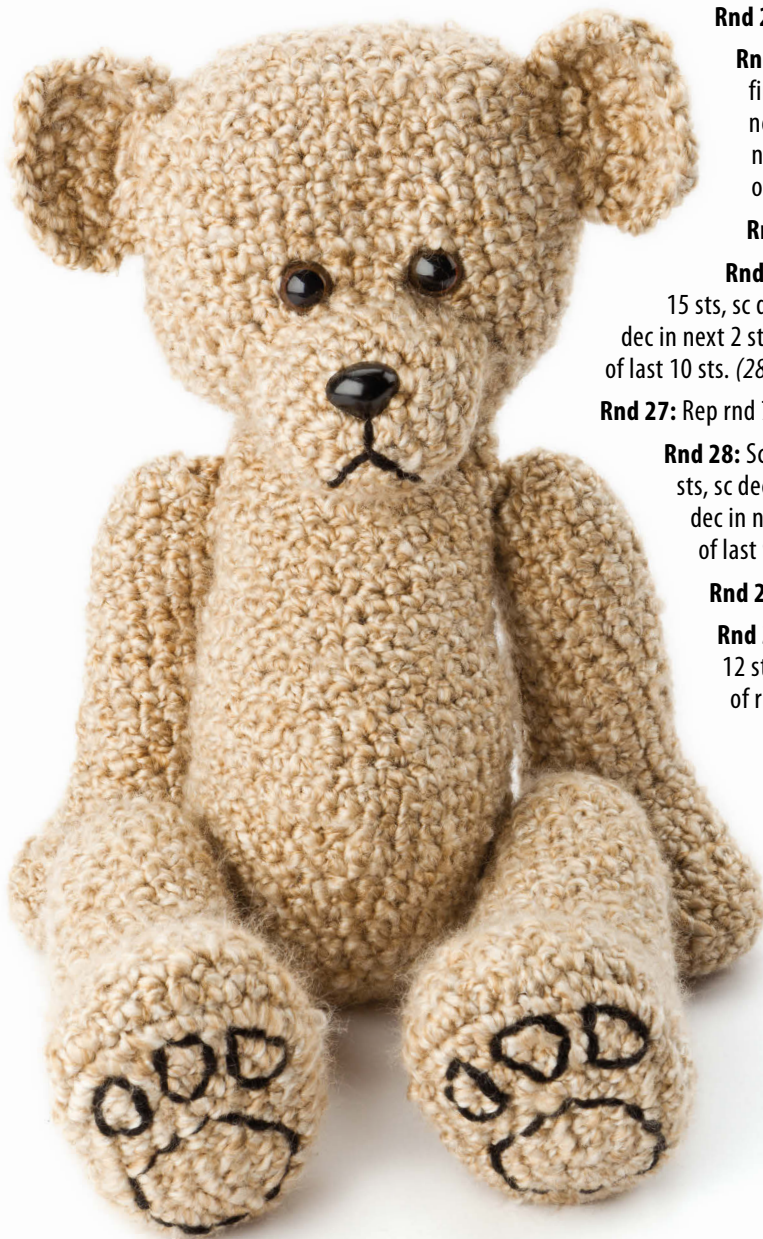
Row 3: Rep row 2.

Row 4: Ch 1, sc dec in first 2 sts, sc in each of next 5 sts, sc dec in last 2 sts, turn. (7 sc)

Row 5: Ch 1, sc dec in first 2 sts, sc in each of next 3 sts, sc dec in last 2 sts. Fasten off. (5 sc)

Muzzle

Rnd 1 (RS): Ch 1, 6 sc in back bar of ch, **do not join**. (6 sc)



Rnd 2: 2 sc in each st around. (12 sc)

Rnd 3: [2 sc in next st, sc in next st] around. (18 sc)

Rnd 4: [2 sc in each of next 3 sts (*increases form side of Muzzle*), sc in each of next 6 sts] around. (24 sc)

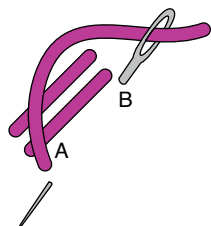
Rnd 5: Sc in each st around.

Rnds 6 & 7: [Rep rnd 5] twice, at end of last rnd, join in beg sc. Leaving long end for sewing, fasten off.

Facial Features

Attach nose to rnd 2 of Muzzle as shown in photo.

With black, using **straight stitch** (see illustration) embroider mouth on Muzzle as shown in photo.



Straight Stitch

Stuff Body up to neckline with fiberfill to desired softness.

Muzzle Placement: Flatten Head with face side up. Center a straight pin on rnd 1 of Head to mark bottom of Muzzle and another on rnd 7 of Head to mark top of Muzzle. For sides of muzzle placement, measure center 2½ inches on front of face between straight pins, then place a straight pin at each end. Stuff Muzzle with fiberfill, then sew Muzzle to face.

Attach eyes to rnd 8 just above Muzzle so that edges of eyes are 1 inch apart.

Stuff Head with fiberfill to desired softness then, using long end, sew top of head seam.

Sew 1 Ear on each side of Head between top of head seam and rnd 9 of Head curling top of Ear slightly.

Large Paw Pad, Paw & Leg

Make 2.

Paw Pad

Rnd 1 (RS): Ch 6, 3 sc in 2nd ch from hook, sc in each of next 3 chs, 3 sc in last ch, working



on opposite side of ch, sc in each of next 3 chs, **do not join**. (12 sc)

Rnd 2: [2 sc in each of next 3 sts, sc in each of next 3 sts] around. (18 sc)

Rnd 3: [Sc in next st, 2 sc in next st, sc in each of next 2 sts, 2 sc in next st, sc in each of next 4 sts] around. (22 sc)

Rnd 4: [Sc in next st, 2 sc in each of next 2 sts, sc in each of next 2 sts, 2 sc in each of next 2 sts, sc in each of next 4 sts] around. (30 sc)

Rnd 5: [Sc in each of next 2 sts, 2 sc in next st, sc in next st, 2 sc in next st] twice, sc in each of next 2 sts, sl st in next st, leaving rem sts unworked, drop lp from hook. (16 sc)

Paw Pad Insert

Cut 2 pieces of felt the same size as Paw Pad, then cut 1 piece of 7-mesh canvas slightly smaller than Paw Pad.

Place felt on top and bottom of canvas, then sew around felt, encasing canvas inside.

Paw

Rnd 1 (WS): Pick up dropped lp on Paw Pad, turn so WS is facing, ch 1, sc in each st around rnd 5 and unworked sts on rnd 4, **do not join**. (34 sc)

Rnd 2: Sc in each st around.

Rnd 3: Sc in each of first 5 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of next 2 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of last 23 sts. (32 sc)

Rnd 4: Sc in each of first 4 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of next 2 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of next 14 sts, place marker in

last st for beg of leg, sc in each of last 8 sts. (30 sc)

Rnd 5: Sc in each of first 3 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of next 2 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of next 3 sts, leaving rem sts unworked, turn. (10 sc)

Rnd 6 (RS): Ch 1, sc in each of first 3 sts, sc dec in next 4 sts, sc in each of last 3 sts. Leaving long end for sewing, fasten off. (7 sc)

Fold rnd 6 in half so that first and last sts are touching, then sew Top of Paw closed.

With black, using straight stitch, embroider paw print on bottom of Paw Pad as shown in photo.

Place Paw Pad Insert inside Paw.

Leg

Rnd 1 (WS): With inside of Paw facing, insert hook in marked st on rnd 4 of Paw, ch 1, sc in each of the 9 sts before Top of Paw, evenly sp 5 sc across Top of Paw, sc in each of last 9 sts, **do not join**. (23 sc)

Rnd 2: Sc in each of first 10 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of last 11 sts. (22 sc)

Rnd 3: Sc in each of first 10 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc each of last 10 sts. (21 sc)

Rnd 4: Sc in each of first 9 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of last 10 sts. (20 sc)

Rnd 5: Sc in each st around.

Rnds 6–15: [Rep rnd 5] 10 times.

After last rnd, drop lp from hook, stuff Leg with fiberfill to desired softness.

Rnd 16: Pick up dropped lp, sc in each of first 9 sts, [sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in next st] 3 times, sc in each of last 2 sts. (17 sc)

Rnd 17: Sc in each of first 7 sts, [sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in next st] 3 times, sc in last st. (14 sc)

Rnd 18: Sc in each of first 7 sts, [sc dec in next 2 sts] 3 times, sc in last st. (11 sc)

Rnd 19: [Sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in next st] 3 times, sc dec in last 2 sts. Leaving long end for sewing, fasten off. (7 sc)

Weave end through each st on last rnd, pull tight to close. Place Leg on Body so that top of Leg is at marked st on rnd 11 of Body or place in desired location. Sew inner side of Leg rnds 16–19 to side of Body.

FLEECE MATERIALS

- Premier Yarns Deborah Norville Cuddle Fleece super bulky (super chunky) weight polyester yarn (3½ oz/110 yds/100g per skein):
2 skeins #0006 earthen 
- Premier Yarns Wool Worsted medium (worsted) weight wool yarn (3½ oz/186 yds/100g per skein):
1 skein #0123 milk chocolate 
- Sizes I/9/5.5mm and J/10/6mm crochet hooks or sizes needed to obtain gauge

FAUX FUR MATERIALS

- Premier Yarns Lash Lux super bulky (super chunky) weight polyester yarn (1¼ oz/36 yds/50g per skein):
3 skeins #0003 coyote 
- Premier Yarns Wool Worsted medium (worsted) weight wool yarn (3½ oz/186 yds/100g per skein):
1 skein #0123 milk chocolate 
- Sizes I/9/5.5mm and N/13/9mm crochet hooks or sizes needed to obtain gauge

GAUGE

Size I hook: 7 dc = 2 inches; 2 dc rnds = 2 inches





Size J hook: 3 dc = 1 inch; 2 dc rows = 1 inch

Size N hook: 5 dc = 3 inches; 2 dc rows = 1 inch

PATTERN NOTES

Chain-3 at beginning of round counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

FLEECE TOPPER

Make 2.

Rnd 1: With size I hook and milk chocolate, ch 50, sl st in first ch to form ring, **ch 3** (see *Pattern Notes*), dc in each ch around, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (50 dc)

Rnds 2–12: Ch 3, dc in each st around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. At end of last rnd, fasten off.

Cuff

Rnd 1: With size J hook, working in sp between sts, join earthen in sp between any sts, ch 3, [sk next st, dc in next sp between sts] 7 times, **dc dec** (see *Stitch Guide*) in next 2 sts, *[sk next st, dc in next sp between sts] 8 times, dc dec in next 2 sts, rep from * around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3, **turn**. (45 dc)

Rnds 2–8: Ch 3, dc in each st around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. At end of last rnd, fasten off.

FAUX FUR TOPPER

Make 2.

Rnd 1: With I hook and milk chocolate, ch 50, sl st in first ch to form ring, **ch 3** (see *Pattern Notes*), dc in each ch around, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (50 dc)



Rnds 2–12: Ch 3, dc in each st around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. At end of last rnd, fasten off.

Cuff

Getting started: If you have difficulty seeing where to work sts, use your other hand to “feel” sp between sts. Hold work in front of window or lamp to allow light to shine through piece to see where sts are.

Rnd 1: With size N hook, working in sp between sts, join coyote in sp between any sts, ch 3, [sk next st, dc in next sp between sts] 7 times, **dc dec** (see *Stitch Guide*) in next 2 sts, *[sk next st, dc in next sp between sts] 8 times, dc dec in next 2 sts, rep from * around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3, **turn**. (45 dc)

Rnds 2–8: Ch 3, dc in each st around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. At end of last rnd, fasten off. **C**

22 x 74 inches, including Fringe

MATERIALS

- Premier Yarns Deborah Norville Fashion Jeweltone fine (sport) weight acrylic/wool/payette yarn (1¾ oz/99 yds/50g per skein):
8 skeins #2201 moonstone
- Size I/9/5.5mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Straight pins



GAUGE

6 pattern reps = 4 inches; 2 dc rows = 1 inch

PATTERN NOTE

Chain-5 at beginning of round counts as first double crochet and ch-2 unless otherwise stated.

WRAP

Row 1: Ch 284, dc in 8th ch from hook (*first 7 chs count as dc, ch 2 and sk 2 chs*), [ch 2, sk next 2 chs, dc in next ch] across, turn. (93 dc)

Rows 2–41: Ch 5 (*see Pattern Note*), sk next ch sp, dc in next st, [ch 2, sk next ch sp, dc in next st] across, turn. At end of last row, fasten off.

Finishing

Pin Wrap to measurements of 22 x 64 inches, lightly block.

Allow to dry completely.

Fringe

Cut 5 strands each 12 inches in length. Holding all 5 strands tog, fold in half, pull fold



through row, pull ends through fold, pull to tighten.

Fringe in end of every odd row. Trim to 5 inches. ❧

THE KNOT-SO-HARD LOVE KNOT

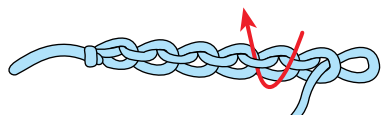

FOLLOW OUR SIMPLE STEP-BY-STEP TIPS TO EASILY MASTER THIS BEAUTIFUL LACE PATTERN THAT COMBINES TWO OF CROCHET'S SIMPLEST STITCHES.

I have been crocheting for over 42 years, and in all that time I struggled with the love knot stitch. Sometimes called the Solomon's knot, this stitch has been my nemesis until I took a class with Vashti Braha at the Knit & Crochet Show in July 2012.

I had wanted to master the love knot stitch because I really like the look of it in crochet fabrics. It is also a great stitch to show off novelty yarns, and very economical in how much yarn you use to make a good-size piece of fabric.

The “aha moment” for me in Vashti's class was realizing how closely related to chain stitches the love knot is. One of my very favorite foundations to use in many of my designs is to start with a chain and work stitches (*usually the single crochet*) into the back bump or bar of the chain.



Back Bar of Chain

A love knot is really two stitches, a long loop chain and then a single crochet (*or any tall stitch you choose*) worked into the back bump. The trick is locating that back bump when you are making longer loops for your chain stitches.

My dear friend, Pam Shore, was sitting beside me in Vashti's class and helped me with this problem. Her trick that I have adopted is to capture the back bar with my thumb (*as shown in photo 1*). This really comes down to pinching the base of the chain loop with my thumb and forefinger of the yarn tensioning hand, then catching the working yarn to complete the chain stitch.

One of the things many of us, myself included, struggle with in making love knots is keeping the length of each love knot consistent. Vashti reminded us all that love knots are very forgiving, so “near-enough” in size will often work. Like all techniques, practice aids in being able to produce consistently sized loops.

Easiest for me is to use my thumb or the width of a finger to create

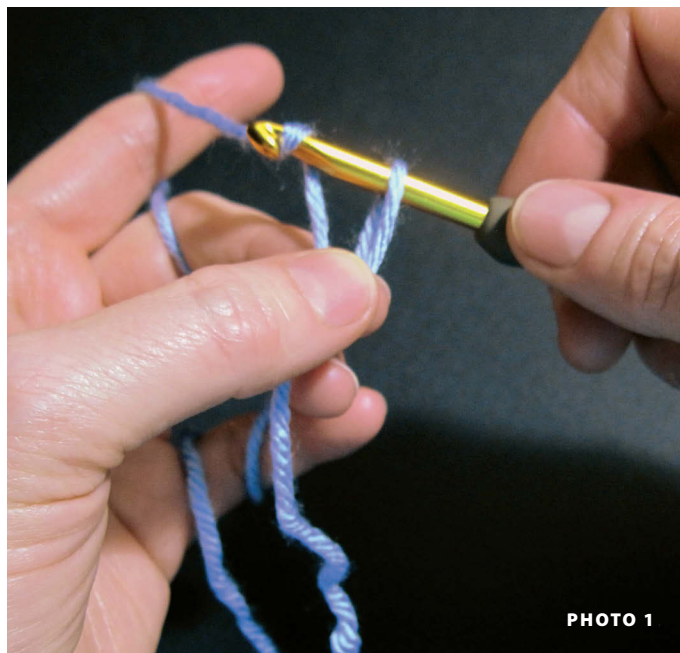

consistently sized loops (*as shown in photo 2*). When using my thumb I pull the chain loop up just to the top edge of my hook-holding thumb. Then complete the second step of the love knot by working a stitch into the back bar of the chain stitch.

I am generally a fan of making crochet fabric using larger-size hooks for the yarn, but in the case of love knots a smaller hook can work better. You want the anchoring stitch to be snug to hold the loop's shape and length.

In the two learning projects following this article, I've used half double crochet stitches as the anchoring stitch to make the "knot" part of the stitches stand out more. If you want a more subtle look to your love knots, try using a single crochet stitch instead.

Now grab some yarn and a hook to fearlessly crochet some love knots. **C!**

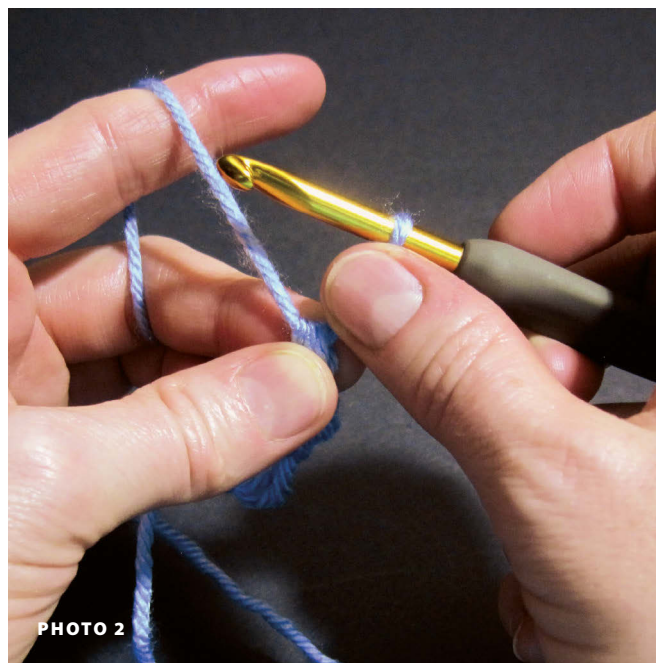

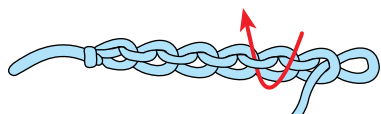

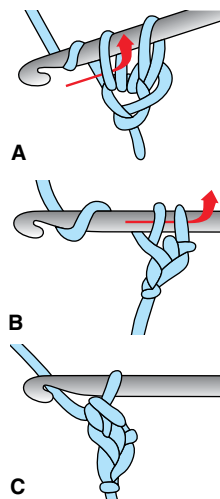

CROCHET SOLUTIONS 101

BY DARLA SIMS

OUR CROCHET EXPERT OFFERS TIPS FOR CHANGING UP A FAVORITE SWEATER PATTERN FOR A DIFFERENT LOOK AND ALSO FOR TAMING THAT ANNOYING CURL THAT OFTEN OCCURS ON JACKET CORNERS.

Q. I have a favorite drop sleeve, crewneck pullover crochet pattern that I know fits me just right. The basic pattern uses single crochet. Now I'd like to try to change it up a bit for a different look. Any ideas?

A. Oh, do I have ideas—and then some! Every designer starts with a basic idea and builds on it. Below are ideas for still working your sweater in single crochet.

1. Work the entire sweater in stripes of different colors, wide or narrow, or mix up the stripe widths and color placement. Use a single color for all ribbing to tie the look together.

2. Work front, back and each sleeve in a different color and tie together with one color for all ribbing. For a bolder look, work the last inch of the sleeves in the same color as the ribbing.

3. Add a ruffle or other decorative edging to bottom of all ribbing, or edge the bottom of the sweater with a ruffle or other style of edging instead of ribbing.

4. Eliminate sleeve and bottom ribbing by working front and back so hemline falls at your waist.

5. Add a collar or turtleneck to the neckline. Crochet a faux tab about four inches in length to sew beneath the center of the collar and add three evenly spaced buttons for a polo shirt look.

6. Lengthen the front and back to tunic length. Then crochet a belt to match.

7. Eliminate neck shaping and work both front and back to total desired body length and you now have a boat neckline. When you sew shoulders together, leave at least an 8-inch neck opening. To add pizzazz, sew a button to each end of the neck opening. Tie the look together by adding the same buttons to lower arm edging at the outer sides.

8. Want to turn your pattern into a perky cap-sleeve sweater for warm weather? Eliminate the sleeves called for in your original pattern. Work front and back according to your pattern. Sew shoulder and side seams leaving armhole openings. Then, using a hook two sizes smaller than used for body, work 2–4 inches around each sleeve opening.

9. Add one or more pockets of any desired size or shape. Add crochet embellishments, such as motifs

and flowers, and sew them wherever you like.

LAST, BUT NOT LEAST

Try a different stitch pattern, making certain to adjust stitch numbers for all body sections to accommodate pattern repeats and to stay as close to original number of stitches across so as to maintain width desired. Maybe you want to use the pattern just for the front and back or for the sleeves only.

Q. Is there a way to crochet a band around the outer edge of a jacket to avoid curling at the front corners?

A. The real problem with curling corners happens most often when crocheting a wide band in single crochet. Most ruffled or lacy edgings do not create the corner curling problem.

Place stitch markers on each lower front corner, and again at each corner where neckline shaping begins. Then fold each front in half and place markers at fold. If jacket is rather long, fold again into quarters and place markers at folds. Count total number of stitches to be worked from bottom

to neckline. You must have the same number of stitches along each front, so they will match and be of equal length. Divide the total number of stitches for each front in half, or into quarters, to keep you on track when working the first round. For example, if you plan to work 80 stitches along each front, you then work 40 single crochet to the midway marker, or 20 single crochet to the quarter marker if markers are indicating a fourth of each front. This way if you find yourself crocheting either too closely or too loosely, you can adjust the stitch placing without having to pull out your stitches between markers.



PHOTO 1

The swatch in Photo 1 is worked in rounds. When crocheting in rounds, each round is always worked from right to left around the outer

edge of a jacket and thus, after working several rounds, you see the band stitches begin to slant to the right. As the band widens, the slanting is more pronounced and looks off-kilter when the body stitches do not slant. In addition, the corners begin to curl and each corner begins to look worse with each succeeding round. If your band is only 1 inch or less in length, you can lessen the curling by working one last round: Work reverse single crochet into each sc around (do not increase in corners). Join and finish off. I find the last joining is less apparent if you pull the tail from front to back through the next single crochet before weaving in the end.

STANDARD FLAT SINGLE CROCHET BAND

Rnd 1: Join yarn in any corner st with sc, sc again in the same st, work required number

of sc to next corner, *3 sc in next corner, sc to next corner, rep from * twice, sc to next corner and beg corner, sc in same corner, join with sl st to first sc of end.

Rnd 2: Ch 1, 2 sc in same st as joining, sc in each sc to next corner, *3 sc in 2nd sc at next corner, sc across to next corner, rep from * twice, sc to next corner and beg corner, sc in same corner, join with sl st to first sc of end.

Rep row 2 to desired width. Finish off.

The swatch in Photo 2 is worked back and forth as you turn at the end of each round and are able to avoid the slanting

BACK & FORTH SINGLE CROCHET BAND

Rnd 1: Join yarn in any corner st with sc, sc again in the same st, work required number of sc to next corner, *3 sc in next corner, sc to next corner, rep from * twice, sc to next corner and beg corner, sc in same corner, join with sl st to first sc of rnd, **turn**.

Rnd 2: Ch 1, 2 sc in same sc as joining, sc in each sc to next corner, *3 sc in next corner, sc in each sc to next corner, rep from * twice, sc to next corner, sc in corner; join to first sc of rnd, **turn**.

Rep Row 2 to desired width. Fasten off. **C!**

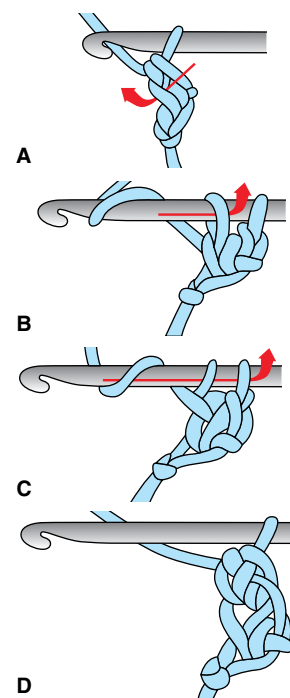

MATERIALS

- Classic Elite Alpaca Sox Solids super fine (sock) weight alpaca/merino/nylon yarn (3½ oz/450 yds/100g per hank):
2 [2, 3, 3, 4] hanks #1832 cereza
- Size E/4/3.50mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle
- Stitch markers



GAUGE

Slightly stretched: 2 cl = 2½ inches;
4 cl rows = 2½ inches

Take time to check gauge.

PATTERN NOTES

This stretchy fabric naturally gives several inches of ease to the garment.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

SPECIAL STITCHES

Beginning half cluster (beg half cl): Ch 4, (tr, ch 3, sc) in next cl.

Cluster (cl): Ch 3, holding back last lp of each tr on hook, tr in same st as last sc made (*first leg completed*), tr in top of next st, yo and pull through all lps on hook, ch 3, sc in same st (*2nd leg completed*).

End cluster (end cl): Sc in same st as 2nd leg of last cl made, ch 3, *holding back last lp of each st on hook, tr in same st as last sc made (*first leg completed*), (tr, dc) in first sc of rnd, yo, pull through all lps on hook.

End bobble cluster (end bobble cl): Loosely ch 3, holding back last lp of each tr on hook, tr in same cl as last sc made, 5 tr in next sc, (tr, dc) in next cl, yo, pull through all lps on hook.

Large cluster (large cl): Ch 4, holding back last lp of each dtr on hook, **dtr** (*see Stitch Guide*) in same st as last sc made (*first leg completed*), dtr in top of next st, yo and pull through all lps on hook, ch 3, sc in same st (*2nd leg completed*).

End large cluster (end large cl): Ch 4, holding back last lp of each dtr on hook, dtr in same st as last sc made (*first leg completed*), (dtr, tr) in first sc of rnd, yo, pull through all lps on hook (*2nd leg completed*).

TUNIC

Body

Row 1 (WS): Beg at bottom edge, ch 116 [140, 164, 188, 212], sc in 2nd ch from hook, *ch 3, holding back last lp of each tr on hook, tr in same ch as last sc made, sk next 5 chs, tr in next ch, yo, pull through all lps on hook, ch 3, sc in same st as last tr made (*cl made*), rep from * across, turn. (19 [23, 27, 31, 35] cls)

Row 2 (RS): Beg half cl (*see Special Stitches*), bobble cl (*see Special Stitches*) across, end half cl (*see Special Stitches*), turn.

Row 3: Ch 1, sc in first st, cl (*see Special Stitches*) across, turn.

Row 4: Beg half cl, cl across, end half cl, turn.

Rows 5 & 6: Rep rows 3 and 4.

Row 7: Ch 1, sc in first st, cl, *bobble cl**, cl 3 times, rep from * across, ending last rep at **, cl, turn.

Row 8: Beg half cl, *bobble cl twice**, cl twice, rep from * across, ending last rep at **, end half cl, turn.

Row 9: Rep row 7.

Row 10: Rep row 4.

Rows 11 & 12: Rep rows 3 and 4.

Row 13: Rep row 3.

Row 14: Ch 1, sc in first st, cl across, ch 28, join (*see Pattern Notes*) in top of first cl.

Row 5: Ch 2, **fphdc** (see *Stitch Guide*) around each st across, turn.

Rows 6–27: [Rep rows 2–5 consecutively] 6 times, ending last rep with row 3.

Row 28: Ch 43 [43, 51], hdc in 3rd ch from hook (*first 2 chs count as first hdc*), hdc in each ch across and in each st across, turn. (98 [98, 106] hdc)

Row 29: Rep row 5.

Row 30: Rep row 2. (48 [48, 52] cross-sts)

Rows 31–52 [31–56, 31–60]: [Rep rows 3–6 consecutively] 6 [7, 8] times, ending last rep with row 4. At end of last row, **do not turn**. Fasten off.

Begin Neckline Split

Getting started: Join (see *Pattern Notes*) to 59th [59th, 67th] hdc in row 52 [56, 60], ch 40, turn.

Row 53 [57, 61]: Hdc in 3rd ch from hook and each ch to sts (39 hdc including beg ch 2),

fphdc around each hdc and ch-2 at end of row, turn.

Rows 54–76 [58–84, 62–92]: [Rep rows 2–5 consecutively] 6 [7, 8] times, ending last rep with row 4.

Row 77 [85, 93]: Ch 2, fphdc around 2nd hdc and each of next 55 hdc, hdc in each hdc to end of row, turn. Fasten off.

Row 78 [86, 94]: Join to first fphdc for 2nd sleeve, ch 4, cross-st across, ending with tr in last st, turn. (27 cross-sts for all sizes)

Rows 79–103 [87–111, 95–119]: [Rep rows 3–6 consecutively] 7 [7, 7] times, ending last rep with row 3.

Row 104 [112, 120]: Ch 1, sc in each st across. Fasten off.

Back

Getting started: Worked same as Front without Neckline Split.

Row 1: Ch 57, sc in 2nd ch from hook and in each ch across, turn. (56 sc)

Row 2: Ch 4, cross-st across beg in 2nd stitch, ending with tr in last st, turn. (2 tr, 27 cross-sts)

Row 3: Ch 4, cross-st across, ending with tr in last st, turn.

Row 4: Ch 2, hdc in each st across, turn. (56 hdc)

Rows 6–27: [Rep rows 2–5 consecutively] 6 times, ending last rep with row 3.

Row 28: Ch 43 [43, 51], hdc in 3rd ch from hook (*first 2 chs count as first hdc*), hdc in each ch across and in each st across, turn. (98 [98, 106] hdc)

MATERIALS

- Madelinetosh Tosh DK light (DK) weight superwash merino wool yarn (3¼ oz/225 yds/92g per skein): 3 [4, 4, 5, 5, 6] skeins badlands
- Size L/11/8mm cabled Tunisian hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Sizes H/8/5mm and K/10½/6.5mm crochet hooks
- Tapestry needle
- Safety pin
- Stitch markers



GAUGE

16 sts = 5 inches; 4 rows = 4 inches

Take time to check gauge.

PATTERN NOTES

Before beginning every forward row, give firm tug on loop on hook to tighten up first stitch. You may still find this edge is looser than the left edge of the work. In this design, this affects the right back armhole, which will be tightened up in Finishing.

Work all returns by working loops off hook (see *Special Stitches*) unless otherwise stated.

Always work last stitch of row under 2 loops, front and back vertical bars of last stitch.

The gauge will be looser until several rows are worked, then true gauge is reached.

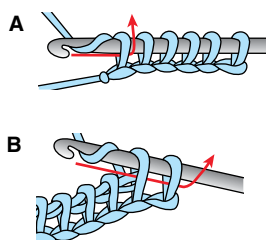
Make all starting chains with size H hook to keep edge firm.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

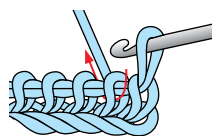
Work loops off hook (work lps off hook):

Yo, pull through 1 lp on hook, [yo, pull through 2 lps on hook] across. Last lp on hook counts as first st of next row.

Tunisian Knit Stitch (TKS): Insert hook from front to back between front and back vertical bars (see *illustration*), yo, pull lp through.

Tunisian Knit Slip Stitch (TKSS): Insert hook from front to back between front and back vertical bars, pull lp through st and

through lp on hook. By inserting hook as in TKS, finished edge matches rest of fabric.

Decrease (dec): Dec are made in step B on this pattern, when working dec, work rem of row as you normally would:

Dec 1 at end of row: Yo, pull through 3 lps on hook.

Dec 1 at beg of row: Yo, pull through first 2 lps on hook.

This method of dec is preferred because it leaves an outside edge that will not be visible when working Border.

Increase (inc): Insert hook under right leg of next st, pull up lp (inc), TKS in same st.

This method of increasing is preferred because it leaves no hole in fabric. It can take a few tries to get the hang of it, but is well worth it. When you have finished this sequence, you will still have 1 bar visible from working st. **Do not** be tempted to work into it, but go to next st.

Tunisian Knit Puff Stitch (TKPS): [Yo, insert hook as in TKS, pull up lp] 4 times, yo, pull through all lps on hook. For best results, work loosely.

VEST

Back

Row 1: With size K hook, ch 52 [60, 66, 72, 78, 84], change to L Tunisian hook; holding back all lps on hook, insert hook in 2nd ch from hook, yo, pull up lp, [insert hook in next ch, yo, pull up lp] across (52 [60, 66, 72, 78, 84] lps on hook); return (see *Pattern Notes*).

Row 2: TKS (see *Special Stitches*) across; return row.

Rows 3–37: Rep row 2.



Armhole Shaping

Row 1:

A. TKSS (see *Special Stitches*) in each of first 0 [2, 2, 3, 5, 5] sts, TKS across to last 3 [5, 5, 6, 8, 8] sts, TKS, leaving rem 0 [2, 3, 3, 5, 5] sts unworked;

B. dec 1 at beg of row (see *Special Stitches*), [yo, pull through 2 lps on hook] across, ending with **dec 1 at end of row** (see *Special Stitches*). (50 [54, 60, 64, 6, 72] sts)

Rows 2 & 3 [2 & 3, 2–5, 2–5, 2–5, 2–6]: TKS across (48 [52, 56, 58, 60, 66] lps on hook at end of last row); return with dec 1 at beg and end of row.

Rows 4–32 [4–34, 6–36, 6–38, 6–40, 7–44]: TKS across (48 [50, 54, 58, 60, 64] lps on hook); return.

Shoulder & Neck Shaping

Getting started: Place marker in 14th [16th, 15th, 17th, 16th, 18th] st.

Right Shoulder

Row 1 (short row): TKS in each of first 13 [15, 14, 16, 15, 17] sts, leaving rem sts unworked; return, leaving last 4 [4, 4, 5, 4, 5] lps on hook.

Row 2 (short row): TKS in each of next 9 [11, 10, 11, 11, 12] sts; return, leaving rem 6 [8, 7, 9, 8, 9] lps on hook.

Row 3: TKS in each of next 5 [7, 6, 7, 7, 7] sts; return.

Row 4 (short row): TKSS in each of first 13 [15, 14, 16, 15, 17] sts, TKSS in end of each of next 3 shoulder rows, continue working TKSS across neck to marker, TKSS in marked st, TKS in each of next 6 [8, 7, 8, 8] sts; return 6, [8, 7, 8, 8, 8] times.

Row 5: TKS in next 9 [11, 10, 11, 11, 12] sts (10 [12, 11, 12, 12, 13] lps on hook); return.

Row 6: TKS in 10 [12, 11, 12, 12, 13] sts of row 5, TKS in 4 [4, 4, 5, 4, 4] unworked sts of row 4 (14 [16, 15, 17, 16, 18] sts on hook); return. Fasten off.

Right Front

Getting started: Join at Back bottom corner, right side by pulling yarn under 2 lps of st at bottom edge. Working into **back lp** only (see *Stitch Guide*),

Row 1: Pull up lp in each of next 4 sts, sk next st, *pull up lp in each of next 5 sts, sk next st, rep from * 5 times, pull up lp in last st (31 lps on hook); return.

Row 2: TKS across; return.

Size Small Only

Row 3: TKS in each st across to last 2 sts, **inc** (see *Special Stitches*), work last st (32 lps on hook); return.

Row 4: TKS across; return with dec 1 at end of row. (31 sts)

Size Medium Only

Row [3]: TKS across; return with dec 1 at end of row. ([30] sts)

Row [4]: TKS in each st across to last 2 sts, inc 1, work last st ([31] lps on hook); return.

Bust (unclosed): 36 inches (*small*) [39 inches (*medium*), 42¼ inches (*large*), 45¾ inches (*X-large*), 49 inches (*2X-large*), 53 inches (*3X-large*)]

MATERIALS

- Malabrigo Silky Merino light (DK)  weight silk/baby merino wool yarn (1¼ oz/150 yds/50g per skein): 10 [10, 12, 12, 13, 14] skeins #472 nocturnal
- Size F/5/3.75mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle
- Straight pins

GAUGE

20 pattern sts = 4 inches; 31 pattern rows = 6 inches

Motif = 3¼ inches square

Take time to check gauge.

PATTERN NOTES

There is approximately a 3-inch opening between Fronts with no closure.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated

Chain-3 at beginning of round counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

SPECIAL STITCHES

Mesh: [Sc in next sc, ch 1, sk next ch-1 sp] across, sc in next sc.

Front post double crochet over front post double crochet (fpdc over fpdc): On RS row, fpdc around fpdc 2 rows below, sk sc behind new st, on WS row, sc in top of fpdc.

Beginning cluster (beg cl): Ch 3, holding back last lp of each st on hook, 2 dc in same place as beg ch-3, yo, pull through 3 lps on hook.

Cluster (cl): Holding back last lp of each st on hook, 3 dc as indicated in instructions, yo, pull through 4 lps on hook.

STITCH PATTERNS

Body Pattern

Multiple of 8 plus 7 sts.

Row 1 (RS): [Mesh (*see Special Stitches*), fpdc over fpdc (*see Special Stitches*)] across, ending with mesh, turn.

Row 2: [Mesh, sc in fpdc] across, ending with mesh, turn.

Rep rows 1 and 2 alternately for pattern.

JACKET

Back

Getting Started: In order to have Motif border fit properly, row count is extremely important. There will be a total of 134 rows on Back and Fronts.

Row 1: Ch 96 [104, 112, 120, 128, 136], sc in 2nd ch from hook, [ch 1, sk next ch, sc in next ch] 3 times, *dc in next ch, [sc in next ch, ch 1, sk next ch] 3 times, sc in next ch, rep from * across, turn. (95 [103, 111, 119, 127, 135] sts)

Row 2: *Mesh (*see Special Stitches*)** , fpdc (*see Stitch Guide*) around dc, rep from * across, ending last rep at **, turn.

Next rows: Work Body Pattern even until piece measures 18 [17½, 17¼, 17, 16½, 16] inches from beg. You should have 93 [91, 89, 87, 85, 83] total rows.

Armhole Shaping

Next rows: Sc dec (*see Stitch Guide*) at each edge every row 10 [14, 16, 18, 20, 22] times. (75 [75, 79, 83, 87, 91] sts at end of last row)

Next rows: Work established pattern even for 17 [15, 15, 15, 15, 15] rows.

First Shoulder Shaping

Next row: Work established pattern across first 5 [5, 7, 9, 11, 13] sts, leaving rem sts unworked, turn.

Next rows: Work established pattern even for 13 rows. At end of last row, fasten off.

FINISHED SIZE

29 inches deep x 52½ inches wide,
excluding Edging

MATERIALS

- Omega Sinfonia light (light worsted) weight cotton yarn (3½ oz/218 yds/100g per skein):
3 skeins #832 turquoise
1 skein each #879 purple, #825 Mexican rose, #830 yellow, #839 lime green, #883 coral and #831 aqua
- Size F/5/3.75mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge



GAUGE

10 sts = 2 inches

Each square = 3½ inches

Edging = 2½ inches

PATTERN NOTES

The shawl is worked in one piece from the bottom corner. This is Square 1. Square 2 is then built on top of it, and Square 3 is then built on top of Square 2. Continue in this manner until 11 squares have been worked. Then work a triangle. The second row of Squares is then worked directly onto the first.

The last stitch of each row is always worked in both loops, work remaining stitches in front loops.



Change colors: Work the last stitch in the first color until there are 2 loops left on the hook. Leaving a 5-inch end of the new color at the back, pull the new color through the last 2 loops on the hook. Work in the new color, leaving the old color behind to be used later.

When reusing the first color there is no need to leave an end as the yarn is now secure.

Chain-3 at beginning of round counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

SPECIAL STITCH

Corner Stitch (corner st): Insert hook in next st, pull up lp, sk next st, insert hook in next st, pull up lp, yo, pull through all lps on hook.

COLOR SEQUENCE

1. Purple and Mexican rose;
2. Mexican rose and yellow;
3. yellow and lime green;
4. lime green and coral;



5. coral and aqua;
 6. aqua and turquoise;
 7. turquoise and purple;
 8. purple and yellow;
 9. yellow and coral;
 10. coral and Mexican rose;
 11. Mexican rose and lime green;
 12. lime green and aqua;
 13. aqua and purple
 14. purple and lime green;
 15. lime green and turquoise;
 16. turquoise and yellow;
 17. yellow and aqua;
 18. aqua and Mexican rose;
 19. Mexican rose and coral;
 20. coral and purple;
- 1 and 2, beg again.

WRAP

First Strip

Square 1

Row 1: Using **purple** (see *Color Sequence*), ch 34, sc in 2nd ch from hook, sc in each of next 14 chs, **corner st** (see *Special Stitch*), sc in each of last 15 chs, turn. (1 corner st, 30 sc)

Row 2: Working in **front lps** (see *Stitch Guide and Pattern Notes*), ch 1, sc in first of 14 sts in front lps, corner st, sc in each of next 13 sts in front lps, **sc in both lps of last st** (see *Pattern Notes*), **change color** (see *Pattern Notes*), turn. (1 corner st, 28 sc)

Row 3: Ch 1, sc in each of first 13 sts, corner st, sc in each of last 13 sts, turn. (1 corner st, 26 sc)

Row 4: Ch 1, sc in each of first 12 sts, corner st, sc in each of last 12 sts, changing colors, turn. (1 corner st, 24 sc)

Row 5: Ch 1, sc in each of first 11 sts, corner st, sc in each of last 11 sts, turn. (1 corner st, 22 sc)

Row 6: Ch 1, sc in each of first 10 sts, corner st, sc in each of last 10 sts, changing colors, turn. (1 corner st, 20 sc)

Row 7: Ch 1, sc in each of first 9 sts, corner st,

sc in each of last 9 sts, turn. (1 corner st, 18 sc)

Row 8: Ch 1, sc in each of first 8 sts, corner st, sc in each of last 8 sts, changing colors, turn. (1 corner st, 16 sc)

Row 9: Ch 1, sc in each of first 7 sts, corner st, sc in each of last 7 sts, turn. (1 corner st, 14 sc)

Row 10: Ch 1, sc in each of first 6 sts, corner st, sc in each of last 6 sts, changing colors, turn. (1 corner st, 12 sc)

Row 11: Ch 1, sc in each of first 5 sts, corner st, sc in each of last 5 sts, turn. (1 corner st, 10 sc)

Row 12: Ch 1, sc in each of first 4 sts, corner st, sc in each of last 4 sts, turn. (1 corner st, 8 sc)

Row 13: Ch 1, sc in each of first 3 sts, corner st, sc in each of last 3 sts, turn. (1 corner st, 6 sc)

Row 14: Ch 1, sc in each of first 2 sts, corner st, sc in each of last 2 sts, turn. (1 corner st, 4 sc)

Row 15: Ch 1, sc in first st, corner st, sc in last st, turn. (1 corner st, 2 sc)

Row 16: Ch 1, corner st, **do not turn** (square completed).

Next Squares

Work the foundation of the 2nd Square along the side of this Square. This is the left edge of the Square 1 that is seen while the last st worked is held at the top. This is considered **picking up stitches step** and is not actually counted as a row.

Work sc in the same place as the last st, work sc per row to the end (*this should be 16 sc*), ch 18.

Row 1: Sc in the 2nd ch from hook, sc in each of next 14 chs, corner st, sc in each of last 15 sc, turn. (corner st, 30 sc)

Next rows: Rep from row 2 until the 2nd Square is complete.

Rep until all the required Squares are worked in strip. This will be 11 Squares.

Now work Triangle.

Triangle

Getting started: The picking up sts step and row 1 are same as Square that you worked previously.

Work sc in same place as last st, work sc per row to end (*should be 16*), ch 18.

Row 1: Sc in 2nd ch from hook and in each of next 14 chs, corner st, sc in each of last 15 sc, turn. (1 corner st, 30 sc)

Row 2: Ch 1, sk first st (*dec*), sc in next st, sc in each of next 12 sts, corner st, sc in each st across ending with **sc dec** (see *Stitch Guide*) in last 2 sts, changing colors, turn. (1 corner st, 26 sc)

Row 3: Ch 1, sk first st (*dec*), sc in each of next 10 sc, corner st, sc in each st across, ending with sc dec in last 2 sts, turn. (1 corner st, 22 sc)

Row 4: Ch 1, sk first st (*dec*), sc in each of next 8 sts, corner st, sc in each st across, ending with sc dec in last 2 sts, changing colors, turn. (1 corner st, 18 sc)

Row 5: Ch 1, sk first st (*dec*), sc in each of next 6 sc, corner st, sc in each st across, ending with sc dec in last 2 sts, turn. (1 corner st, 14 sc)

Row 6: Ch 1, sk first st (*dec*), sc in each of next 4 sts, corner st, sc in each st across, ending with sc dec in last 2 sts, changing colors, turn. (1 corner st, 10 sc)

Row 7: Ch 1, sk first st (*dec*), sc in next 2 sc, corner st, sc in each st across, ending with sc dec in last 2 sts, turn. (1 corner st, 6 sc)

Row 8: Ch 1, sk first st, sc in next st, corner st, sc dec in last 2 sts (*Triangle completed*). Fasten off.

Strip 2

Square 1 is 13th Square

Getting started: Picking up sts step, ch 17, evenly sp 16 sc along right hand side of Square 1 in last Strip.

Row 1: Working in front lps, ch 1, sc in each of first 15 sts, corner st, sc in each of last 15 chs, turn. (1 corner st, 30 sc)

Next rows: Rep from row 2 to row 16.

Square 14

Getting started: Picking up sts, work foundation of 2nd Square along side of this Square. This is left edge of Square 1 that is seen while last st worked is held at top. This is considered picking up sts step and is not actually counted as row.

Work sc in the same place as the last st, work sc per row to end (*this should be 16 sc*), sc in the corner st (*this should be in the picking up st step in the last strip*), evenly sp 16 sc along right edge of next Square.

Row 1: Working in front lps, ch 1, sc in each of first 15 sc, corner st, sc in the last 15 chs, turn. (1 corner st, 30 sc)

Next rows: Rep from row 2 to row 16.

Strip 2 is Squares 13–22. Then work Triangle as done previously.

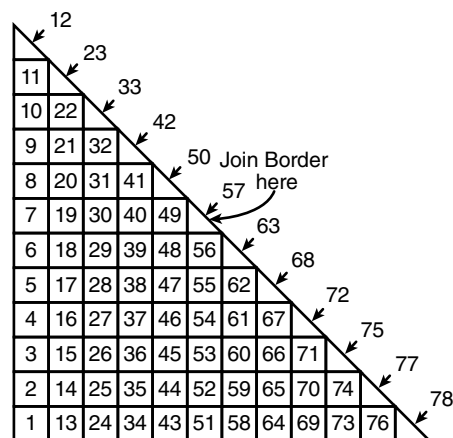
Rep this technique until Wrap is complete. Fasten off.

Border

Getting started: Border is done with turquoise. Please refer to diagram for the first rnd of Border.

Rnd 1: Join with sl st at Triangle 57, evenly sp sc along edge until you reach the corner (*triangle #12*), ch 4, **dtr** (*see Stitch Guide*) into the corner (*this acts as 2 tr*), ch 14, sk 14 sts, tr into the last st in #12 before you reach Square 11, tr into first st in #11, ch 14, sk 14 sts, tr into last st in #11 before you reach Square 10, tr into the first st in #10, rep this technique until you reach the corner in Square 1, 3 tr in the bottom corner, rep for other side until you reach corner of Triangle #78, tr into the corner, ch 4 and then evenly sp sc along triangle edge until you reach the beg of rnd back at #57, **do not join**.

Rnd 2: Working in **back lps** (*see Stitch Guide*), sc in each st until you reach the first ch-4 at left hand corner (*triangle #12*), 1 sc in each of the 4 ch, 3 sc in the first tr (*corner inc*),

*sc in each of next 14 chs, sc in each of next 2 tr, rep from * to bottom corner (*Square 1*), 3 sc in the center of 3 tr (*corner inc*), rep from * to top right corner (*triangle #78*), 3 sc in the last tr, sc in each of the 4 chs, sc in each st across to #58, **do not join**.

Rnds 3–12: Working in back lps, sc in each st around with 3 sc in each corner.

Rnd 13: Working in back lps, sl st in each st around, take care to keep work flat. Fasten off. **C!**

Row 1: Holding 1 strand of each yarn tog (see Pattern Notes), loosely ch 74 [76, 80], dc in 4th ch from hook (first 3 chs count as first dc), dc in each ch across, turn. Place marker after 36th [37th, 39th] st (center back), move marker each row. (72 [74, 78] dc)

Row 2: Ch 3 (see Pattern Notes), 2 dc in next st, dc in each st across to marker, dc in marked st, 2 dc in next st, dc in each st across to last 2 sts, 2 dc in next st, dc in last st, turn. (75 [77, 81] dc)

Rows 3–7: [Rep row 2] 5 times. (90 [92, 96] dc at end of last row)

Row 8: Ch 3, dc dec (see Stitch Guide) in next 2 sts, [dc in next st, dc dec in next 2 sts] 29 [29, 31] times, dc in each of last 0 [2, 0] sts, turn. (60 [62, 64] dc)

Row 9: Rep row 2. (63 [65, 67] dc)

Row 10: Ch 3, 2 dc in next 2 sts, [dc in each of next 2 sts, 2 dc in next st] 19 [19, 20] times, dc in each of next 1 [2, 1] st(s), 2 dc in each of next 1 [2, 2] st(s), dc in last st, turn. (85 [88, 91] dc)

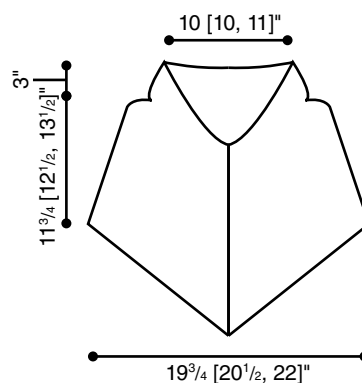
Row 11: Ch 3, 2 dc in next st, dc in each of next 2 [3, 2] sts, [2 dc in next st, dc in each of next 5 sts] 13 [13, 14] times, 2 dc in each of

next 0 [1, 2] st(s), dc in each of next 1 [2, 0] st(s), 2 dc in each of next 1 [1, 0] st(s), dc in last st, turn. (100 [104, 108] dc)

Working in sts, ends of rows and in starting ch on opposite side of row 1, join with sc in ch after marker, *sk next 2 sts or ½ inch, (3 dc, ch 3, 3 dc) in next st, sk next 2 sts or ½ inch**, sc in next st, rep from * around, ending last rep at **, join in beg sc.

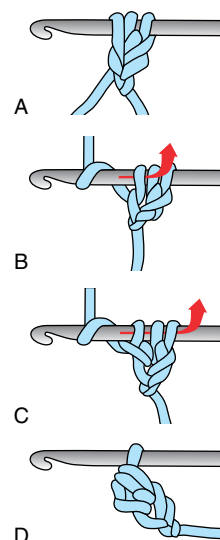

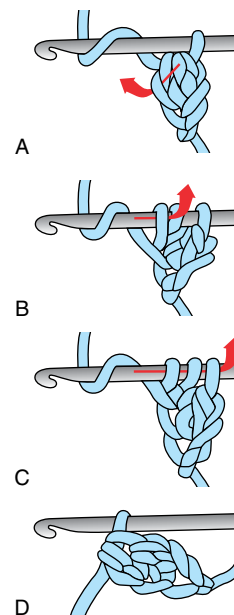

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

SPECIAL STITCH

Magic circle: Wrap yarn twice around index finger, insert hook in center of circle, yo, draw up a lp, ch 1 and continue rnd. Before joining, gently pull rem end to close opening and secure.

SHAWL

First Motif

Rnd 1: Work **magic circle** (see *Special Stitch*), 6 sc in circle, **join** (see *Pattern Note*) in first sc. (6 sc)

Rnd 2: Ch 1, sc in first sc, [ch 5, sc in next sc] 5 times, ch 2, join with dc in first sc forming last ch sp. (6 ch-5 sps, 6 sc)

Rnd 3: Ch 1, sc in same ch sp as beg ch-1, [ch 5, sc in next ch-5 sp] 5 times, ch 2, join with dc in first sc forming last ch sp. (6 ch-5 sps, 6 sc)

Rnd 4: Ch 1, sc in same ch sp as beg ch-1, [ch 8, sc in next ch-5 sp] 5 times, ch 3, join with **dtr** (see *Stitch Guide*) in first sc forming last ch sp. (6 ch-8 sps, 6 sc)

Rnd 5: Ch 1, sc in same ch sp as beg ch-1, [ch 9, sc in next ch-8 sp] 6 times, join in first sc. (6 ch-9 sps, 6 sc)

Rnd 6: Ch 1, (sc, hdc, 5 dc, ch 5, 5 dc, hdc, sc) in each ch-9 sp around, join in first sc. Fasten off.

Next Motifs

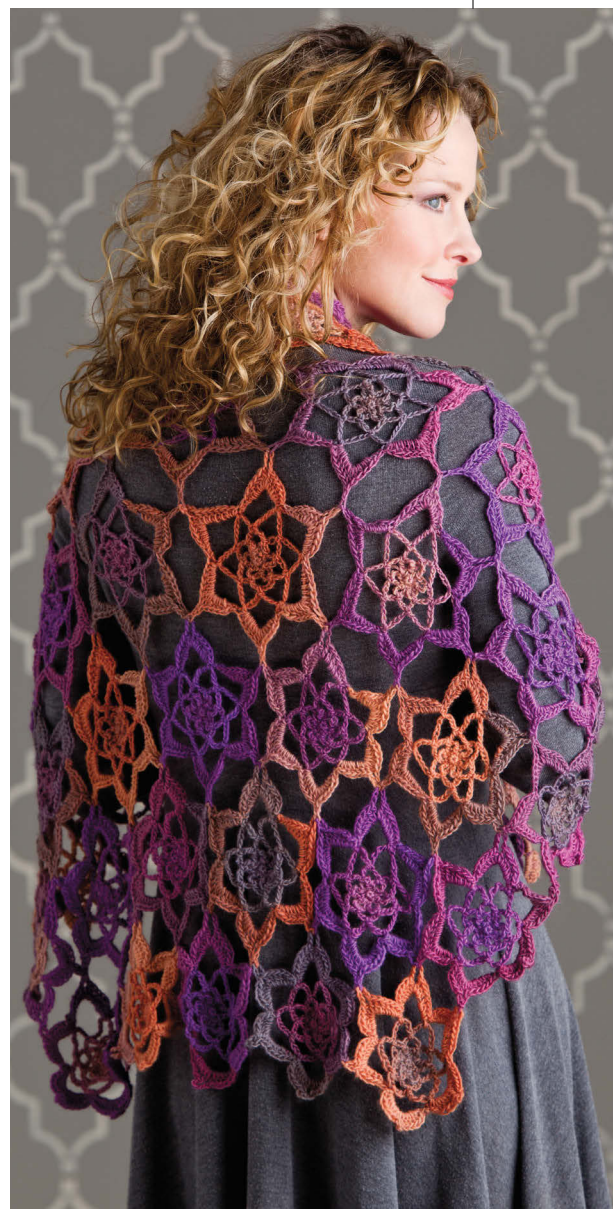
Make 55.

Getting Started: Next Motifs are joined with sl st to adjacent ch-5 sp on 2, 3 or 4 ch-5 sps depending on the location of Motif.

Beg at bottom of Shawl with a row of 5 Motifs. The next row up will be 6 Motifs, the next row up will be 7 Motifs, continue to inc 1 Motif each row until the 7th row contains a total of 11 Motifs across. **C!**

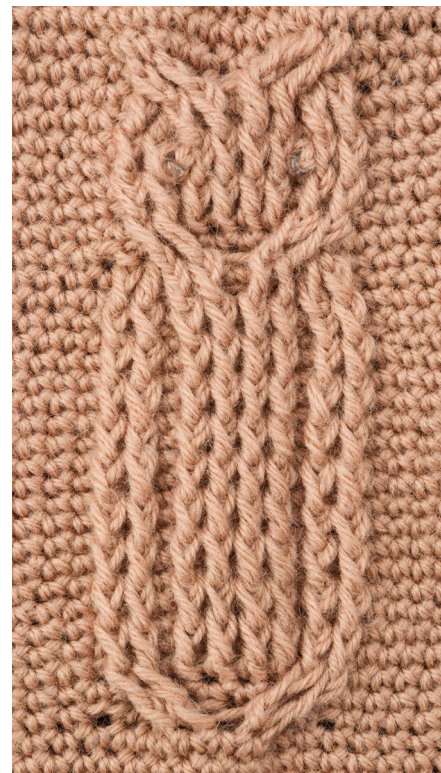
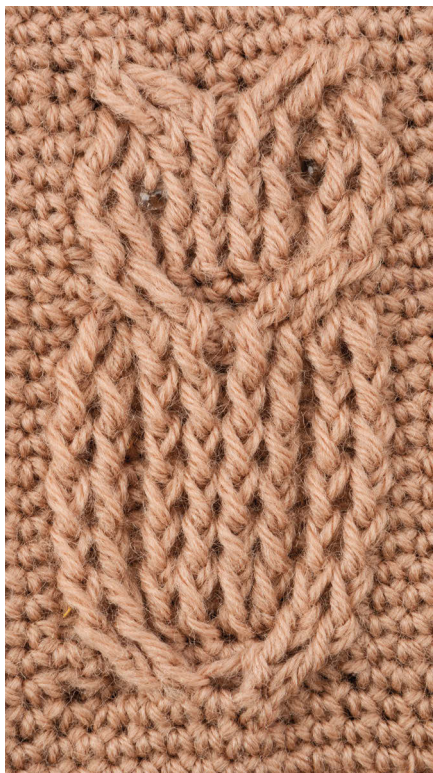

Rnd 56 [60, 64]: With size C hook, ch 1, sc in each st around, join in beg sc.

Rnds 57–67 [61–67, 65–69]: Ch 1, sc in each st around, join in beg sc.

Rnd 68 [68, 70]: Ch 1, sc in each of first 22 [24, 26] sts, sk next 2 sts, sc in each of next 3



sts, **fpdc** (see *Stitch Guide*) around each of 2 sts on last row below last 2 sk sts, sk next 3 sts, fpdc around each of next 2 sts, working in back of last 2 fpdc, sc in each of 3 sk sts, sc in each of last 22 [24, 26] sts, join in beg sc.

Rnd 69 [69, 71]: Ch 1, sc in each st around, join in beg sc.

Rnd 70 [70, 72]: Ch 1, sc in each of first 22 [24, 26] sts, fpdc around each of next 2 sts on last rnd, **bead sc** (see *Special Stitch*) in next st, fpdc around each of next fpdc on rnd before last, bead sc in next st, fpdc around each of last 2 sts on last rnd, sc in each of last 22 [24, 26] sts, join in beg sc.

Rnd 71 [71, 73]: Ch 1, sc in each st around, join in beg sc.

Rnd 72 [72, 74]: Ch 1, sc in each of first 22 [24, 26] sts, fpdc around each of next 2 fpdc on rnd before last, sc in next st, fpdc around each of next 4 fpdc on rnd before last, sc in next st, fpdc around each of next 2 fpdc on rnd before last, sc in each of last 22 [24, 26] sts, join in beg sc.

Rnd 73 [73, 75]: Ch 1, sc in each st around, join in beg sc.

Rnd 74 [74, 76]: Rep rnd 72 [72, 74].

Rnd 75 [75, 77]: Ch 1, sc in each st around, join in beg sc.

Rnd 76 [76, 78]: Ch 1, sc in each of first 6 [7, 8] sts, *sk next 2 sts, sc in each of next 3 sts, fpdc around each of sk 2 sts on last rnd, sk next 3 sts, fpdc around each of next 2 sts on last rnd, sc in each of last 3 sk sts, sc in each of next 6 [7, 8] sts*, sk next 2 sts, sc in each of next 3 sts, fpdc around first 2 fpdc on rnd before last, sk next 3 sts, fpdc around next 2 fpdc on rnd before last, working behind last 2 fpdc, sc in each of 3 sk st, sc in each of next 6 [7, 8] sts, rep between * once, join in beg sc.

Rnd 77 [77, 79]: Ch 1, sc in each st around, join in beg sc.

Rnd 78 [78, 80]: Ch 1, sc in each of first 6 [7, 8] sts, *fpdc around each of next 2 sts on last rnd, bead sc in next st, fpdc around each of next 4 fpdc on rnd before last, bead sc in next st, fpdc around each of next 2 sts, sc in each of next 6 [7, 8] sts*, fpdc around each of next 2 sc on last rnd, sc in next st, fpdc around each of next 4 fpdc on rnd before last, sc in next sc, fpdc around each of next 2 sts

TUNISIAN MEETS TARTAN BAG

DESIGN BY DENISE LAVOIE

THIS DUFFLE-STYLE BAG OFFERS A SURPRISING TAKE ON A TARTAN PLAID. WORKED IN A FOUR-COLOR COMBINATION, IT'S STITCHED IN THREE PIECES IN TUNISIAN SIMPLE STITCH AND THEN OVERSTITCHED IN CROCHET CHAIN STITCH TO CREATE THE PLAID EFFECT.

1 2 3 4 5 6 INTERMEDIATE

FINISHED SIZE

5½ x 7½ x 11½ inches, excluding handles

MATERIALS

- Cascade 220 medium (worsted) weight wool yarn (3½ oz/220 yds/100g per hanks):
2 hanks #9499 sand 
1 hank each #8686 brown, #8415 cranberry and #8010 natural
- Size H/8/5mm 12-inch Tunisian crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Sizes H/8/5mm and I/9/5.5mm crochet hooks
- Tapestry needle
- Sewing needle
- Sewing thread to match fabric
- 12-inch purse zipper (2 slider, closed bottom) to match Bag
- 15½-inch set of leather handbag handles
- ¾ yd fabric
- ½ yd 1-sided fusible ultrafirm interfacing
- Straight pins
- Split-ring markers

GAUGE

Tunisian hook: 15 TSS = 4 inches;
12 TSS rows = 4 inches

PATTERN NOTES

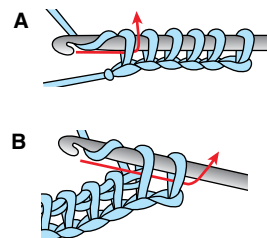
The Bag is made in 3 pieces—the main body and 2 sides. Columns of top slip stitch are worked onto the 3 pieces of completed Tunisian crochet fabric. Interfacing is added, along with a fabric lining. Finally, a zipper is installed and bag handles attached.

Join with slip stitch as indicated, unless otherwise stated.

SPECIAL STITCHES

Work loops off hook (work lps off hook):

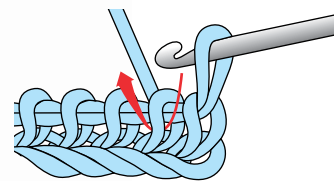
Yo, pull through 1 lp on hook (see *A* of illustration), [yo, pull through 2 lps on hook



Work Loops Off Hook

(see *B* of illustration)] across. Last lp on hook counts as first st of next row.

Tunisian Simple Stitch (TSS): Insert hook under front vertical bar from side to side (see illustration), yo, pull lp through.



Tunisian Simple Stitch

Top stitch (top st): Holding yarn at back of work, insert hook between sts, yo, pull lp through st and lp on hook.

BAG

Main Body

Row 1: With size H crochet hook and sand, ch 44;

A. with Tunisian hook, holding all lps on hook,



insert hook in 2nd ch from hook, yo, pull up lp, [insert hook in next ch, yo, pull up] across (44 lps on hook);

B. work lps off hook (see *Special Stitches*).

Rows 2 & 3:

A. TSS (see *Special Stitches*) across;

B. work lps off hook.

Row 4:

A. TSS across;

B. work lps off hook across to last 2 lps, change colors to brown and work off last 2 lps. **Do not fasten off** sand.

Row 5: With brown;

A. TSS across;

B. work lps off hook across to last 2 lps, change colors to sand, work off last 2 lps. Fasten off brown.

Row 6: With sand;

A. TSS across;

B. work lps off hook across to last 2 lps, change colors to cranberry and work off last 2 lps. **Do not fasten off** sand.

Row 7: With brown;

A. TSS across;

B. work lps off hook across to last 2 lps, change colors to sand, work off last 2 lps. Fasten off cranberry.

Rows 8–12: With sand;

A. TSS across;

B. work lps off hook.

Next rows: Rep rows 4–12 consecutively until piece measures 24 inches from beg, ending with sand row.

Bind off row: Sk first st, [insert hook from right to left of vertical strand of next st, yo, pull through vertical strand and lp on hook] across. Fasten off.

Side

Make 2.

Row 1: With size H hook and sand, ch 23, with Tunisian hook;

A. pull up lp in 2nd ch from hook and in each ch across;

B. work lps off hook.



Next rows: Work same as for Main Body in established color pattern until piece measures 8 inches, ending with sand row. Bind off same as Main Body.

Top Stitching

Main Body

First column: With size I crochet hook and natural, with RS facing, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) in 3rd st from lower left-hand corner, **top st** (see *Special Stitches*) across. Fasten off.

2nd column: Sk next 4 TSS columns, join brown at bottom of next column, top st across. Fasten off.

3rd column: Sk next TSS column, join cranberry at bottom of next column, top st across. Fasten off.

4th column: Sk next TSS column, join brown at bottom of next column, top st across. Fasten off.

Rep these 4 top st columns across TSS fabric on all 3 Bag pieces.

Finishing

Block bag pieces to schematic measurements.

Attaching Interfacing

From the interfacing fabric, cut 3 pieces: 1 piece, 10 x 12 inches; 2 pieces, 5 x 7 inches. With WS of Main Body piece facing, place interfacing on top evenly sp between all edges with fusible side down. Using a hot iron on steam setting, place damp cloth on top of bag piece and interfacing. Iron, holding for a few seconds before moving iron, placing special attention at corners and edges of interfacing. Remove iron and damp cloth and let bag piece cool. Rep if necessary in any area not fused.

Rep procedure for 2 Sides. Let all pieces cool completely.

Constructing Bag

With RS of Main Body piece facing, measure 11 inches from each short side along both long edges and place split ring stitch markers (*bottom 6 inches of Bag marked*). With straight pins and RS facing, pin 1 small Side piece to Main Body piece, starting with bottom of side piece to marked-off bottom of Main Body piece, pin both sides, ending with Main Body piece edges meeting at top. With

sand and size H hook, join at top corner and sl st pieces tog along pinned edge.

Rep along other edge with final Side piece.

Bag Opening Edging/Lining

Turn bag RS out. At either left edge of Bag opening, join sand with size H hook, working from left to right, ch 1, **reverse sc** (see *Stitch Guide*) across edge of bag opening. Fasten off.

Turn bag and rep along other bag edge opening.

From fabric, cut 1 piece 18 x 28 inches. Stitch ½-inch seam on each short side of rectangle. Fold in half widthwise with WS of fabric facing out. With sewing thread, sew ½-inch seam on each side of fabric, creating an enclosed rectangle of 3 sides, with an open top.

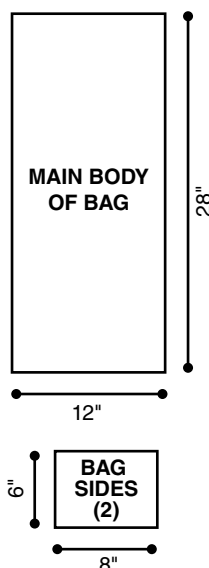
With WS of lining facing out, slip lining onto bag. Fold each bottom corner of lining and tack in place along lining bottom, creating square bottom corners.

Blind-stitch closed along each side of top of lining to correspond with width of bag opening. Fold each side corner of lining and tack along lining side, creating square sides.

Slip lining off bag. Turn lining RS out. Turn bag inside out and slip lining, with RS facing, onto WS of bag. Pin top of lining to bag along front top, below reverse sc edging. Sew lining to bag.

Bag Zipper

Remove zipper from package and unzip so zipper pulls are at each end of zipper. With WS of zipper facing, pin zipper, placing teeth just even with bag opening edge. Carefully turn bag RS out. Check to ensure that both zipper pulls sit squarely and flush at each corner of bag opening. With sewing needle and thread matching zipper color, stitch zipper in place, stitching just below reverse sc row.

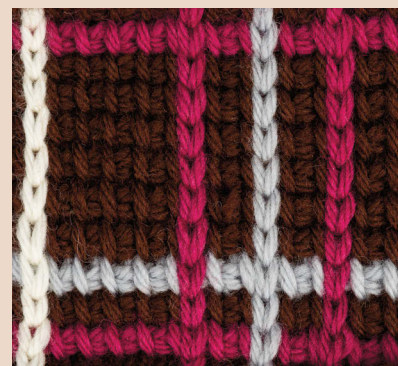


Turn bag WS out and stitch zipper tape to lining, taking particular care at each corner. Turn bag RS out and, testing with zipper open and closed, work additional stitches where needed to ensure that zipper is securely stitched to Bag opening, paying special attention to each corner.

Handles

Place handles on each side of Bag, just below the edge of zipper tape. With matching-color thread, sew handles to Bag as shown in photo. **C!**

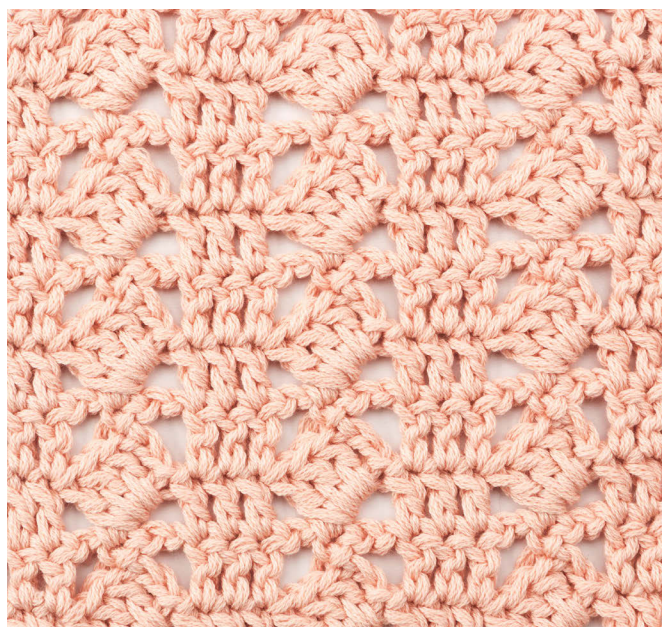

Picot cluster (picot cl): Holding back last lp of each st on hook, 2 dc as indicated in instructions, yo, pull through all lps on hook (*cl completed*), ch 3, sl st in top of cl just worked (*picot completed*).

Picot cluster shell (picot cl shell): 5 picot cls (see *Special Stitches*) as indicated in instructions.

Row 1: Ch multiple of 15 plus 8, dc in 4th ch from hook and in each of next 4 chs, [ch 3, sk next 2 chs, dc in next ch, ch 3, sk next 3 chs,

dc in next ch, ch 3, sk next 3 chs, dc in each of next 6 chs] across, turn.

Row 2: Ch 3 (see *Pattern Note*), dc in each of next 5 sts, [sk next ch-3 sp, **picot cl shell** (see *Special Stitches*) in next ch sp, dc in each of next 6 sts] across, turn.

Row 3: Ch 3, dc in each of next 5 sts, *[ch 3, sk next picot, sc in next picot] twice, ch 3, sk next picot, dc in each of next 6 sts, rep from * across, turn.

Rep rows 2 and 3 alternately for pattern.

DIAMONDS & POSTS

PATTERN NOTE

Chain-3 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

SPECIAL STITCH

Diagonal block: Dc as indicated in instructions, ch 3, 3 dc around last dc worked.

Row 1: Ch multiple of 8 plus 5, dc in 4th ch from hook, dc in next ch, [sk next 2 chs, **diagonal block** (see *Special Stitch*) in next ch, sk next 2 chs, dc in each of next 3 chs] across, turn.

Row 2: Ch 3 (see *Pattern Note*), dc in each of next 2 sts, [ch 2, sc in 3rd ch of ch-3 on next diagonal block, ch 2, dc in each of next 3 sts] across, turn.

Row 3: Ch 3, dc in each of next 2 sts, [diagonal block in next sc, dc in each of next 3 sts] across, turn.

Rep rows 2 and 3 alternately for pattern. **C!**

MATERIALS

- Red Heart Super Saver medium (worsted) weight acrylic yarn (7 oz/364 yds/198g per skein):
2 skeins each #313 aran, #311 white and #334 buff
- Size J/10/6mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Bamboo D handle
- 1-inch buttons: 2



GAUGE

Blanket: 6 sts = 2 inches; 3 rows = 1¼ inches

Strap: Rows 1–4 = 3½ inches wide x 2 inches long

PATTERN NOTES

Work from center out to create width, working first on one side with each color and then on other side as specified.

Chain-3 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

Chain-5 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet and chain-2 unless otherwise stated.

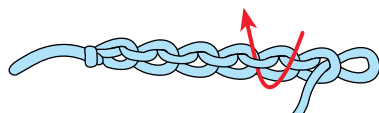
Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

BLANKET

First Pattern

First Side

Row 1 (RS): With aran, ch 154, working in **back bar of ch** (see illustration), sc in back bar of 2nd ch from hook, [dc in next ch, sc in next ch] across, turn. (153 sts)



Back Bar of Chain

Row 2: Ch 3 (see Pattern Notes), [sc in next dc, dc in next sc] across, turn.

Row 3: Ch 1, sc in first st, [dc in next sc, sc in next dc] across, turn. Fasten off.

2nd Side

Row 4: Working on opposite side of starting ch on row 1, working in both rem lps of ch, pull lp of aran through 2 lps, ch 1, sc in first ch, [dc in next ch, sc in next ch] across, turn.

Rows 5 & 6: Rep rows 3 & 4.

2nd Pattern

First Side

Row 1: With RS of First Side facing, pull up lp of white in first sc, ch 1, sc in same st and in each st across, turn.

Rows 2–7: Working in **back lps** (see Stitch Guide), ch 1, sc in each st across, turn. At end of last row, fasten off.

2nd Side

With RS of 2nd Side facing, rep rows 1–7 of 2nd Pattern of First Side.

3rd Pattern

First Side

Row 1: With buff and RS facing, pull up lp in first st on First Pattern of First Side, ch 3, dc in each st across, turn.

Row 2: Ch 1, sc in first st, [ch 1, sk next st, sc in next st] across, turn.

Row 3: Ch 3, [fpdc (see Stitch Guide) around next dc on row before last, sk ch sp behind fpdc, sc in next sc] across. Fasten off.



2nd Side

Rep rows 1–3 of 3rd Pattern First Side on 2nd Side.

Next rows: Rep rows 1–3 of First Pattern twice working row 1 in sts instead of chs on First and 2nd Sides.

Next rows: Rep 2nd and 3rd Patterns on both Sides.

Rep 2 next rows twice for total of 4 patterns on both Sides.

Border

Rnd 1: With RS facing and buff, beg in first sc of last row on either side, work ch 3 and ch 2 or **ch 5** (see *Pattern Notes*) to start, then work 2 dc in same st, [dc in each st across, working (2 dc, ch 2, 2 dc) in last st, work in ends of rows, dc in each row across with dc in center ch, ending with (2 dc, ch 2, 2 dc) in last sc] around, dc in same st as beg ch-3 or ch-5, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) in 3rd ch, **turn**. (119 dc across each short end and 155 dc across each long edge)

Rnd 2: Ch 1, sc in next dc, rep pattern for row 2 of 3rd Pattern all around, working at each corner [ch 1, sk next dc, (sc, ch 2, sc) in corner ch-2 sp], ending with ch 1, sk last dc, join in beg sc, turn.

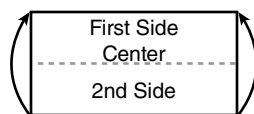
Rnd 3 (RS): Fpdc around dc of rnd 1, *sc in next sc on this rnd, (sc, ch 2, sc) in next ch-2 sp, sc in next sc*, rep row 3 of 3rd Pattern around working between * at each corner, join in beg fpdc, **do not turn**.

Rnd 4: Ch 1, (sc, ch 2, sc) in same fpdc, [sk next sc, (sc, ch 2, sc) in next sc, (sc, ch 3, sc) in corner ch-2 sp, (sc, ch 2, sc) in next sc, sk next sc, (sc, ch 2, sc) in next fpdc], *sk next sc, (sc, ch 2, sc) in next fpdc, around working [sk next sc, (sc, ch 2, sc) in next sc, (sc, ch 3, sc) in corner ch-2 sp, (sc, ch 2, sc) in next sc, sk next sc, (sc, ch 2, sc) in next fpdc] in each corner, ending with sk next sc, join in beg sc. Fasten off.

Lightly block Border only on WS.

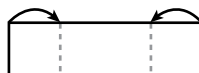

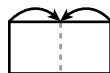

Rows 2–42: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.

Row 43: Ch 1, sc in first st, ch 2, sk next 2 sts (*buttonhole*), sc in each of next 3 sts, ch 2, sk next 2 sts (*buttonhole*), sc in last st, turn.

Row 44: Ch 1, sc in each st across with 2 sc in each ch-2 sp. Fasten off.

2nd Side

Row 1: With RS facing, pull up lp through 2 lps of first ch, ch 1, sc in each ch across, turn.

Rows 2–28: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn. At end of last row, fasten off.

Border

Rnd 1: With RS facing and 1 strand of aran and 1 strand of white held tog, pull up lp in end of center ch, *[ch 2, sk next row, sl st in next row] across** to corner, (sl st, ch 2, sl st) in corner, [ch 2, sk next st, sl st in next st] 3 times, ch 2, sk next st, (sl st, ch 2, sl st) in last st, rep from * around, ending last rep at **, join in base of beg ch-2. Fasten off.

Finishing

Using buff, sew buttons to row 23 of 2nd Side.

Handle

Holding 1 strand aran and 1 strand white tog, work 48 sc around bamboo handle, join in beg sc. Fasten off.

Sew bottom of Handle to under side of Strap between rows 34 and 35 of First Side.

Wrap Strap around folded Blanket and button over folded edges. **C!**

Row 6: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.

Row 7: Ch 1, sc in each of first 8 sts, fptr around center fptr 2 rows below, sk next st on this row behind fptr, [sc in each of next 10 sts, fptr around center fptr 2 rows below, sk

next st on this row behind fptr] across to last 8 sts, sc in each of last 8 sts, turn.

Row 8: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.

Row 9: Rep row 7.

Row 10: Ch 1, sc in each of first 7 sts, **cl** (see *Special Stitch*) in next st, sc in next st, cl in next st, [sc in each of next 8 sts, cl in next st, sc in next st, cl in next st] across to last 7 sts, sc in each of last 7 sts, turn.

Row 11: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.

- Fairfield Processing 18-inch pillow insert
- 1½-inch #2411 black cut-out button from Blumenthal Lansing
- Safety pins



GAUGE

7 hdc = 2 inches; 2 hdc rows = inch

PATTERN NOTES

Chain-3 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

PILLOW

Square

Make 1 each burgundy for front & grey heather for back.

Getting started: With grey heather, make back first.

Row 1: Ch 62, dc in 4th ch from hook (*first 2 chs count as first dc*), dc in each ch across, turn. (60 dc)

Rows 2–34: Ch 3 (*see Pattern Notes*), dc in each st across, turn. At end of last row on back, fasten off. At end of last row on front, turn.

Joining rnd: To evenly sp sts of joining rnd, use safety pins to mark 15th dc, 30th dc and 45th dc at top of row 34 and 15th ch, 39th ch and 45th ch at bottom edge of row 1 of each Square, place back Square behind front Square having its pins at ends of row (*sides*) of front Square, keeping pins in same spot, insert pins through both layers to mark st count placement, working through both

thicknesses, ch 1, *evenly sp 15 sc across to first pin, repin safety pin in last st just worked, [evenly sp 15 sc across to next pin, repin safety pin to last st worked] twice, evenly sp 15 sc across to first corner, 2 sc in same st for corner, rep from * 3 times inserting pillow insert before closing, **join** (*see Pattern Notes*) in beg sc. Fasten off. (248 sc total)

Leave safety pins until final assembly.

Triangle

Make 4.

Row 1: With grey heather, ch 35, dc in 4th ch from hook (*first 3 chs count as first dc*) and in each ch across, turn. (33 dc)

12 sts = 4 inches; 10 rows = 4 inches

PATTERN NOTES

Chain-4 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet and chain-1 unless otherwise stated.

Chain-5 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet and chain-2 unless otherwise stated.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

SPECIAL STITCH

Cluster (cl): Holding back last lp of each st on hook, 4 dc as indicated in instructions, yo, pull through all lps on hook.

SCARF

Row 1: Ch 154 [194, 218, 250], sc in 2nd ch from hook and in each ch across, turn. (153 [193, 217, 249] sc)

Row 2: Ch 4 (see *Pattern Notes*), *sk next st, cl (see *Special Stitch*) in next st, ch 1, sk next st, dc in next st**, ch 1, rep from * across, ending last rep at **, turn.

Row 3: Ch 1, sc in each st and in each ch sp across, turn. (153 [193, 217, 249] sc)

Row 4: Ch 1, sc in each of first 3 sts, *ch 5, sk next 3 sts**, sc in each of next 5 sts, rep from * across, ending last rep at **, sc in each of last 3 sts, turn.

Row 5: Ch 1, sc in each of first 2 sts, *ch 3, sc in next ch-5 sp, ch 3, sk next st**, sc in each of next 3 sts, sk next st, rep from * across, ending last rep at **, sc in each of last 2 sts, turn.

Row 6: Ch 1, sc in first st, *ch 3, sc in next ch-3 sp, sc in next st, sc in next ch-3 sp, ch 3, sk next st, sc in next st, rep from * across, turn.

Row 7: Ch 5 (see *Pattern Notes*), *sc in next ch-3 sp, sc in each of next 3 sts, sc in next ch-3 sp**, ch 5, sk next st, rep from * across, ending last rep at **, ch 2, dc in last st, turn.

Row 8: Ch 1, sc in first st, *ch 3, sk next st, sc in each of next 3 sts, ch 3, sk next st**, sc in next ch-5 sp, rep from * around, ending last rep at **, sc in last st, turn.

Row 9: Ch 1, sc in first st, sc in next ch-3 sp, *ch 3, sk next st, sc in next st, ch 3, sk next st, sc in next ch-3 sp**, sc in next st, sc in next ch-3 sp, rep from * across, ending last rep at **, sc in last st, turn.

Row 10: Ch 1, sc in each of first 2 sts, sc in next ch-3 sp, *ch 3, sk next st, sc in next ch-3 sp**, sc in each of next 3 sts, sc in next ch sp, rep from * across, ending last rep at **, sc in each of last 2 sts, turn.

Row 11: Ch 1, sc in each of first 3 sts, *3 sc in next ch sp**, sc in each of next 5 sts, rep from *, ending last rep at **, sc in each of last 3 sts, turn. (153 [193, 217, 249] sc)

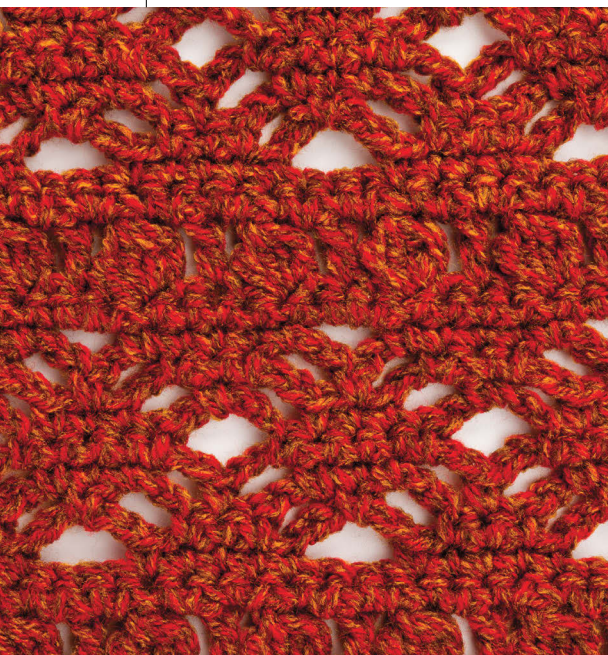
Next rows: [Rep rows 2–11 consecutively] 4 times, then rep rows 2 and 3 once. At end of last row, **do not fasten off**.

Edging rnd: Ch 1, sc in each st across, sc in corner, working in ends of rows, evenly sp 55 sc across end, sc in corner, working in starting ch on opposite side of row 1, sc in each ch across, sc in corner, evenly sp 55 sc in ends of rows, sc in corner, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) in beg sc. Fasten off.

Fringe

Cut 2 strands each 13 inches in length. Fold strands in half, pull fold through st, pull ends through fold. Pull to tighten.

Fringe in every other st across each short end. **C!**

Make 2

Paw Pad

Rnds 1–3: Rep rnds 1–3 of Large Paw Pad. (22 sc at end of last rnd)

Rnd 4: Sc in next st, 2 sc in each of next 2 sts, sc in each of next 2 sts, 2 sc in each of next 2 sts, sc in next st, sl st in next st, leaving rem sts unworked, drop lp from hook. (12 sc)

Paw Pad Insert

Make same as for Large Paw Pad Insert.

Paw

Rnd 1 (WS): Pick up dropped lp on Paw Pad, turn so WS is facing, ch 1, sc in each st around rnd 4 and unworked sts on rnd 3, **do not join**. (26 sc)

Rnd 2: Sc in each st around.

Rnd 3: Sc in each of first 3 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of next 2 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of next 11 sts, place marker in last st for beg of arm, sc in each of last 6 sts, turn. (24 sc)

Rnd 4: Sc in each of first 2 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of next 2 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of next 2 sts, leaving rem sts unworked, turn. (8 sc)

Rnd 5 (RS): Ch 1, sc in each of first 2 sts, sc dec in next 4 sts, sc in each of last 2 sts. Leaving long end for sewing, fasten off. (5 sc)

Fold rnd 5 in half so that first and last sts are touching, then sew Top of Paw closed.

With black, using straight stitch (see illustration on page 13), embroider paw print on bottom of Paw Pad as shown in photo.

Place Paw Pad Insert inside Paw.

Arm

Rnd 1 (WS): With inside of Paw facing, insert hook in marked st on rnd 3 of Paw, ch 1, sc in each of the 7 sts before Top of Paw, evenly sp 5 sc across Top of Paw, sc in each of the next 7 sts, **do not join**. (19 sc)

Rnd 2: Sc in each of first 8 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of last 9 sts. (18 sc)

Rnd 3: Sc in each of first 8 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of last 8 sts. (17 sc)

Rnd 4: Sc in each st around.

Rnds 5–15: [Rep rnd 4] 11 times.

After last rnd, drop lp from hook, stuff Arm with fiberfill to desired softness.

Rnd 16: Pick up dropped lp, sc in next st, [sc dec in next 2 sts] twice, sc in each of last 12 sts. (15 sc)

Rnd 17: [Sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in next st] 5 times. (10 sc)

Rnd 18: [Sc dec in next 2 sts] around. Leaving long end for sewing, fasten off. (5 sc)

Weave end through each st on last rnd, pull tight to close.

Place Arm on Body so that top of Arm is at marked st on rnd 30 of Body or place in desired location. Sew inner side of Arm rnds 16–18 to side of Body.

Tail

Rnd 1 (RS): Ch 1, 6 sc in back bar of ch, **do not join**. (6 sc)

Rnd 2: 2 sc in each st around. (12 sc)

Rnd 3: Sc in each st around.

Rnd 4: Sc in each st around, join in beg sc. Leaving long end for sewing, fasten off.

Place Tail on Body so that top of Tail is at marked st on rnd 9 of Body or in desired location, then sew in place. **C!**

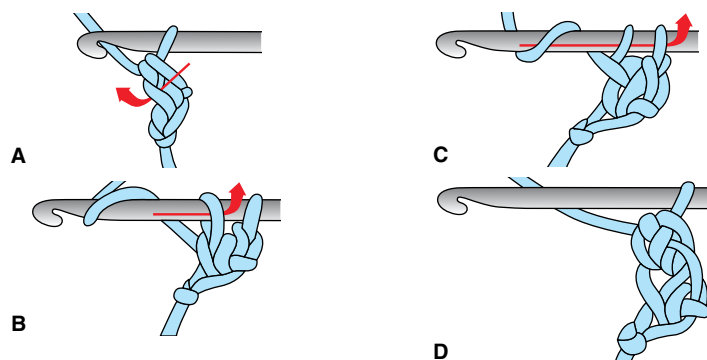

(47 [50, 55, 58, 63, 66] V-sts)

Row 22: Ch 1, sc in first st, V-st in ch sp of each of next 12 [12, 13, 13, 14, 14] V-sts, double V-st in next st, V-st in ch sp of each of next 27 [30, 33, 36, 39, 42] V-sts, double V-st in next st, V-st in ch sp of each of last 12 [12, 13, 13, 14, 14] V-sts, sc in last st, turn. (51 [54, 59, 62, 67, 70] V-sts)

Row 30: Rep row 24.

Row 31: Ch 1, sc in first st, V-st in ch sp of each of next 10 [10, 11, 11, 12, 12] V-sts, half V-st in ch sp of next half V-st, sc in 2nd ch of turning ch-2, turn.

Row 32: Rep row 26.

Row 33: Ch 1, sc in first st, V-st in ch sp of each of next 10 [10, 11, 11, 12, 12] V-sts, sc in each of last 2 sc, turn.

Row 34: Rep row 28.

Row 35: Ch 1, sc in first st, V-st in ch sp of each of next 10 [10, 11, 11, 12, 12] V-sts, sc in last sc, turn.

Row 36: Rep row 24.

Row 37: Ch 1, sc in first st, V-st in ch sp of each of next 9 [9, 10, 10, 11, 11] V-sts, half V-st in ch sp of next half V-st, sc in 2nd ch of turning ch-2, turn.

Row 38: Rep row 26.

Row 39: With size G hook, sc in each sc and ch-2 sp across, turn.

Row 40 (RS): Working in **back lps** (see *Stitch Guide*), ch 1, sl st in each st across. Fasten off.

Front Continued

Row 23: Continuing on row 23 of Side, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) in marked sc of double V-st adjacent to Arm just completed, V-st in next ch-2 sp, V-st in ch sp of each of next 27 [30, 33, 36, 39, 42] V-sts, V-st in last ch-2 sp before next marked sc, sc in marked sc, leaving rem sts unworked, turn. (29 [32, 35, 38, 41, 44] V-sts)

Rows 24–70: Ch 1, sc in first st, V-st in ch sp of each V-st across, sc in last sc, turn. At end of last row, fasten off.

Complete 2nd Arm

Row 23: Continuing on row 23 of Side, join in next ch-2 sp after marked sc used for last st of Front, ch 2, sk next sc, half V-st in ch sp of next V-st, V-st in ch sp of each V-st across, ending with sc in last sc, turn.

Row 24: Ch 1, sc in first st, V-st in ch sp of each of next 11 [11, 12, 12, 13, 13] V-sts, half V-st in ch sp of next half V-st, sc in 2nd ch of turning ch, turn.

Row 25: Ch 1, sk first st, sc in next st, sk next ch-1, sc in next st, V-st in ch sp of each V-st across, ending with sc in last st, turn.

Row 26: Ch 1, sc in first st, V-st in ch sp of each of next 11 [11, 12, 12, 13, 13] V-sts, sc in each of last 2 sc, turn.

Row 27: Ch 1, sk first st, sc in next st, V-st in ch sp of each V-st across, ending with sc in last st, turn.

Row 28: Ch 1, sc in first st, V-st in ch sp of each of next 11 [11, 12, 12, 13, 13] V-sts, sc in last sc, turn.

Row 29: Ch 2, sk first st, half V-st in ch sp of next V-st, V-st in ch sp of each V-st across, sc in last st, turn.

Row 30: Ch 1, sc in first st, V-st in ch sp of each of next 10 [10, 11, 11, 12, 12] V-sts, half V-st in ch sp of next half V-st, sc in 2nd ch of turn ch-2, turn.

Row 31: Rep row 25.

Row 32: Ch 1, sc in first st, V-st in ch sp of each of next 10 [10, 11, 11, 12, 12] V-sts, sc in each of last 2 sc, turn.



Row 33: Rep row 27.

Row 34: Ch 1, sc in first st, V-st in ch sp of each of next 10 [10, 11, 11, 12, 12] V-sts, sc in last sc, turn.

Row 35: Rep row 29.

Row 36: Ch 1, sc in first st, V-st in ch sp of each of next 9 [9, 10, 10, 11, 11] V-sts, half V-st in ch sp of next half V-st, sc in 2nd ch of turn ch-2, turn.

Row 37: Rep row 25.

Row 38: Ch 1, sc in first st, V-st in ch sp of each of next 9 [9, 10, 10, 11, 11] V-sts, sc in each of last 2 sc, turn.

Row 39: With size G hook, sc in each sc and ch-2 sp across, turn.

Row 40 (RS): Working in back lps, ch 1, sl st in each st across. Fasten off.

Placket

Row 1: Working in ends of rows, join to shoulder edge of 1 Arm, ch 1, sc in same row, evenly sp 49 sc across ends of rows, turn. (50 sc)

Rows 2–6: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.

Row 7: Working in back lps, ch 1, sl st in each st across. Fasten off.

Rep for rem Arm.

Assembly

Sew Side pieces tog at side edges and underarms.

Sew shoulders tog at shoulder edges, ignoring the Placket so it is free and only attached with sc row.

Bottom Edging

Rnd 1: With size G hook and WS facing, join with sc in side seam at bottom edge, sc in each st and in each ch sp around, join in beg sc, turn.

Rnd 2: Working in back lps, ch 1, sl st in each st around, join in beg sl st. Fasten off.

Collar

Rnd 1: With WS facing and size G hook, join with sc in any st around top of garment, mark st, sc in each st around, working through both thicknesses when working over Plackets, **do not join**.

Rnd 2: Working in back lps, sc in each st around.

Rnds 3–32: Working in back lps, sc in each st around, working 2 incs by working 2 sc in one st randomly sp, try not to place incs directly over increases on last rnd.

Rnd 33: Working in back lps, sl st in each st around, join in beg sl st. Fasten off.

Finishing

Sew 4 buttons evenly sp through all layers on each Placket and Arm as shown in photo. **CI**

BODY PATTERN

Multiple of any number of even sts.

Row 1: Ch 1, sc in first st, dc in next st, [sc in next st, dc in next st] across, turn.

Row 2: Ch 1, sc in first dc, dc in next sc, [sc in next dc, dc in next sc] across, turn.

Rep row 2 for pattern.

RIBBING

Multiple of any number of sts.

Row 1: Ch 1, sc in first st, working in **back lps** (see *Stitch Guide*), sc in each st across to last st, sc in both lps of last st, turn.

Rep row 1 for pattern.

TUNIC

Front

Ribbing

Row 1: With **size E hook** (see *Pattern Notes*), work **first foundation sc** (see *Special Stitches*), 34 **next foundation sc** (see *Special Stitches*), turn. (35 sc)

Rows 2–86 [2–96, 2–106, 2–115, 2–125, 2–134, 2–144]: Work Ribbing, at end of last row, **do not fasten off**.

Body

Row 1: With **size F hook** (see *Pattern Notes*), turn to work in ends of Ribbing rows, ch 1, evenly sp 78 [86, 94, 102, 112, 120, 128] sc across, turn.

Next rows: Work in Body Pattern until piece measures 19 [19, 19½, 20, 20, 20, 20½] inches from edge of Ribbing.

First Shoulder Shaping

Row 1: Work in Body Pattern across each of first 33 [37, 40, 44, 47, 51, 54] sts, leaving rem sts unworked, turn.

Rows 2–14 [2–14, 2–15, 2–15, 2–16, 2–17, 2–17]: Work in established pattern and dec 1 st at neck edge ear row. (20 [24, 26, 30, 32, 35, 38] sts at end of last row)

Next rows: Work in established pattern until piece measures 23 [23, 23½, 24½, 24½, 25, 25½] inches from edge of Ribbing.

2nd Shoulder Shaping

Row 1: Sk center 12 [12, 14, 14, 18, 18, 20] sts at front neck, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) in next st, working first st in same st as joining, work in pattern across, turn. (33 [37, 40, 44, 47, 51, 54] sts)



Rows 2–14 [2–14, 2–15, 2–15, 2–16, 2–17, 2–17]: Work in established pattern and dec 1 st at neck edge ear row. (20 [24, 26, 30, 32, 35, 38] sts at end of last row)

Next rows: Work in established pattern until piece measures 23 [23, 23½, 24½, 24½, 25, 25½] inches from edge of Ribbing.

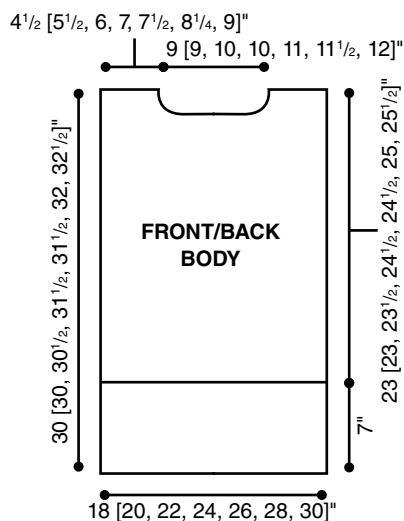


Back

Ribbing

Row 1: With size E hook, work first foundation sc, 34 next foundation sc, turn. (35 sc)

Rows 2–86 [2–96, 2–106, 2–115, 2–125, 2–134, 2–144]: Work Ribbing, at end of last row, **do not fasten off**.



Body

Row 1: With size F hook, turn to work in ends of Ribbing rows, ch 1, evenly sp 78 [86, 94, 102, 112, 120, 128] sc across, turn.

Next rows: Work in Body Pattern until piece measures 23 [23, 23 1/2, 24 1/2, 24 1/2, 25, 25 1/2] inches from edge of Ribbing. At end of last row, fasten off.

Sleeve

Make 2.

Ribbing

Row 1: With size E hook, work first foundation sc, 37 [37, 38, 38, 39, 39, 40] next foundation sc, turn. (38 [38, 39, 39, 40, 40, 41] sc)

Rows 2–50 [2–55, 2–62, 2–72, 2–74, 2–79, 2–84]: Work Ribbing, at end of last row, **do not fasten off**.

Body

Row 1: With size F hook, turn to work in ends of Ribbing rows, ch 1, evenly sp 46 [50, 56, 64, 66, 70, 74] sc across, turn.

Row 2: Ch 1, 2 sc in first st, dc in next sc, work in established pattern across, turn. (47 [51, 57, 65, 67, 71, 75] sts)

Row 3: Ch 1, 2 sc in first st, dc in next sc, work in established pattern across to last sc, dc in last sc, turn. (48 [52, 58, 66, 68, 72, 76] sts)

Row 4: Ch 1, (sc, dc) in first st, sc in next dc, work in established pattern across to last sc, dc in last sc, turn. (49 [53, 59, 67, 69, 73, 77] sts)

Row 5: Ch 1, (sc, dc) in first st, sc in next dc, work in established pattern across, turn. (50 [54, 60, 68, 70, 74, 78] sts)

Rows 6–25 [6–23, 6–22, 6–19, 6–21, 6–21, 6–21]: [Rep 2–5 consecutively] 5 [5, 5, 4, 4, 4, 4] times, ending last rep with row 5 [3, 2, 3, 5, 5, 5]. (70 [72, 77, 82, 86, 90, 94] sts at end of last row)

Next rows: Continue to work in established pattern until piece measures 9 1/2 [9 1/2, 9 3/4, 9 3/4, 10, 10, 10 1/4] inches from edge of Ribbing. At end of last row, fasten off.

Block Front and Back pieces to schematic measurements.

Sew shoulder seams.

Cowl Collar

Rnd 1: With RS facing with size F hook, join at shoulder seam, evenly sp 128 [128, 132, 132, 132, 138, 138] around neckline, join in beg sc, turn.

Next rows: Work in Body Pattern until Cowl Collar measures 9 inches. At end of last rnd, fasten off.

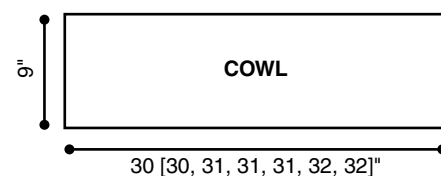
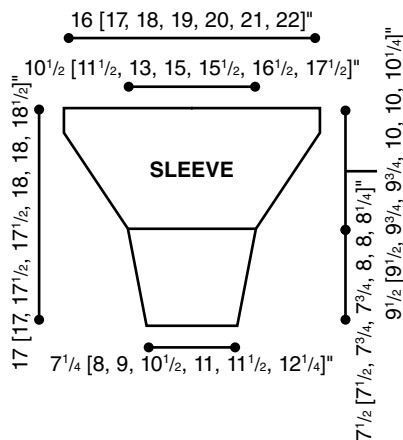
Assembly

Leaving 8 [8 1/2, 9, 9 1/2, 10, 10 1/2, 11] inches unsewn for armholes, sew side seams.

Block Sleeves to schematic measurements.

Sew Sleeves in armholes.

Block Cowl Collar to schematic measurements. **C!**

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

SPECIAL STITCHES

Puff stitch (puff st): (Yo, pull up lp) 5 times in next st, yo, pull through 10 lps on hook, yo, pull through 2 lps on hook.

Picot: (Sl st, ch 7, sl st) as indicated in instructions.

STITCH PATTERNS

Body Pattern

(Center panel worked over 19 sts)

Row 1 (WS): Ch 1, sc in each of first 27 [31, 35, 39, 44, 48] sts, [dc in next st, sc in each of next 5 sts] 3 times, dc in next st, sc in each st across, turn.

Row 2 (RS): Ch 1, sc in each of first 27 [31, 35, 39, 44, 48] sts, [fpdc (see *Stitch Guide*) around next dc, **sk next st on working row behind fpdc** (see *Pattern Notes*), sc in each of next 5 sts] 3 times, fpdc around next dc, sc in each st across, turn.

Row 3: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.

Row 4: Ch 1, sc in each sc across, working fpdc around each of 4 fpdc on row before last, turn.

Row 5: Rep row 3.

Row 6: Rep row 4.

Row 7: Ch 1, sc in each of first 27 [31, 35, 39, 44, 48] sts, [puff st (see *Special Stitches*) in top of next fpdc, sc in each of next 5 sts] 3 times, puff st in next fpdc, sc in each st across, turn.

Row 8: Ch 1, sc in each st across working sc in each puff st, turn.

Rep rows 1–8 for Body Pattern.

Sleeve Pattern

(Center panel worked over 7 sts)

Row 1 (RS): Ch 1, sc in each st across, working fpdc around each of 2 dc, turn.

Row 2: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.

Row 3: Ch 1, sc in each st across, work fpdc around each fpdc, turn.

Row 4: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.

Row 5: Rep row 3.

Row 6: Ch 1, sc in each st across working puff st in each fpdc, turn.

Row 7: Ch 1, sc in each st across working sc in each puff st, turn.

Row 8: Ch 1, sc in each of next 17 [17, 18, 19, 20, 22] sts, dc in next st, sc in each of next 5 sts, dc in next st, sc in each st across, turn.

As you add sts the number of sc on each side of Center Panel will inc.

Rep rows 1–8 for Sleeve Pattern.

PULLOVER

Back

Row 1: Ch 74 [82, 90, 98, 108, 116], sc in 2nd ch from hook and in each ch across, turn. (73 [81, 89, 97, 107, 115] sc)

Row 2: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.

Next rows: Rep row 2 until piece measures 7 inches from beg, ending on RS.

Next rows: Work Body Pattern until piece measures 17 inches from beg.

Armhole Shaping

Next row: Sl st in each of first 4 [5, 6, 7, 8, 9] sts, work in established pattern across, leaving last 4 [5, 6, 7, 8, 9] sts unworked, turn. (65 [71, 77, 83, 91, 97] sts)

Next rows: Work in established pattern and **at same time**, dec 1 st each edge every row 6 [7, 8, 9, 11, 12] times. (53 [57, 61, 65, 69, 73] sts at end of last row)

Next rows: Work even in established pattern until piece measures 24½ [25, 25½, 26, 26½, 27] inches from beg, ending with RS row. At end of last row, fasten off.

Front

Work same as for Back until piece measures 20½ [21, 21½, 22, 22½, 23] inches from beg, ending with WS row.

Neck Shaping

Right Shoulder

Next row: Ch 1, sc in each of first 14 [16, 18, 18, 20, 22] sts, leaving rem sts unworked, turn.



Next rows: Work established pattern and **at same time**, dec 1 st at neck edge every row 5 times. (9 [11, 13, 13, 15, 17] sts at end of last row)

Next rows: Work even in established pattern until piece measures same as Back, ending with RS row. At end of last row, fasten off.

Left Shoulder

Next row: With WS facing, sk center 25 [25, 25, 29, 29, 29] sts, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) in next st, sc in 14 [16, 18, 18, 20, 22] sts, turn.

Next rows: Complete same as Right Shoulder.

Sleeve

Make 2.

Row 1: Ch 40 [40, 42, 44, 46, 50], sc in 2nd ch from hook and in each of next 15 [15, 16, 17, 18, 20] chs, dc in next ch, sc in each of next 5 chs, dc in next ch, sc in each of last 16 [16, 17, 18, 19, 21] chs, turn. (39 [39, 41, 43, 45, 49] sts)

Rows 2–7: Work 6 rows of Sleeve Pattern.

Next row: Ch 1, 2 sc in first st, work in established pattern, ending with 2 sc in last st, turn.

Next rows: Work 7 rows even.

Next rows: [Rep last 8 rows consecutively] 6 [8, 7, 4, 1, 1] time(s). (53 [57, 57, 53, 49, 53] sts at end of last row)

Next row: Ch 1, 2 sc in first st, work in established pattern, ending with 2 sc in last st, turn.

Next rows: Work 5 rows even.

Next rows: [Rep last 6 rows] 0 [0, 1, 5, 9, 9] time(s). (53 [57, 61, 65, 69, 73] sts at end of last row)

Next rows: Work even in pattern until piece measures 17 inches from beg.

Sleeve Cap Shaping

Next row: Sl st in each of first 4 [5, 6, 7, 8, 9] sts, work established pattern across, leaving last 4 [5, 6, 7, 8, 9] sts unworked, turn. (45 [47, 49, 51, 53, 55] sts)

Next rows: Work in established pattern and **at same time**, dec 1 st each edge every RS row 13 [14, 15, 16, 17, 18] times. (19 sts on all sizes at end of last row)

Next rows: Work in established pattern and **at same time**, dec 1 st each edge every row for 3 times, ending with RS row. At end of last row, fasten off. (13 sts on all sizes at end of last row)

Finishing

Neck Trim

Getting started: Sew shoulder seams.

Rnd 1: With RS facing, join at right shoulder, evenly sp 25 [25, 25, 29, 29, 29] sc along back neck, 26 sc along side of neck, 25 [25, 25, 29, 29, 29] sc along front neck and 26 along side of neck, join in beg sc, **turn**. (102 [102, 102, 110, 110, 110] sc)

Rnd 2: With WS facing, sl st in same sc as joining, [picot (see *Special Stitches*) in next sc, sl st in next sc] around, ending with picot in last sc. Fasten off.

Sleeve Trim

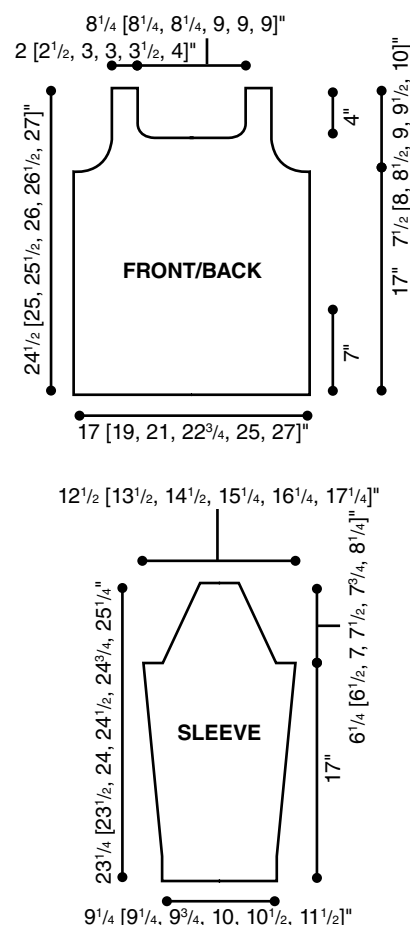
Getting started: Fold 1 Sleeve in half lengthwise, place fold at shoulder seam. Sew in place. Rep with rem Sleeve. Sew side and Sleeve seams, leaving 8 inches along sides edges unsewn for slits.

Rnd 1: With RS facing, join at seam, evenly sp 38 [38, 40, 42, 44, 48] sc around, join in beg sc, turn.

Rnd 2: With WS facing, sl st in same sc as joining, [picot in next sc, sl st in next sc] around, ending with picot in last sc. Fasten off.

Lower Body Trim

With RS facing, beg along back, evenly sp sl st across each piece and around slits on each side, join in beg sl st. Fasten off. **C**

Lower Right Front Shaping

Row 100 [104, 114, 124, 140, 144]: Rep row 2.

Row 101 [105, 115, 125, 141, 145]: Ch 1, sc in each st across to last st, leaving last st unworked, turn. (54 sc)

Rows 102–107 [106–111, 116–121, 126–131, 142–147, 146–151]: *Rep rows 2 and 101 [2 and 105, 2 and 115, 2 and 125, 2 and 141, 2 and 145], rep from * twice.

Row 108 [112, 122, 132, 148, 152]: Rep row 2.

Row 109 [113, 123, 133, 149, 153]: Work in front lps, ch 1, sc in each st across to last 2 sts, **sc dec** (see *Stitch Guide*) in last 2 sts, turn.

Row 110 [114, 124, 134, 150, 154]: Ch 3, dc in next st, **dc dec** (see *Stitch Guide*) in next 2 sts, dc in each st across, turn.

Rows 111–120 [115–124, 125–134, 135–144, 151–160, 155–164]: [Rep last 2 rows alternately] 5 times, place marker in end of row 119 [123, 133, 143, 159, 163] for Upper Front.

Row 121 [125, 135, 145, 161, 165]: Ch 1, sc dec in first 2 sts, sc in each st across to last 3 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, leaving last st unworked, turn.

Row 122 [126, 136, 146, 162, 166]: Ch 3, dc in next st, dc dec in next 2 sts, dc in each st across to last 2 sts, dc dec in last 2 sts, turn.

Row 123 [127, 137, 147, 163, 167]: Ch 1, sc dec in first 2 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each st across to last 3 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, leaving last st unworked, turn.

Next rows: [Rep last 3 rows] 3 times.

Buttonhole

Ch 4, sl st in last st. Fasten off.

Upper Body

Row 1: With RS facing, evenly and loosely work 150 [168, 182, 200, 225, 233] sl sts across top of Lower Body between markers, turn.

Row 2: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.

Row 3: Ch 3, dc dec in next 2 sts, dc in each st across to last 3 sts, dc dec in next 2 sts, dc in last st, turn.

Row 4: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.

Rows 5–14 [5–14, 5–14, 5–18, 5–18, 5–18]: [Rep rows 3 and 4 alternately] 5 times.

Row 15 [15, 15, 19, 19, 19]: Rep row 3.

Left Front Sleeve Shaping

Row 16 [16, 16, 20, 20, 20]: Ch 1, sc in each st across, insert hook 20 [20, 25, 25, 30, 30] next foundation sc, turn.

Row 17 [17, 17, 21, 21, 21]: Ch 3, dc in each st across to last 3 sts, dc dec in next 2 sts, dc in last st, turn.

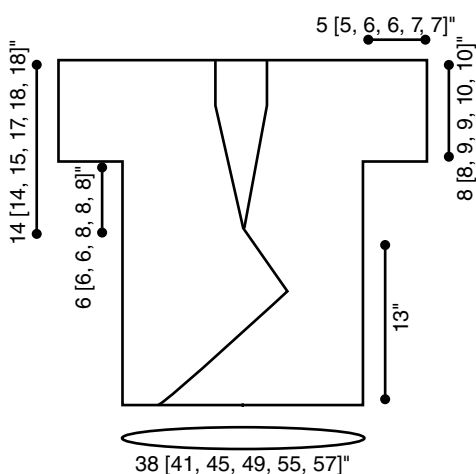
Row 18 [18, 18, 22, 22, 22]: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.

Rows 19–28 [19–28, 19–28, 23–32, 23–32, 23–32]: [Rep last 2 rows alternately] 5 times.

Row 29 [29, 29, 33, 33, 33]: Ch 3, dc in each st across, turn.

Row 30 [30, 30, 34, 34, 34]: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.

Rows 31–36 [31–36, 31–38, 34–38, 34–40, 34–40]: [Rep last 2 rows alternately] 3 [3, 4, 4, 5, 5] times.



Row 37 [37, 39, 39, 41, 41]: Rep row 29 [29, 29, 33, 33, 33]. Fasten off.

Back

Row 16 [16, 16, 20, 20, 20]: First foundation sc, 19 [10, 24, 24, 29, 29] next foundation sc, with WS facing, sc in marked st of Upper Body, sc in each of next 74 [84, 90, 100, 113, 117] sts, 20 [20, 25, 25, 30, 30] foundation sc, turn.

Row 17 [17, 17, 21, 21, 21]: Ch 3, dc in each st across, turn.

Row 18 [18, 18, 22, 22, 22]: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.

Row 19–36 [19–36, 19–38, 23–38, 23–40, 23–40]: [Rep last 2 rows alternately] 9 [9, 10, 10, 12, 12] times.

Row 37 [37, 39, 39, 41, 41]: Rep row 17 [17, 17, 21, 21, 21]. Fasten off.

Right Front Sleeve Shaping

Row 16 [16, 16, 20, 20, 20]: First foundation sc, 19 [19, 24, 24, 29, 29] next foundation sc, with WS facing, sc in next st of last row of Upper Body, sc in each st across, turn.

Row 17 [17, 17, 21, 21, 21]: Ch 3, dc dec in next 2 sts, dc in each st across, turn

Row 18 [18, 18, 22, 22, 22]: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.

Rows 19–28 [19–28, 19–28, 23–32, 23–32, 23–32]: [Rep last 2 rows alternately] 5 times.

Rows 29–37 [29–37, 29–39, 33–39, 33–41, 33]: Rep rows 29–37 [29–37, 29–39, 33–39, 33–41, 33] of Left Front Sleeve Shaping.

Belt

Row 1 (RS): First foundation sc, 169 [183, 199, 215, 241, 249] next foundation sc, turn. (170 [184, 200, 216, 242, 250] sc)

Rows 2–4: Working in both lps, ch 3, dc in each st across, turn.

Row 5: Working in both lps, ch 1, sc in each st across, **do not turn**.

Edging

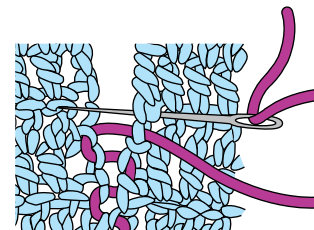
With RS facing, working in ends of rows across short edge, evenly sp sl st across, working in front lps, sl st in each st across opposite side of foundation sc, working in ends of rows across short edge, evenly sp sl st across, working front lps, sl st in each st across, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) in beg sl st. Leaving 12-inch end, fasten off.

Buckle

With RS facing, fold Belt over inner buckle bar, overlapping 2 inches, using 12-inch end, sew in place.

Finishing

With RS tog, using **invisible seam** (see *illustration*), sew shoulder and side seams.

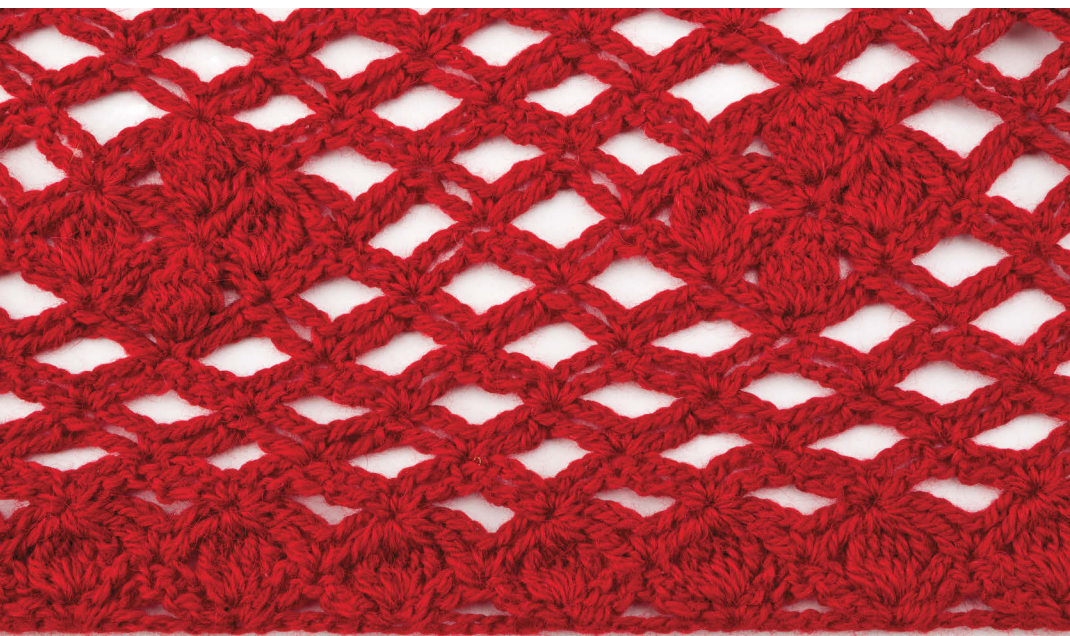

Rnd 1: Now working in rnds, ch 1, sc in same sc as joining, cl across to ch-28, [work first leg of cl, sk next 5 chs, work 2nd leg in next ch] 4 times, **end cl** (see *Special Stitches*). Place 2nd marker in 3rd cl of last 5 cls made to mark center front. (24 [28, 32, 36, 40] cls)

Rnd 2: Ch 1, sc in first st, cl around, working last cl as end cl.

Rnds 3 & 4: Rep rnd 2. At end of rnd 4, **turn**.

Rnd 5: Ch 1, sc in first st, bobble cl, *cl 3 times**, bobble cl, rep from * around, ending last rep at **, **end bobble cl** (see *Special Stitches*). **Turn**.

Rnd 6: Ch 1, sc in first st, [cl twice, bobble cl twice] 5 [6, 7, 8, 9] times, cl twice, bobble cl, end bobble cl. **Turn**.

Rnd 7: Rep rnd 5.

Rnds 8–11: Rep rnd 2.

Rnd 12: Ch 1, sc in first st, bobble cl around, working last bobble cl as end bobble cl.

Turn.

Rnds 13–17: Rep rnd 2. At end of last rnd, fasten off.

Divide for Front & Back

Move center front marker up to top of corresponding cl on last rnd. Mark top of 6th [7th, 8th, 9th, 10th] cl to right of center front cl

and mark top of 5th [6th, 7th, 8th, 9th] cl to left.

Front Yoke Shaping

Row 18: With RS facing, join with sc in first marked cl, cl 10 [12, 14, 16, 18] times, end cl, turn, leaving rem cls unworked. (11 [13, 15, 17, 19] cls)

Sizes Small, Medium & Large Only

Row 19: Ch 1, sc in first st, cl 10 [12, 14] times, turn.

Row 20: Beg half cl, cl across, end half cl, turn.

Rows 21–24: [Rep rows 19 and 20 alternately] twice.

Continue with All Sizes.

Size Large Only

Row [25]: Ch 1, sc in first st, cl across, turn.

Row [26]: Beg half cl, cl across, end half cl, turn.

Continue with All Sizes.

Sizes X-Large & 2X-Large Only

Row [19]: Ch 1, sc in first st, cl [14, 16] times, end cl, turn.

Row [20]: Beg half cl across, end half cl, turn.

Rows [21–26, 21–28]: Rep rows [19 and 20 alternately] 3 [4] times.

All Sizes

First Shoulder Shaping

Row 25 [25, 27, 27, 29]: Ch 1, sc in first st, cl 3 [3, 4, 4, 4] times, end cl, turn.

Row 26 [26, 28, 28, 30]: Ch 1, sc in first st, cl 3 [3, 4, 4, 4] times, half cl, turn.

Row 27 [27, 29, 29, 31]: Ch 1, sc in first st, cl 2 [2, 3, 3, 3] times, end cl, turn.

Row 28 [28, 30, 30, 32]: Ch 1, sc in first st, cl 2 [2, 3, 3, 3] times, half cl, turn.

Row 29 [29, 31, 31, 33]: Rep last row.

Row 30 [30, 32, 32, 34]: Ch 1, sc in first st, [ch 5, sc in top of next cl] 2 [2, 3, 4, 4] times, ch 2, tr in last sc, turn.

Row 31 [31, 33, 33, 35]: Ch 1, sc in first st, 2 sc in next ch-2 sp, sc in next sc, [5 sc in next ch-5 sp, sc in next st] 2 [2, 3, 4, 4] times. Fasten off.

2nd Shoulder Shaping

With RS facing, join in first st of last row before First Shoulder Shaping and work same as First Shoulder Shaping.

Back Yoke Shaping

With RS facing, join in center of cl to left of right-hand marker.

Rows 18–24 [18–24, 18–26, 18–26, 18–28]: Rep rows 18–24 [18–24, 18–26, 18–26, 18–28] of Front Yoke Shaping.

Row 25 [25, 27, 27, 29]: Ch 1, sc in first st, cl across, turn.

Row 26 [26, 28, 28, 30]: Half cl, cl across, half cl, turn.

Rows 27 & 28 [27 & 28, 29 & 30, 29 & 30, 31 & 32]: Rep last 2 rows.

First Shoulder Shaping

Row 29 [29, 31, 31, 33]: Ch 1, sc in first st, cl 2 [2, 3, 3, 3] times, end half cl.

Row 30 [30, 32, 32, 34]: Ch 1, sc in first st, [ch 5, sc in next cl] 2 [2, 3, 4, 4] times, ch 2, tr in last sc, turn.

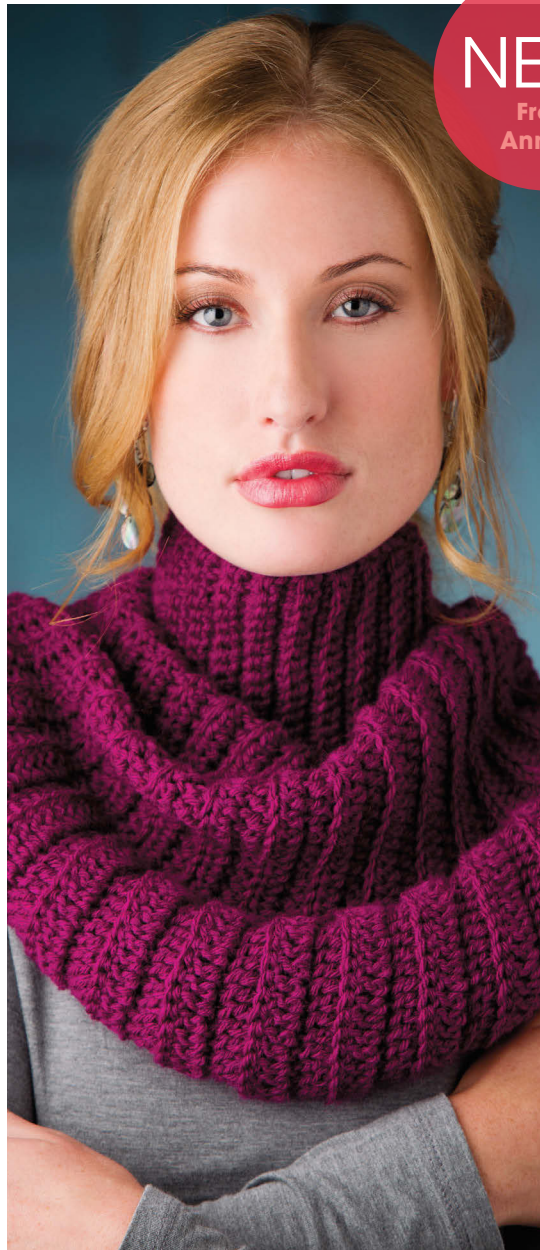
Row 31 [31, 33, 33, 35]: Ch 1, sc in first st,

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AYCACR

2 sc in next ch-2 sp, sc in next sc, [5 sc in next ch-5 sp, sc in next sc] 2 [2, 3, 4, 4] times. Fasten off.

2nd Shoulder Shaping

With RS facing, join in first st of last row before First Shoulder Shaping and work same as First Shoulder Shaping.

Assembly

Sew shoulder seams.

Cowl

Rnd 1: Hold Tunic with RS of Front facing, join with sc in shoulder seam to right, working around neckline, work 1 cl inserting hook in edge of row 2 rows below on Front, sk next row, work 1 cl inserting hook in edge of next row, work 1 cl inserting hook in edge of next row, work 3 (4, 4, 4, 6) cls across Front, work 1 cl inserting hook in edge of next row, sk next row, work 1 cl inserting hook in edge of next row, work 1 cl inserting hook in opposite shoulder seam, working across Back neckline, work 1 cl inserting hook in edge of row 2

rows below, work 4 (6, 6, 6, 8) cls across Back, work 1 cl inserting hook in edge of next row, work end cl inserting hook in shoulder seam. (15 [18, 18, 18, 22] cls)

Rnd 2: Ch 1, sc in first st, cl around, working last cl as end cl.

Rnds 3–5: Rep rnd 2.

Rnd 6: Ch 1, sc in first st, bobble cl around, working last cl as end bobble cl.

Rnds 7–11: Rep rnd 2.

Rnd 12: Rep rnd 6.

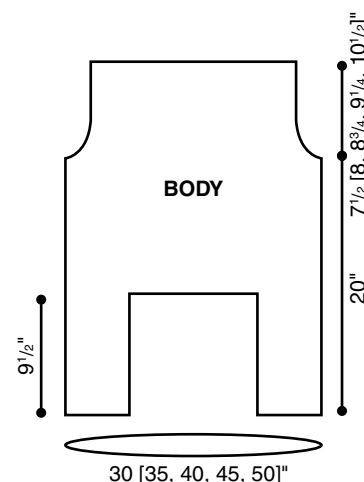
Rnd 13: Ch 1, sc in first st, **large cl** (see *Special Stitches*) around, working last large cl as **end large cl** (see *Special Stitches*).

Rnds 14–17: Rep rnd 13.

Rnd 18: Ch 1, sc in first st, ch 4, holding back last lp of each st on hook, dtr in same sc as sc (*first leg completed*), 5 dtr in next sc, dtr in next large cl, yo, pull through all lps on hook, ch 4, sc in same cl as last dtr made, rep from * around, working last (dtr, tr) in first sc of rnd. Fasten off.

Finishing

Steam garment to flatten bobbles and relax stitches. **C!**

Join to right front corner of garment, ch 1, sc in same st, [2 sc at end of next tr row, sc in connecting lp between 2 tr rows, 2 sc at end of next tr row, sc at end of next hdc row, 2 sc at end of next hdc row] around, ending with 2 sc at left front corner of garment, turn work clockwise to continue down and up front opening, sl st down left side and up right side, easing at bottom of opening, turn work clockwise to continue around neck opening, sl st in beg ch-1, sl st in each sc around, ending with sl st in each of 2 sc at left front corner. Fasten off. **C!**

Row 9 [11, 13, 15, 15, 15]: TKSS in each of first 2 sts, TKS across; return with dec 1 at beg of row, work lps off hook. (47 [49, 49, 47, 50, 56] sts)

Row 10 [12, 14, 16, 16, 16]: TKSS in each of first 2 sts, TKS across (45 [47, 47, 45, 48, 54] lps on hook); return.

Rows 11–14 [13–16, 15–18, 17–20, 17–20, 17–20]: [Rep last 2 rows alternately] twice. (35 [37, 37, 35, 38, 44] sts at end of last row)

Rows 15–17 [17–19, 19–21, 21–23, 21–23, 21–23]: Rep row 9 [11, 13, 15, 15, 15]. (26 [28, 28, 26, 29, 35] sts at end of last row)

Rows 18–20 [20–22, 22–24, 24–26, 24–26, 24–26]: TKSS in each of first 2 sts, TKS in each st across to last 2 sts, leave last 2 sts unworked (14 [16, 16, 14, 17, 23] lps on hook); return. Fasten off.

Tunisian Puff Border

Getting started: Look closely at the top of the Right Front. The top edge will be seamed to the Back shoulder during Finishing. Join now at the top edge of the Right Front, pulling yarn through top of the first st. This row will be worked into all the sts of Right Front, then bottom of Back, then all sts of Left Front. To make this as invisible as possible, here is how to pick up the sts on Right Front:

Remember we left 2 sts unworked at the beg of rows. You will see tops of those 2 unworked sts, and just below that you will see 2 legs of TKS. Insert your hook between these 2 legs to pick up these sts. If you do this carefully, your st count will be correct.

When you reach last row of Front, you will work into each st in that row as you normally work into TKS. When you reach lower section

of rounded edge, insert your hook under 2 lps at the outside edge (*these will not look like TKS sts*). Total picked up around right front: 67 [73, 79, 83, 88, 92] sts.

On the Back, insert hook as in TKS in each of 52 [60, 66, 72, 78, 84] sts, working over the foundation row. Work Left Front in the same way as Right Front.

Row 1: TKS as instructed above (186 [206, 224, 238, 254, 268] lps on hook); return.

Row 2: [TKS in each of next 3 sts, **TKPS** (see *Special Stitches*) in next st] across, ending with TKS in each rem st across; return.

Row 3: TKS across; return.

Row 4: [TKS in next 5 sts, TKPS in next st] across, TKS each rem st across; return.

Row 5: TKS across; return.

Sizes X-Large, 2X-Large, 3X-Large Only

Row [6]: TKS in each of next 2 sts, [TKPS in next st, TKS in each of next 5 sts] across, TKS in each rem st across; return.

Row [7]: TKS across; return.

Size 3X-Large Only

Rows [8 & 9]: Rep rows 4 and 5.

All Sizes

Fasten off.

Finishing

To uncurl edges, wet them thoroughly, then pin flat and let dry.

Sew shoulder seams, easing in any extra fabric on back shoulders.

Use size H hook, adjusting size of sts so edge lies flat. (They can be tighter than you think!)

Work sc edging as follows:

Join at neck edge of shoulder seam on Left Front, ch 1, inserting hook as in TKS, work sc in each st along Left Front, bottom of Back, Right Front, back neckline, join in beg sc. Fasten off.

Right armhole: Join at shoulder seam, ch 1, evenly sp sc around armhole, inserting hook as in TKS on Right Front until shaping rows, then working into sides of sts for rem of armhole, join in beg sc. Fasten off.

Left armhole: Join at shoulder seam of armhole, ch 1, evenly sp sc around armhole, inserting hook in sides of sts on Back, and on shaping rows of Left Front, inserting hook as in TKS for rem of Left Front, join in beg sc. Fasten off.

Steam edges to eliminate any rem curl. **C!**

1, 1, 1] time(s), mesh in next 0 [3, 7, 3, 7, 3] st(s), turn. (15 [19, 23, 27, 31, 35] sts)

Next row: Mesh in next 7 [3, 7, 3, 7, 3] sts, [fpdc around next dc, mesh in next 7 sts] 1 [2, 2, 3, 3, 4] time(s), pattern now established, turn.

Next rows: Continue in established pattern for total of 93 [91, 89, 87, 85, 83] rows.

Armhole Shaping

Next row: At armhole edge, dec 1 st every row 10 [14, 16, 18, 20, 22] times. (5 [5, 7, 9, 11, 13] sts at end of last row)

Next rows: Work even in established pattern for total of 134 rows. At end of last row, fasten off.

Left Front

Row 1: Ch 16 [20, 24, 28, 32, 36], sc in 2nd ch from hook, [ch 1, sk next ch, sc in next ch] 3 [1, 3, 1, 3, 1] time(s), [dc in next ch, mesh in next 7 chs] 0 [1, 1, 2, 2, 3] time(s), turn. (15 [19, 23, 27, 31, 35] sts)

Next rows: Working mesh over mesh and fpdc around each dc or fpdc across, complete same as Right Front.

Sew shoulder seams.

Sleeve

Make 2.

Multiple of 8 plus 7.

Row 1: Ch 48 [48, 48, 56, 56, 64], sc in 2nd ch from hook, [ch 1, sk next ch, sc in next ch] twice, [dc in next ch, mesh in next 7 chs] across, turn. (47 [47, 47, 55, 55, 55] sts)

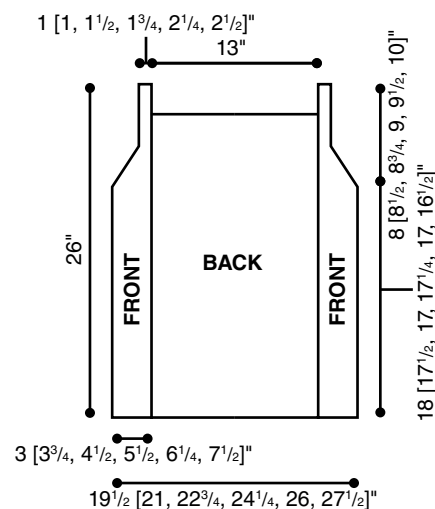
Next rows: Mesh over mesh, fpdc around dc or fpdc across for pattern, work even 15 [7, 3, 7, 3, 7] more rows.

Next rows: Including new sts in mesh st as they accumulate, inc 1 st each edge, work 3 rows even, rep last 4 rows 13 [17, 19, 17, 19, 21] times. (75 [83, 87, 91, 95, 99] sts at end of last row)

Next rows: Work even in established pattern until 84 rows have been completed.

Cap Shaping

Motif A

Rnd 1: Ch 4, sl st in first ch to form ring, **ch 3** (see *Pattern Notes*), 11 dc in ring, **join** in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (12 dc)

Rnd 2: **Beg cl** (see *Special Stitches*) in first st, [ch 1, **cl** (see *Special Stitches*) in next st] twice, ch 5, *[cl in next st, ch 1] twice, cl in next st, ch 5, rep from * around, join in top of beg cl. (12 cls)

Rnd 3: Ch 1, sc in same st as beg ch-1, [sc in next ch sp, sc in next cl] twice, *(2 sc, hdc, dc, hdc, 2 sc) in next ch-5 sp**, sc in next cl, [sc in next ch sp, sc in next cl] twice, rep from * around, ending last rep at **, join in beg sc.

Rnd 4: [Ch 2, sk next st, sl st in next st] 3 times, ch 2, sk next st, *(sl st, ch 2, sl st) in center dc**, [ch 2, sk next st, sl st in next st] 5 times, ch 2, rep from * around, ending last rep at **, ch 2, sk next st, sl st in next st, ch 2, sk next st, join in joining of last rnd. Fasten off.

Motif B.

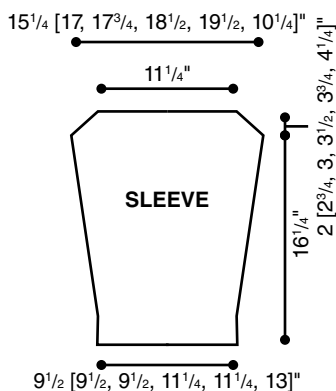
Rnds 1–3: Rep rnds 1–3 of Motif A.

Rnd 4 (joining): [Ch 2, sk next st, sl st in next st] 3 times, ch 2, *sk next st, (sl st, ch 1, drop lp from hook, insert hook from front to back in RS of top right corner of corresponding Motif, pull lp through, ch 1, sl st) in center dc (*corner made*)*, [ch 1, drop lp, insert hook in ch-2 sp of corresponding Motif, pull lp through, ch 1, sk next st, sl st in next st] across to next center dc, rep between *, complete rem 3 sides same as for Motif A.

Motif Border

Make strip of 9 Motifs, 1 on top of the other.

To the right of 9th Motif, add 3 Motifs so there will be 4 Motifs across back neck edge.



Beg another strip of Motifs, adding 8 Motifs to bottom edge of 4th Motif on back.

There should be 8 Motifs down each Front with 4 Motifs across Back.

Pin in place so that Motifs match on each side. Sew in place.

Front Border

Row 1: With RS facing, join in lower corner ch-2 sp, [ch 2, sl st in next ch-2 sp] across Front, Back neck edge and rem Front, working (ch 2, sl st) in joining between Motifs, ch 2, ending sl st in corner ch-2 sp on opposite side, turn.

Row 2: Do not ch-1 at beg of row, sl st in first ch-2 sp, [ch 2, sl st in next ch-2 sp] across, turn.

Rows 3–11: Rep row 2. At end of last row, fasten off.

Finishing

Fold 1 Sleeve in half lengthwise, place fold at shoulder seam, sew in place.

Rep with rem Sleeve.

Sew side and Sleeve seams. **C!**

- Drops Kid-Silk lace (lace) weight mohair/silk yarn (.9 oz/219 yds/25g per ball): 1 ball #14 red
- Size H/8/5mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Stitch markers



Finishing

Sew buttons along right front edge and use holes in Lace Edging as button holes.

GAUGE

1 strand Karisma & 1 strand Kid-Silk held tog: 14 dc = 4 inches; 8 dc rows = 4 inches

PATTERN NOTES

Hold 1 strand of Karisma and 1 strand Kid-Silk together unless otherwise stated.

Chain-2 at beginning of round counts as first half double crochet unless otherwise stated.

Chain-3 at beginning of round counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

Chain-1 at beginning of round counts as first single crochet unless otherwise stated.

BERET

Rnd 1: Holding 1 strand of each yarn tog (see Pattern Notes), ch 4, sl st in first ch to form ring, **ch 2** (see Pattern Notes), 11 hdc in ring, **join** (see Pattern Notes) in 2nd ch of beg ch-2. (12 hdc)

Rnd 2: Ch 4 (see Pattern Notes), [dc in next st, ch 1] around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-4. (12 dc, 12 ch-1 sps)

Rnd 3: Sl st in first ch sp, ch 3, [sc in next ch sp, ch 3] around, join in beg sl st. (12 ch-3 sps)

Rnd 8: Sl st in first ch-5 sp, **ch 3** (see Pattern Notes), 6 dc in same ch sp as beg ch-3, 7 dc in each ch-5 sp around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (84 dc)

Rnd 9: Ch 1 (see Pattern Notes), sc in each st around, join in beg ch-1. (84 sc)

Rnd 10: Ch 5 (see Pattern Notes), sk next st, [dc in next st, ch 2, sk next st] around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-5. (42 dc, 42 ch sps)

Rnd 11: Sl st in first ch sp, ch 2, hdc in same ch sp as beg ch-2, 2 hdc in each ch sp around, join in 2nd ch of beg ch-2. (84 hdc)

Rnd 98 [98, 100]: Ch 1, sc in each of first 6 [7, 8] sts, sk next 2 sts, *sc in each of next 3 sts, ffdc around each of first 2 sk sts, sk next 3 sts, ffdc around each of next 2 ffdc on rnd before last, working behind last 2 ffdc worked, sc in each of 3 sts just sk, sc in each of next 6 [7, 8] sts, rep from * twice, join in beg sc.

Rnds 99 & 100 [99 & 100, 101 & 102]: Ch 1, sc in each st around, join in beg sc.

Heel

Rnd 101 [101, 103]: Ch 1, 2 sc in first st, sc in each st around, ending with 2 sc in last st, join in beg sc. (56 [60, 64] sc)

Rnd 102 [102, 104]: Ch 1, sc in each st around, join in beg sc.

Rnd 103 [103, 105]: Ch 1, sc in first st, 2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 52 [54, 60] sts, 2 sc in next st, sc in last st, join in beg sc. (58 [62, 66] sts)

Rnd 104 [104, 106]: Ch 1, sc in each st around, join in beg sc.

Rnd 105 [105, 107]: Ch 1, sc in each of first 2 sts, 2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 52 [54, 60] sts, 2 sc in next st, sc in each of last 2 sts, join in beg sc. (60 [64, 68] sts)

Rnd 106 [106, 108]: Ch 1, sc in each st around, join in beg sc.

Sizes Medium & Large Only

Rnd [107, 109]: Ch 1, sc in each of first 3 sts, 2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 52 [54, 60] sts, 2 sc in next st, sc in each of last 3 sts, join in beg sc. (62 [66, 70] sts)

Rnd [108, 110]: Ch 1, sc in each st around, join in beg sc.

Size Large Only

Rnd [111]: Ch 1, sc in each of first 4 sts, 2 sc in next st, sc in each of next 60 sts, 2 sc in next st, sc in each of last 4 sts, join in beg sc. ([72] sc)

Rnd [112]: Ch 1, sc in each st around, join in beg sc.

Rnd [113]: Ch 1, sc in each of first 4 sts, **sc dec** (see *Stitch Guide*) in next 2 sts, sc in each of next 60 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of last 4 sts, join in beg sc. ([70] sc)

Rnd [114]: Ch 1, sc in each st around, join in beg sc.

Sizes Medium & Large Only

Rnd [109, 115]: Ch 1, sc in each of first 3 sts, **sc dec** (see *Stitch Guide*) in next 2 sts, sc in each of next [56, 60] sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of last 3 sts, join in beg sc. ([64, 68] sc)

Rnd [110, 116]: Ch 1, sc in each st around, join in beg sc.

All Sizes

Rnd 107 [111, 117]: Ch 1, sc in each of first 2 sts, **sc dec** (see *Stitch Guide*) in next 2 sts, sc in each of next 52 [56, 60] sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of last 2 sts, join in beg sc. (58 [64, 68] sc)

Rnd 108 [112, 118]: Ch 1, sc in each st around, join in beg sc.

Rnd 109 [113, 119]: Ch 1, sc in first st, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of next 52 [56, 60] sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in last st, join in beg sc. (56 [60, 64] sc)

Rnd 110 [114, 120]: Ch 1, sc in each st around, join in beg sc.

Rnd 111 [115, 121]: Ch 1, sc dec in first 2 sts, sc in each st around, with sc dec in last 2 sts, join in beg sc. (54 [58, 62] sc)

Rnd 112 [116, 122]: Rep last rnd. (52 [56, 60] sc)

Rnd 113 [117, 123]: Ch 1, sc in each st around, join in beg sc.

Next rnds: Rep last rnd until Sock measures 6 [7, 8] inches or desired length from Heel.

Next rnd: Ch 1, sc each in each st around and at same time evenly sp 6 [8, 10] dec around, **do not join**, mark first sc. (46 [48, 50] sc)

Next rnds: Rep last rnd 5 times. At end of last rnd, leaving long end, fasten off. (8 [8, 10] sc at end of last rnd)

Weave long end through top of sts on last rnd, pull to close. Secure end. **C**

Row 12: Ch 1, sc in each of first 6 sts, *[cl in next st, sc in next st] twice, cl in next st, sc in each of next 6 sts, rep from * across, turn.

Row 13: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.

Row 14: Rep row 10.

Rows 15–18: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.

Row 19: **Ch 2** (see *Pattern Notes*), hdc in each of first 3 sts, **[fpdc** (see *Stitch Guide*) around each of next 3 sts, **bpdc** (see *Stitch Guide*) around each of next 3 sts] across to last 3 sts, hdc in each of last 3 sts, turn.

Row 20: Ch 2, hdc in each of first 3 sts, [fpdc around each of next fpdc, bpdc around each of next bpdc] across to last 3 sts, hdc in each of last 3 sts, turn.

Row 21: Ch 2, hdc in each of first 3 sts, [bpdc around each of next 3 fpdc, fpdc around each of next 3 bpdc] across to last 3 sts, hdc in each of last 3 sts, turn.

Row 22: Ch 2, hdc in each of first 3 sts, [bpdc around each of next 3 bpdc, fpdc around each of next fpdc] across to last 3 sts, hdc in each of last 3 sts, turn.

Row 23: Ch 2, hdc in each of first 3 sts, [fpdc

around each of next 3 bpdc, bpdc around each of next fpdc] across to last 3 sts, hdc in each of last 3 sts, turn.

Rows 24–35: [Rep rows 20–23 consecutively] 3 times.

Row 36: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.

Rows 37–176: [Rep rows 2–36 consecutively] 4 times.

Rows 177–192: Rep rows 2–17.

Row 193: Ch 1, sc in each st across. Fasten off.

Border

Rnd 1: With RS facing, join with sc in first st, 2 sc in same st as beg sc (*corner*), sc in each st across to last st, 3 sc in last st (*corner*), evenly sp 195 sc in ends of rows down side to next corner, working in starting ch on opposite side of row 1, 3 sc in first ch (*corner*), sc in each ch across to last ch, 3 sc in last ch (*corner*), evenly sp 195 sc in ends of rows up side edge, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) in beg sc.

Rnd 2: Working from left to right, ch 1, **reverse sc** (see *Stitch Guide*) in each st around, join in beg reverse sc. Fasten off. **C!**

Row 2: Ch 3, **dc dec** (see *Stitch Guide*) in next 3 sts, dc in each st across to last 3 sts, dc dec in last 3 sts, turn. (29 dc)

Rows 3 & 4: Ch 3, dc dec in next 2 sts, dc in each st across, ending with dc dec in last 2 sts, turn. (25 dc at end of last row)

Row 5: Rep row 2. (21 dc)

Row 6: Rep row 3. (19 dc)

Row 7: Rep row 2. (15 dc)

Rows 8–11: Rep row 3. (7 dc at end of last row)

Rows 12–15: Ch 3, dc in each st across, working dc dec in center 2 sts, turn. (3 dc at end of last row)

Row 16: Ch 3, dc dec in last 2 sts. Fasten off. (2 dc)

Edging

Row 1: Working in ends of rows, join grey heather in end of row 1 on Triangle, ch 1, sc in same row, evenly sp 32 sc across to tip, ch 1, sc in same row on opposite side, evenly sp 32 sc across to bottom of Triangle. Fasten off. (66 dc)

Row 2: Join white in **back lp** (see *Stitch Guide*) of first st, ch 3, working in back lps, dc in same st as beg ch-3, dc in each st across to ch-1 at tip, (dc, tr, dc) in back lp of ch-1, dc in back lp of each st across, ending with 2 dc in last st. Fasten off. (71 sts)

Assembly

Remove center safety pin on all 4 sides of Pillow and move each rem pin over 4 sts toward pillow corners on all 4 sides of Pillow. Pins mark center 38 sts on each side of Pillow.

Center opposite side of beg ch of row 1 at bottom edge of any triangle WS up between pins onto 1 side edge of Pillow back, working through both thicknesses from front side of Pillow, join white in back lp only of first st at pin and last st of Triangle at end of row 2, sc in back lp of next st on Pillow and through ch at base of last dc on Triangle at end of row 2, insert hook through back lp only of next st on Pillow and through base of last dc of Triangle finishing row 2, yo, pull up white lp, yo with grey heather and pull through both lps on hook, fasten off white, [sc in back lps of Pillow edge and through starting ch on opposite side of row 1 on Triangle] across, to row 2 of Edging, changing to white in last st, sc in back lp only of next st of Pillow and through 2nd ch of beg ch-3, sl st in back lp only of last st at pin on Pillow and in top of beg ch-3. Fasten off.

Rep with rem Triangles.

Bring tips of Triangles to center front of Pillow and, using 1 strand of white, sew tips tog.

White Button

With white, ch 5, 15 tr in 5th ch from hook (first 4 chs count at first tr), join in 5th ch of beg ch-5. Fasten off. (16 tr)

Layer black button in center of White Button. Using burgundy, sew buttons to Triangle tips in center of Pillow as shown in photo. **C!**

LISDOONVARNA SHAWL

Named for a quaint little town in County Clare on the west coast of Ireland, this beautiful shawl incorporates several elements of Irish crochet in the body pattern and elegant borders.



BUTTON SLIPPER BOOTS

Chunky-weight wool yarn gives these toasty foot warmers an extra measure of cozy warmth.

MOSAIC LAP ROBE

Ultra-plush fleece yarn gives this luscious lap throw super softness and warmth. Easy join-as-you-go motifs worked with a large-size hook make this a quick, now-sew project.
