Berroco Boboli Lace
Boboli Lace is a soft and shimmery yarn from Berroco. It's 42 percent wool, 35 percent acrylic, and $23 \%$ viscose. The viscose adds a touch of sheen to the yarn. A 4-inch single crochet swatch can be achieved with a size G/6/4mm hook in 22 stitches and 26 rows. Hand-wash this yarn in cool water, and lay flat to dry. It comes in 13 colorways of 350 -yard balls. The yarn is very soft and has a very squishy, luxurious feel to it. Boboli also comes in a worsted weight and a thicker chunky weight. Boboli Lace is a great yarn for garments and eye-catching accessories. Keep your eyes open for a fun one-skein project coming soon in Boboli worsted weight.


## Crochet Stitch Dictionary

By Sarah Hazell (Interweave/F+W Media, 192 pages, \$22.95)
Stitch dictionaries are a great place to find ways to vary your crochet—pick a stitch pattern and experiment with it to make your own creations. A basic stitch dictionary (or five) should be on every crocheter's bookshelf. The cover of Sarah Hazell's Crochet Stitch Dictionary says it has "200 Essential Stitches with Step-byStep Photos." Indeed it does include many of the most common stitch patterns, each with a clear photograph of the stitch pattern, a short description of the properties of the stitch, text instructions, a photo of the stitch in progress, and the symbol chart for the stitch. With up to two stitch patterns per page, that's a lot of information to pack onto a page!

Inexperienced crocheters will benefit from a nice how-to section at the beginning of the book and the step-by-step photos throughout. And no matter what your skill level, if you are new to stitch dictionaries, this essential guide is a good place to start!

While in pursuit of Olympic glory, between training sessions and on long road trips, ice hockey teammates Jocelyne Lamoureux, Monique Lamoureux, Brianne McLaughlin-Bittle, Julie Chu and Anne Schleper stitch for themselves, for each other, for gifts and for FUN!

When I think of Olympic athletes, I think of early morning training sessions, long days in the gym, big healthy meals and ... crochet? What doesn't immediately pop into mind is the endless hours traveling between events. It's on these road trips that the players pull out their hooks and yarn.

It began when team veteran Brianne McLaughlin-Bittle taught herself to crochet by watching online tutorials and videos. She received mixed reaction as she would bring out her project bag. Teammate Anne Schleper admits she asked Brianne, "Are you serious right now?" Other teammates would tease Brianne about practicing her "housewife skills." The good-natured ribbing quickly turned to curiosity as others began to ask for lessons and hats for themselves. "When I first pulled out a project on the bus I had 24 teammates taking pictures and tweeting at me, the stereotype being that crocheting is more of an older hobby. Once I finished my project, I had them asking me to teach them. It's now

## Front Row Fan Scarf

DESIGN BY BECKY BARKER
The novel fringe makes this beginner scarf anything but ordinary. The pattern is so easy and fun that you'll likely want to make enough for your whole team.

## (1)(23)5 (6) easy

FINISHED MEASUREMENTS
$51 / 2$ inches wide $\times 661 / 2$ inches long, excluding fringe

## MATERIALS

- Plymouth Yarn Encore Worsted medium (worsted) weight acrylic/ wool yarn ( $31 / 202 / 200$ yds/ 100 g per skein):

2 skeins \#4045 serenity blue 1 skein \#517 denim blue

- Size $\mathrm{H} / 8 / 5 \mathrm{~mm}$ crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle


## GAUGE

20 sts $=4$ inches; 16 rows $=4$ inches

## PATTERN NOTE

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

## SCARF

Row 1 (WS): With serenity blue, ch 25 , sc in 2nd ch from hook, *ch 1, sk next ch, sc in next ch, rep from * across to last ch, sc in last ch, turn. ( $13 \mathrm{sc}, 11 \mathrm{ch}-1 \mathrm{sps}$ )

Row 2: Ch 1, sc in first sc, ch 1, sk next sc, sc in next ch-1 sp, *ch 1, sk next sc, sc in next ch-1 sp, rep from * across to last $s c$, sc in last $s c$, turn.

Rows 3-7: Rep row 2, changing color (see Stitch Guide) to denim blue in last st of last row.

Rows 8-12: With denim blue, rep row 2, changing color to serenity blue in last st of last row.

Rows 13-19: With serenity blue, rep row 2, changing color to denim blue in last st of last row.

Rows 20-259: [Rep rows 8-19 consecutively] 20 times. At end of row 259, do not fasten off.

Row 260: Ch 16, sl st in 2nd ch from hook and in each rem ch across (first fringe made), sl st in next sc, sl st in next ch-1 sp, [ch 16, sl st in 2nd ch from hook and in each rem ch across (next fringe made), sl st in next sc, slst in next ch-1 sp] 10 times; ( (sl st, ch 16, slst in 2nd ch from hook and in each rem ch across, $s$ st) in last sc. Fasten off. (12 fringes)
Working across opposite side of foundation ch, join (see Pattern Notes) serenity blue with sl st in first ch of foundation ch, ch 16 , sl st in 2nd ch from hook and in each rem ch across (first fringe made), $s$ st in each of next 3 chs on scarf, [ch 16, sl st in 2nd ch from hook and in each rem ch across (next fringe made), sl st in next 2 chs on scarf] 10 times; ch 16 , sl st in 2nd ch from hook and in each rem ch across, sl st in last ch on scarf. Fasten off. (12 fringes) C!

Consider paying kindness forward by giving this adorable dimensional blooming bauble to someone who deserves a cheer.

## 12(34) 56 easy

## FINISHED MEASUREMENTS

$3 / 4$ inch tall $\times 3$ inches in diameter

## MATERIALS

- Universal Nazli Gelin Garden 10 Metallic size 10 crochet cotton
(306 yds per ball):

1 ball \#36 red with red metallic

- Size 7/1.65mm steel crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge

- Tapestry needle
- $1 / 2$-inch wooden bead
- Stitch marker


## GAUGE

4 sts $=1 / 2$ inch

## PATTERN NOTES

Work Flower Center in continuous rounds; do not turn or join unless otherwise stated. Mark first stitch of round.
Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

## SPECIAL STITCH

Slip ring: Leaving 4-inch end (see illustration), lap thread over end forming Ip, insert hook through Ip from front to back, yo, pull through Ip to form ring, yo, pull through Ip on hook.

## RING

## Ruby Flower

Rnd 1: Work slip ring (see Special Stitch), 6 sc in ring, do not join (see Pattern Notes). (6 sc)


Rnd 2: 2 sc in each sc around. (12 sc)
Rnd 3: [2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 3 sc] around. (15 sc)

Rnds 4 \& 5: Sc in each st around.
Rnd 6: Insert bead, sc dec (see Stitch Guide) in first 2 sts , $s c$ in each of next 3 sts , [sc dec in next 2 sts , sc in each of next 3 sts ] around. (12 sc)

Rnd 7: [Sc dec in next 2 sts] around, join (see Pattern Notes) in first sc. (6 sc)

Rnd 8: Ch 2, [sl st in next st, ch 2] around, join in joining slst of last rnd. (6 ch-2 sps)

Rnd 9: (Sl st, ch 3, 4 tr, ch 3, sl st) in each ch sp around, join in beg sl st. Leaving long end, fasten off.

## Band

Row 1: Ch 4, sc in 2nd ch from hook and in each ch across, turn. (3 sc)

Row 2: Ch 1, sc in first st, 2 sc in next st, sc in last st, turn. (4 sc)

Rows 3-19: Ch 1 , sc in each st across, turn.
Row 20: Ch 1 , sc in first st, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in last st, do not turn. (3 sc)

Last rnd: Now working in ends of rows, evenly sp sc across, fold first and last rows tog, working through both thicknesses, sc in each st across, working in rem ends of rows, evenly sp sc around, join in first sc on this side. Fasten off. C!

## Pearls \& Oysters Throw

# Gorgeous drape and elegant sheen are lovely features of this easy throw. The slight metallic yarn adds a modern look to the easy two-row repeat. 

## (1)(2)4(5) masy

## FINISHED MEASUREMENTS

$401 / 2$ inches wide x 55 inches long

## MATERIALS

- Bernat Baby Coordinates light (DK) weight acrylic/rayon/nylon yarn ( $5 \mathrm{oz} / 388 \mathrm{yds} / 140 \mathrm{~g}$ per skein): 5 skeins \#48046 soft grey
- Size J/ $10 / 6 \mathrm{~mm}$ crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle


## GAUGE

2 shells $=5$ inches

## PATTERN NOTE

Chain-3 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

## SPECIAL STITCHES

First foundation single crochet (first
foundation sc): Ch 2, insert hook into 2nd ch from hook, yo, pull up Ip, yo, pull through 1 Ip on hook (ch-1 completed), yo, pull through all Ips on hook (sc completed).

## Next foundation single crochet (next

 foundation sc): [Insert hook in last ch-1 made, yo, pull up Ip, yo, pull through 1 Ip on hook (ch-1), yo, pull through all lps on hook (sc)] as indicated.Shell (shell): Work (3 dc, ch 1, 3 dc ) in st as indicated in instructions.

(d) 3 ) LIGHT


My father introduced me to the concept of intarsia as a knitting technique. I had done other forms of colorwork in crochet, but I liked the idea of individual balls of yarn for each section of color, eliminating the need to carry unused colors underneath my stitches or stranded across the back of my work.

When I decided to adapt a cartoon image into an afghan for my son, I avoided visible yarn strands in the way that made sense to me, not realizing that the technique was anything unusual. Because it was an afghan, I did not want there to be a wrong side, so I hid the vertical strands of yarn inside the first stitch in a new color after each color change.

Although most crocheted colorwork relies on single crochet stitches to create images in a grid-like pattern, I found that half double and double crochet stitches can create far more detailed images with just a few differences in how the color changes are made. Because these stitches are taller than single crochets, you can work into the top of your stitch
or even change the color of the top loop while maintaining the appearance of a full stitch with the bottom color.

I found that although the double crochet stitches I used in my first few pieces allowed me to get finer details in the images, the technicalities were more than I could demonstrate in one pattern or article. On the other hand, working with half double crochets is far easier to explain, and is a wonderful introduction to the technique.

With these few simple changes, you too can make completely reversible crocheted colorwork.

## The Yarn Flip

Each time you make a regular color change (bringing up the new color in the final yarn over of the last stitch) you will bring the old color to the front of your work, then "flip" the yarn up between your hook and the new color as shown in Photo 1.

This hides the vertical strands inside the first stitch in the new color and brings the old color to the top of your

work, ready to pick up on the following row as shown in Photo 2.


## Late Color Changes

When the next row calls for the old color to be worked into the first stitch of the new color on the row you are working, you can complete the last stitch in the old color before dropping it to the back of your work and working the first stitch in the new color as shown in Photo 3. The top loop of the stitch will be the old color, while the bottom of the stitch is in the new color, making for smoother angles.


## Increases \&

## Decreases

Reversible intarsia also uses increases (two stitches in one stitch) combined with decreases (two stitches worked together) to create smoother angles in the color changes. An increase in one color is always paired with a decrease in another color to maintain the same number of stitches in each row.

## Carrying Yarn

To avoid unused colors peeking out between your stitches, you should only carry yarn under or above stitches of the same color. The one exception to this is when you carry the new yarn under the stitch just before a late color change as shown in Photos 4 and 5. By inserting your hook under the strand of the new yarn as you make the last stitch, you will bring the new yarn up inside the stitch, making it easier to begin using the new
yarn on the following stitch without any additional stranding.


While the yarn flip makes the fabric reversible, using late color changes as well as increases and decreases allows you to work with the natural angles of the crochet stitches to create smoother angles in your piece. Crochet stitches do not stack up directly on top of one another other as the standard grid-like color chart would indicate. Crocheted colorwork tends to have a pixelated appearance because the patterns fight against the natural angle of crochet stitches by forcing them to fit into a grid.

Because the stitches do not fit a grid, it is actually easier to portray reversible intarsia patterns in the form of stitch diagrams. By changing the colors of the symbols, we show where to make color changes, and late color c hanges are indicated by changing only the top bar of the T used to represent a half double crochet. Give this technique a try using
the Ziggety Scarf on page 20 as a guide. From there you can experiment and enjoy the beautiful and reversible results of your next project. C!

## FINISHED MEASUREMENTS

6 inches wide $x 55$ inches long

## MATERIALS

- Classic Elite Color by Kristin worsted (medium) weight wool/alpaca/
mohair yarn ( $13 / 40 \mathrm{z} / 93 \mathrm{yds} / 50 \mathrm{~g}$ per skein):
3 skeins \#3212 deep forest
2 skeins \#3236 mushroom
- Size $\mathrm{G} / 6 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge


## GAUGE

Working in hdc: $16 \mathrm{hdc}=4$ inches; 13 rows $=4$ inches

## Ziggety Scarf

## DESIGN BY LAURINDA REDDIG

Though simple, this scarf challenges what you may know about crochet! Say goodbye to a messy wrong side with this innovative technique that will have you looking good both coming and going.

## PATTERN NOTES

Do not skip first stitch on each row.
Chain-1 at beginning of every row does not count as first stitch.
When changing color at the end of a row (as in row 11), work first hdc of next row by inserting hook under strand of new color and in both loops of first stitch.

## SPECIAL STITCHES

Color change (change to): Work to final yo of last st in old color, yo and complete st with new color, bring old color to front of work and back between new color and hook, work first st in new color, pull old color strand tight, continue working in new color.

## Late color change (late change to):

Complete last st in old color carrying new color under st, with 1 lp of old color on hook, pick up new color leaving ball of old color at back of work, pull new color tight to hide under previous stitch, complete next stitch in new color. Top Ip of st will be a different color than lower part of stitch.

## SCARF

With forest, ch 25.
Row 1: With forest, ch 25, hdc in back bar (see illustration) of 2nd ch from hook and each ch across, turn.


## Back Bar of Chain

Row 2: Ch 1 (see Pattern Notes), hdc in each of first 5 hdc, *change to (see Special Stitches) mushroom, hdc in each of next 6 hdc*, change to forest, hdc in each of next 6 hdc, rep between * once, change to forest, hdc in last hdc, turn. (24 hdc)

Row 3: Ch 1, hdc in each of next forest color hdc, *late change to (see Special Stitches) to mushroom, hdc in each of next 6 hdc*, late change to forest, hdc in each of next 6 hdc , rep between * once, late change to forest, hdc in each of next forest color hdc across, turn.

Row 4: Ch 1, hdc in each of next forest color hdc, *change to mushroom, hdc in each of next 6 hdc*, change to forest, hdc in each of next 6 hdc, rep between * once, change to forest, hdc in each of next forest color hdc across, turn.

Rows 5-10: [Rep rows 3 and 4 alternately] 3 times.

Row 11: Ch 1, hdc in each of first 5 hdc, *ate change to mushroom, hdc in each of next $6 \mathrm{hdc}^{*}$, late change to forest, hdc in each of


next 6 hdc, rep between * once, late change to forest, hdc in last hdc, change to mushroom, turn.

Row 12: Ch 1, hdc in each of next 6 hdc , *change to forest, hdc in each of next $6 \mathrm{hdc}^{*}$, change to mushroom, hdc in each of next 6 hdc , rep between * once, turn.

Row 13: Ch 1, hdc in each of next 6 hdc, *late change to mushroom, hdc in each of next $6 \mathrm{hdc}^{*}$, late change to forest, hdc in each of next 6 hdc , rep between * once, turn.

Row 14: Ch 1, hdc in each of first 5 hdc, *change to forest, hdc in each of next 6 hdc*, change to mushroom, hdc in each of next 6 hdc , rep between * once, change to mushroom, hdc in last hdc, turn.

Row 15: Ch 1, hdc in each of next mushroom color hdc, *late change to forest, hdc in each of next 6 hdc* $^{*}$, late change to mushroom, hdc
in each of next 6 hdc, rep between * once, late change to mushroom, hdc in each of next mushroom color hdc across, turn.

Row 16: Ch 1, hdc in each of next forest color hdc, *change to mushroom, hdc in each of next 6 hdc*, change to forest, hdc in each of next 6 hdc , rep between * once, change to mushroom, hdc in each of next mushroom color hdc across, turn.

Rows 17-22: [Rep rows 15 and 16 alternately] 3 times.

Row 23: Ch 1, hdc in each of first 5 hdc , * late change to forest, hdc in each of next 6 hdc*, $^{*}$ late change to mushroom, hdc in each of next 6 hdc, rep between * once, change to mushroom, hdc in last hdc, change to forest, turn.

Row 24: Ch 1, hdc in each of next 6 hdc, *change to mushroom, hdc in each of next $6 \mathrm{hdc}^{*}$, change to forest, hdc in each of next 6 hdc , rep between * once, turn.

Row 25: Ch 1, hdc in each of next 6 hdc, *late change to forest, hdc in each of next 6 hdc*, late change to mushroom, hdc in each of next 6 hdc, rep between * once, turn.

Row 26: Ch 1, hdc in each of first 5 hdc , *change to mushroom, hdc in each of next 6 hdc* $^{*}$, change to forest, hdc in each of next 6 hdc , rep between * once, change to forest, hdc in last hdc, turn.

Rows 27-50: Repeat rows 3-26.
Rows 51-58: Repeat rows 3-10.
Row 59: Ch 1, hdc in each hdc across, turn.
Row 60: Repeat row 26
Rows 61-179: Repeat rows 3-119.

## Finishing

Weave in ends. C!

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This issue of Crochet! is introducing crochet stitch diagrams for some of our more intricate patterns. For those of you who are not familiar with these tools of crochet, diagrams provide a pictorial representation of stitch patterns. Diagrams can help you to follow a complicated pattern and also help you to visualize the finished design. Made up of international crochet symbols first developed in Japan, crochet diagrams can be read by anyone in any language.

Although diagrams may appear complicated at first glance, once you have learned to decipher the symbols, you should have no trouble reading them. In fact, the symbols are designed to mimic the stitches they represent making them easy to understand. For example, the symbol for double crochet has a vertical line representing the post of the stitch and a diagonal "tick mark" in the middle of the post. The tick mark represents the diagonal strand in the center of the double crochet, which is formed by working one yarn over when you begin the stitch. Similarly, the symbol for treble crochet has 2 tick marks, which represent two yarn
overs. More complex stitches, such as shells, clusters, picots and popcorns, will combine the basic stitches to form composites that look like the stitch they represent. All the stitches used in a diagram will be identified in a stitch key for that pattern.

Crochet diagrams can be used to portray work done in turned rows or in joined rounds. The diagram shows the front (or right side) of work and is drawn from the perspective of a right-handed crocheter. Left-handed crocheters can still follow the diagram but their work will be reversed.

## WORKING IN ROWS

On a pattern worked in rows, rightside rows are shown from right to left while wrong-side rows are shown from left to right. In general, we show every other row or round in a contrasting color to help distinguish the rows. Row numbers and the starting chain will identify the beginning of the row. The example on the next page shows a section of a pattern worked in rows. If the pattern is large, it is not necessary to show the entire piece. The diagram will show enough of the pattern to
establish the repeated pattern across the row as well as the repeat rows. I have highlighted the repeats in the sample and bracketed the repeat rows.

## SAMPLE PATTERN IN ROWS

## SPECIAL STITCH

Shell: ( $D$ c, ch 2, dc) in same st or sp.
Row 1: Ch 28 , sc in 2nd ch from hook and in each ch across, turn. (27 sc)

Sc is represented by a cross in this magazine. Note that some publications use an X to represent sc.

Row 2: Working in back lps, ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.

The arc below each sc (curved upward) is the symbol for working in the back loop only.
Row 3: Working in front lps, ch 1 , sc in each st across, turn.
An arc curved downward symbolizes front loop only.
Row 4: Ch 3, dc in each of next 2 sts , [sk next 2 sts, shell in next st, sk next 2 sts, dc in each of next 3 sts] across, turn. (3 shells)

The symbol for special stitches, such as the shell in this row, will appear in the accompanying

stitch key. The highlighted area represents the repeated section of the instruction. Most diagrams will not provide this feature, but you can highlight the repeat if you like. You can also mark your progress as you work the pattern.

Row 5: Ch 3, fpdc around each of next 2 sts, [shell in next ch-1 sp, sk next 2 sts, fpdc around each of next 3 sts] across, turn. (3 shells)

Front post stitches have a semicircular hook at the bottom indicating to work the stitch around the post of the stitch below.

Row 6: Ch 3, bpdc around each of next 2 sts, [shell in next ch-1 sp, sk next 2 sts, bpdc around each of next 3 sts ] across, turn. (3 shells)

Back post stitches have the hook facing the opposite direction of the front post stitches.
Rep rows 5 and 6 for pattern.
The bracket on the right side indicates the repeat rows.

## WORKING IN ROUNDS

When working in rounds, the diagram will start in the middle and work in concentric rounds outward. Again, row numbers and beginning chains will indicate the beginning of
each round. Right side rounds will be worked counterclockwise as a righthanded crocheter would crochet. If a round indicates to turn so that the wrong side is facing, an arrow on the diagram will indicate the change of direction. In this case you would follow the diagram clockwise. If space allows, the entire piece will be diagrammed. However, since most patterns have a repeat or repeats, and space is limited in a magazine, usually only a section of the piece will be represented. The first few rounds will be shown complete. Later rounds will include at least one repeat as well as the beginning of the next repeat as well as the end of the round. The sample below shows the repeats highlighted in each round. Once the repeat has been established, the diagram does not need to show the entire round.

## SAMPLE PATTERN IN ROUNDS

## SPECIAL STITCHES

2-double crochet cluster (2-dc cl): Holding back last Ip of each st on hook, 2 dc as indicated, yo, pull through all lps on hook.

3-double crochet cluster (3-dc cl): Holding back last lp of each st on hook, 3 dc as indicated, yo, pull through all lps on hook.
Rnd 1: Ch 6, sl st in first ch forming a ring, ch 1,16 sc in ring, join in first sc. (16 sc)

Note that when there is no room for the row number, the last stitch of the round may be gray in order to see the row number superimposed on top.

Rnd 2: Ch 3, 2-dc cl in first sc, [ch 3, sk next sc, 3-dc cl in next sc] 7 times, ch 3, sk last sc, join in top of beg cl. (8 ch-3 sps, 8 cl )

These cluster stitches are comprised of $3 d c$ joined at the top, just as you work the stitch.

Rnd 3: Sl st in next ch-3 sp, ch 1, [(sc, ch 2, sc ) in ch-3 sp, ( $3 \mathrm{dc}, \mathrm{ch} 2,3 \mathrm{dc}$ ) in next ch-3 sp] around, join in first sc. (8 ch-2 sps, $8 \mathrm{sc}, 24 \mathrm{dc}$ )

The symbol for sl st is a small black dot that takes up very little space as does the stitch. Sometimes the dot will be stretched into an oval to more accurately show the placement of the stitch.

Rnd 4: Ch $3,3 \mathrm{dc}$ in next ch-2 sp , dc in next sc , ${ }^{*}$ ch 2, (3 dc, ch 2, 3 dc ) in next ch-2 sp, ch $2^{* *}$, $d c$ in next $s c, 3 d c$ in next ch-2 $s p, d c$ in next $s c$, rep from * around, ending last rep at ${ }^{* *}$, join in 3 rd ch of beg ch-3. ( $44 \mathrm{dc}, 12 \mathrm{ch}-2 \mathrm{sps}$ )

Note that the first complete repeat is highlighted. The beginning of the next repeat is shown to make it clear that you begin the repeat again. The end of the round is also illustrated.

Rnd 5: Ch 3, dc in each of next $4 \mathrm{dc}, 2 \mathrm{dc}$ in next ch-2 sp, *ch 2, (3 dc, ch 2, 3 dc ) in next ch-2 sp, ch 2, 2 dc in next ch-2 sp**, dc in each of next $5 \mathrm{dc}, 2 \mathrm{dc}$ in next ch-2 sp, rep from * around, ending last rep at ${ }^{* *}$, join in 3 rd ch of beg ch-3. ( $60 \mathrm{dc}, 12 \mathrm{ch}-2$ sps)

Rnd 6: Ch 3, dc in each of next $6 \mathrm{dc}, 2 \mathrm{dc}$ in next ch-2 sp, *ch 2, (3 dc, ch 2, 3 dc) in next ch-2 sp, ch 2, 2 dc in next ch-2 sp**, dc in each of next $9 \mathrm{dc}, 2 \mathrm{dc}$ in next ch-2 sp, rep from * around, ending last rep at **, dc in
each of last 2 dc , join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. ( $76 d c, 12$ ch-2 sps)

Diagrams are very useful for reading a pattern, but they do have their limitations. 3-D shapes are difficult to illustrate on a 2-D plane. And placement of stitches can be sometimes tricky to illustrate. For example, most diagrams do not distinguish the difference between working into a chain stitch versus working under the chain loop. Be sure to read the accompanying instructions while following along with the diagram to make sure you don't miss any of the details. C!

# Crochet Solutions 101 <br> BYROBYNCHACHULA <br> Our guest columnist, designer, author and TV personalify Robyn Chachula, shares a few of her secrets for post stitches, tips on using variegated yarn, creating the best Tunisian fabric, and more! 

## POST STITCHES

Q: My post stitches always look as if they are hiding and not popping out of the fabric. What am I doing wrong?

A: Having your swatch not look like the picture can be extremely frustrating. I know I have certainly been there, and it can leave you feeling like you must not be holding the yarn or twisting the stitches correctly. But the good news is that usually your problem only lies in the yarn you are using. Post stitches and cables will look dramatically different in different fibers. In natural animal fibers, post stitches usually will sit high off the fabric because the fibers get tangled together and need to be blocked to drape. In silky fibers, such as bamboo or silk, the post stitches can completely hide. Those fibers have natural drape, and post stitches can slip into the spaces between the stitches instead of sitting on top of them. Cotton can go either way. If it's kitchen cotton, the post stitches will jump off the fabric; if it's processed soft cotton, then they will probably hide. Your best bet is to swatch and find out before you start that next large project.

## VARIEGATED YARNS

Q: I bought a fantastic variegated yarn, but I am a bit nervous as to what project I should stitch with it, and now it's wasting away in my yarn basket. Do you have any project ideas for me?

A: Variegated yarns are incredibly beautiful, and I know I rarely can pass by without taking one home. The difficult part is working hard on a project only to realize too late that it is pooling badly instead of keeping that lovely change of color. I use a few tricks when I crochet that might help. First, I like to pick out stitch patterns that are mosaic colorwork stripes of two colors. Then I will make one stripe that is variegated and one in a solid complementary color. Breaking up the variegated yarn with a solid tends to separate the pooling. If colorwork is not your thing, I have been known to use one ball of variegated yarn for the even rows and another ball for the odd rows. My last trick is to make projects with small motifs. With small motifs you can rearrange the colors into any pattern you choose.

## TUNISIAN CROCHET

Q: All my Tunisian crochet projects seem to make really dense fabric. How can I avoid that?

A: If you are a tight crocheter, this can be a challenge. Most Tunisian designs will have you use a hook one or two sizes larger than the recommended ball band. If that still gives you a dense fabric, go up another hook size. I am a tight crocheter, and I know I always jump up four sizes to get a fabric that will drape and not be dense.

## CROCHET DOILIES

Q: I love the look of doilies, but have no practical use for them. What else can I do with them?

A: Doily patterns are so beautiful and stunning, but I hear you-in my noisy and busy house they wouldn't last too long. I like to use doilies in places that I can see them. You can try framing them in a shadow box or making a collage of doilies and fabric for pretty artwork. You can make a doily using worsted-weight yarn for a lovely throw. Dipping a doily in fabric-stiffening solution and draping it over a bowl to dry will make a great accent piece. Using crochet cotton and steel hooks, doilies can be transformed into motifs for earrings or necklaces. I have even encased lovely doilies in resin for spill-proof coasters. C!

Row 2: Ch 1, [(sc, ch 2, 4 dc$)$ in next ch-2 sp] across, ending with sc in last ch-2 sp, turn.
Row 3: Ch 1, (sc, ch 2, 4 dc ) in first sc, [(sc, ch 2, 4dc) in next ch-2 sp] across, ending with sc in last ch-2 sp, turn.
Rep row 2 and 3 for pattern.

## CONCH SHELLS

## PATTERN NOTES

Chain-3 at beginning of row counts as first single crochet and chain-3 unless otherwise stated.
Chain-6 at beginning of row counts as first dc and chain-3 unless otherwise stated.

## SPECIAL STITCHES

Beginning shell (beg shell): Ch 3 (see Pattern Notes), (2 dc, hdc, sc) as indicated in instructions.
Shell (shell): ( $(c c$, ch $3,2 d c$, hdc, sc) as indicated in instructions.

Row 1: Ch multiple of 4 plus 2 , sc in 2nd ch from hook, [ch 3, sk 3 chs, sc in next ch] across, turn.

Row 2: Beg shell (see Special Stitches) in first ch-3 sp, shell (see Special Stitches) in each rem ch 3 sp across to last sc , sc in last sc , turn.

Row 3: Ch 6 (see Pattern Notes), sc in 3rd ch of ch-3 of next shell, [ch 3, sc in 3rd ch of ch-3 of next shell] across, turn.

Row 4: Beg shell in first ch-3 sp, [shell in next ch-3 sp] across to beg ch -6 , shell in ch-6 sp, sc in 3rd ch of beg ch-6, turn.
Rep rows 3 and 4 alternately for pattern. C!

Rnd 3: Ch 1, sc in ch sp just formed, [ch 7, sc in next ch sp] around to last ch sp, ch 3, join with tr in first sc forming last ch sp.

Rnd 4: Ch 3 (see Pattern Notes), 6 dc in ch sp just formed, [sc in next ch sp, picot (see Special Stitches), 13 dc in next ch sp (petal)] around to last ch sp, sc in last ch sp, picot, 6 dc in same ch sp as beg ch-3, join (see Pattern Notes) in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. Fasten off.

## Joining Snowflake Motifs

Using Assembly Diagrams on page 85 as guide, use dc join (see Special Stitches) and picot join (see Special Stitches) when joining Motifs on rnd 4.
Beginning at Motif 1 on back of Cardi, join Motifs row by row from right side to left side using instructions below.

Fasten off.

Rnd 4: Ch 3, 6 dc in ch sp just formed, $s c$ in next ch sp, picot, 8 dc in next ch sp, dc join in 8th dc of adjoining Motif, 4 dc in same ch sp as last dc on this Motif, sc in next ch sp, picot join to adjoining Motif, 5 dc in next ch sp, dc join in 6th dc of adjoining Motif, dc in same ch sp on this Motif, dc join to 8th dc of next adjoining

Motif, 5 dc in same ch sp as last dc on this Motif, sc in next ch sp, picot join to adjoining Motif, 5 dc in next ch sp, dc join to 6th dc of adjoining Motif, 7 dc in same ch sp as last dc on this Motif, [sc in next ch sp, 13 dc in next ch sp (petal)] around, to last ch sp , sc in last ch sp , 6 dc in same ch sp as beg ch-3, join in 3 rd ch of beg ch-3. Rnd 4: Ch 3, 6 dc in ch sp just formed, sc in next ch sp, picot, 8 dc in next ch $s p$, dc join in 8th dc of adjoining Motif, 4 dc in same ch sp as last dc on this Motif, sc in next ch sp, picot join to adjoining Motif, [ 5 dc in next ch sp, dc join in 6th dc of adjoining Motif, dc in same ch sp on this Motif, dc join to 8th dc of next adjoining Motif, 5 dc in same ch sp as last dc on this Motif, $s c$ in next ch $s p$, picot join to adjoining Motif] twice, 5 dc in next ch sp, dc join to 6th dc of adjoining Motif, 7 dc in same


ch sp as last dc on this Motif, [sc in next ch sp, 13 dc in next ch sp (petal)] around, to last ch sp , sc in last ch $\mathrm{sp}, 6 \mathrm{dc}$ in same ch sp as beg ch-3, join in 3 rd ch of beg ch-3. Fasten off.

Row 2: Ch 1, sc in first st, [ch 5, sc in next cl, ch 5 , sc in next ch sp] across, turn. ( 6 ch sps)

Row 3: Ch 8 (see Pattern Notes), sc in next ch-5 sp, [ch 7, sc in next ch-5 sp] across, ending with ch 3 , dtr in last st forming last ch sp, turn. (7 ch sps)

Row 4: Using Assembly Diagrams, ch 1, sc in first st, picot or picot join, 13 or 8 dc in next ch-7 sp, dc join in 8th dc of adjoining Motif, 4 dc in same ch-7 sp as last worked in on this Motif, sc in next ch-7 sp, picot or picot join to adjoining Motif, 13 or 5 dc in next ch-7 sp, dc join in 6th dc of adjoining Motif, dc in same ch sp on this Motif as last dc, dc join in 8th of next adjoining Motif, 5 dc in same ch-7 sp on this Motif, sc in next ch-7 sp, picot or picot join to adjoining Motif, 13 or 5 dc in next ch-7 sp, dc join in 6th dc of adjoining Motif, 7 dc in same ch-7 sp on this Motif, sc in next ch-7 sp, picot or picot join. Fasten off.

## Quarter Motif

## Make 2 [2, 0, 0].

Row 1: Ch 6, sl st in first ch to form ring, ch 6, 3-dc cl in ring, ch 4, 2-dc cl (see Special Stitches) in ring, turn. (13-dc cl)

Row 2: Ch 1, sc in first cl, ch 5, sc in next ch-4 sp, ch 5, sc in next cl, ch 5, sc in next ch-4 sp, turn. (3 ch-5 sps)

Row 3: Ch 8, sc in next ch-5 sp, [ch 7, sc in next ch sp ] twice, ch 3 , dtr in last st forming last ch sp, turn. (4 ch-7 sps)

Row 4: Using Assembly Diagrams, ch 3, dc join in 8th dc of adjoining Motif, 5 dc in next ch sp, sc in next ch sp, picot join, 5 dc in next ch $\mathrm{sp}, \mathrm{dc}$ join in 6th dc of adjoining Motif, dc in

same ch sp on this Motif, dc join in 8th dc of next adjoining Motif, 5 dc in same ch sp on this Motif, sc in next ch sp, picot join to adjoining Motif. Fasten off.

## Half Motif

Make 10 [10, 14, 14].
Row 1: Ch 6, sl st in first ch to form ring, ch 2, dc in ring, [ch 4, 3-dc cl in ring] twice, ch 4, 2-dc cl in ring, turn. (2 3-dc cl, $12-d c \mathrm{cl})$

Row 2: Ch 1, sc in first st, [ch 5, sc in next ch sp, ch 5, sc in next st] across, turn. (6 ch sps)

Row 3: Ch 8, sc in next ch-5 sp, [ch 7, sc in next ch-5 sp] across, ending with ch $3, \mathrm{dtr}$ in last st forming last ch sp, turn. (7 ch sps)

Row 4: Using Assembly Diagrams, ch 3, 6 dc in next ch sp or dc join in 8th dc of adjoining

Motif as shown on Assembly Diagrams, 5 dc in same ch sp, [sc in next ch-7 sp, picot or picot join, 13 dc or 5 dc in next ch sp , dc join to 6th dc of adjoining Motif, dc in same ch sp on this Motif, dc join in 8th dc of next adjoining Motif, 5 dc in same ch sp on this Motif] twice, sc in next ch sp, picot or picot join to adjoining Motif, 7 dc or 5 dc in next ch sp , dc join in 6th dc of adjoining Motif, dc in same ch sp on this Motif. Fasten off.

## Neck Motif

Make 0 [0, 2, 2].
Row 1: Ch 6, sl st in first ch to form ring, ch 2 , dc in ring, [ch 4, 3 -dc cl in ring] 3 times, ch 4, 2-dc cl in ring, turn. (3 3-dc cl, $12-d c$ cl)

Row 2: Ch 1, sc in first st, [ch 5, sc in next ch-4 sp, ch 5, sc in next st] across, turn. (8 ch sps)


Row 3: Ch 8, sc in next ch-5 sp, [ch 7, sc in next ch-5 sp] across to last ch-5 sp, ch 3, dtr in last st forming last ch sp, turn. (9 ch sps)

Row 4: Using Assembly Diagrams, ch 3, dc join in 8th dc of adjoining Motif, 5 dc in next ch sp, [sc in next ch-7 sp, picot join, 5 dc in next ch-7 sp, dc join in 6th dc of adjoining Motif, dc in same ch-7 sp on this Motif, dc join in 8th dc of next adjoining Motif, 5 dc in same ch-7 sp on this Motif] 3 times, sc in next ch-7 sp, picot join in adjoining Motif, 5 dc in next ch sp , dc join in 6th dc of adjoining Motif, dc in same ch sp on this Motif. Fasten off.

## Arm Motif

## Make 0 [0, 4, 4].

Row 1: Ch 6, sl st in first ch to form ring, ch 2, dc in ring (ch 2 and dc form dc cl), [ch 3, 3-dc cl in ring] 4 times, ch 2, tr in ring forming last ch sp, turn. (43-dc cl)

Row 2: Ch 1, sc in ch sp just formed, ch 5, sc in next st, [ch 5, sc in next ch sp, ch 5, sc in next st] across, turn. (9 ch sps)

Row 3: Ch 8, sc in next ch-5 sp, [ch 7, sc in next ch-5 sp] across, ending with ch $3, \mathrm{dtr}$ in last st forming last ch sp, turn. (10 ch sps)

Row 4: Using Assembly Diagrams, ch 1, sc in ch sp just formed, picot join, 8 dc in next ch sp , dc join in 8th dc of adjoining Motif, 4 dc in same ch sp on this Motif, [sc in next ch sp, picot join, 5 dc in next ch sp , dc join in 6th dc of adjoining Motif, dc in same ch sp on this Motif, dc join in 8th dc of next adjoining Motif, 5 dc in same ch sp on this Motif] 3 times, sc in next ch sp, picot join in adjoining Motif, 5 dc in next ch sp , dc join in 6th dc of adjoining Motif, dc in same ch sp on this Motif. Fasten off.

## Finishing

Lay out to schematic size. Pin in place. Spray with water to block and allow to dry. You will have to rip back on 1 side edge of Motifs to connect. Connect back side $Y$ to front side $Y$ and back side $X$ to front side $X$ in same manner as joining Motifs above.
Note that Half Motif on Arm attaches to underside of Arm and half of front and back side of Cardi on sizes small and medium.


Though Robyn Chachula has a deep love of crochet motifs, her love of row patterns can be found in her Celadon Cardigan on page 38.

On sizes large and X-large, Arm Motifs are sewn tog at underarm seam.

## Bottom Ribbing

Rnd 1: Join (see Pattern Notes) to right side of bottom edge, evenly sp sc across side of Motifs across to opposite side, turn.

Row 2: Ch 9, sc in 2nd ch from hook and in each ch across, sl st in each of next 2 sts on row 1, turn. (8 sc)

Row 3: Sk sl sts, working in back Ips (see Stitch Guide), sc in each sc across, turn.

Row 4: Ch 1, sc in each sc across, sl st in each of next 2 sts on row 1 , turn.

Next rows: Rep rows 3 and 4 alternately across row 1. At end of last row, fasten off.

## Arm Edging

Rnd 1: Join at underarm, evenly sp sc across Half Motif, [sc in each of next 5 dc on Snowflake, ch 2, sc in picot, ch 2 , sc in each of next 5 dc around, join in beg sc.

Rnd 2: Ch 1, sc in each st and in each ch around, join in beg sc. Fasten off.
Rep on rem Arm.

## Collar Edging

Row 1: Join at bottom edge of Ribbing, [evenly sp sc across Partial Motifs, sc in each of next 5 dc on Snowflake Motifs, ch 2, sc in next picot, ch 2, sc in each of next 5 dc ] across to opposite side, turn.
Place stitch markers on inside corners of back neck and out corner of front neck.

## PATTERN NOTES

Each shrug half is constructed from the sleeve cuff to the center back seam. A curved edge is formed with some of the front stitches and is continued around the lower edge. There is
no defined line between sleeve, shoulder and front, which makes it fit various body types with ease.
The slight bias in the sleeve fabric while working the pieces is not evident when worn and is minimized by turning at the end of certain rounds as indicated.
Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.
Chain-3 at beginning of rounds counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.
Double crochet group (dc group) refers to the sets of stitches that land between pairs of crossed stitches. The number of stitches increases in each group as the garment is shaped.
When working into sides of stitches at row ends, ensure hook is inserted under two strands of yarn.

## SPECIAL STITCHES

Crossed Stitch Left Slant (CL): Sk 2 sts, tri in each of next 2 sts, working behind tr sts just made, work tr in each sk st.
Crossed Stitch Right Slant (CR): Sk 2 sts, tr in each of next 2 sts, working in front of tr sts just made, tr in each sk st
Crossed Stitches Pair (CP): Work 4 sts of each CR (see Special Stitches) in those of CL (see Special Stitches) of previous rnd and work 4 sts of each CL in those of CR of previous rnd, alternating which is worked first every rnd.

## SHRUG

## Right Sleeve

Ch 56, join (see Pattern Notes) in first ch to close ring, being careful not to twist.

Rnd 1: Ch 3 (see Pattern Notes), sk same ch as joining and next 2 chs, tr in each of next 2 chs, working in front of tr sts just made, tr in each of last 2 sk chs, CL (see Special Stitches) in next 4 ch , dc in next ch, [CR (see Special Stitches) in next 4 chs, CL in next 4 ch , dc in next ch] 4 times, CR in next $4 \mathrm{ch}, \mathrm{CL}$ in next 4 ch , join in 3 rd ch of beg ch. (6 pairs of crossed sts and 6 dc )

Rnd 2: Ch 3, [CP (see Special Stitches), dc in next dc] 5 times, (P, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (6 CP, 6 dc)

Rnd 3: Ch 3, [CP, dc in next dc] 5 times, CP, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3.

Rnd 4: Ch 3, dc in st at base of ch, [CP, 2 dc in next dc] 5 times, CP , join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (6 (P, 12 dc )

Rnd 5: Ch 3, dc in next st, [CP, dc in each of next 2 dc$] 5$ times, CP , join in 3 rd ch of beg ch-3.

## Sizes X-Small, Small \& Medium Only <br> Rnds 6-13: Rep rnd 5.

## All Sizes

Note: Work following rnds with turns.
Rnd 14 [14, 14, 6, 6]: Ch 3, dc in sp between 2 dc from previous rnd, dc in 2nd $\mathrm{dc},[\mathrm{CP}, \mathrm{dc}$ in next dc , dc between 2 dc from previous rnd, dc in next dc] 5 times, CP , join in 3 rd ch of beg ch-3, turn. (6 groups of $3 d c, 6(P)$

Rnd 15 [15, 15, 7, 7]: Ch 3, CP in each $C P, d c$ in each dc around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3, turn.

Rnd $16[16,16,8,8]$ : Ch $3, \mathrm{dc}$ in st at base of $c h,{ }^{*} d c$ in next $d c, 2 d c$ in next $d c, C P * *$, 2 dc in next dc , rep from * around, ending last rep at ${ }^{* *}$, join in 3 rd ch of beg ch-3, turn. (6 groups of $5 \mathrm{dc}, 6$ (P)

Rnd 17 [17, 17, 9, 9]: Ch 3, CP in each CP, dc in each dc around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3, turn.

3 shells $=31 / 2$ inches; 7 rows $=33 / 4$ inches

Chain-3 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.
Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

## SPECIAL STITCHES

First foundation single crochet (first foundation sc): (h 2, insert hook into 2nd ch from hook, yo, pull up Ip, yo, pull through 1 Ip on hook (ch-1 completed), yo, pull through all Ips on hook (sc completed).


Cluster (cl): Holding back last lp of each st on hook, 2 dc as indicated in instructions, yo, pull through all lps on hook.
Shell: (CI—see Special Stitches, ch 3, cl) as indicated in instructions.
Cluster decrease (cl dec): Holding back last Ip of each st on hook, 2 dc in same place as last $\mathrm{cl}, \mathrm{dc}$ in top of turning ch or st indicated in instructions, yo, pull through all lps on hook.
Shell decrease (shell dec): ( Cl, ch 3, cl decsee Special Stitches) as indicated in instructions.
Back post double crochet decrease (bpdc dec): Holding back last lp of each st on hook, bpdc around indicated tr and turning ch, yo, pull through all Ips on hook.


Next Foundation Single Crochet

Front post treble crochet decrease (fptr dec): Holding back last Ip of each st on hook, fptr around indicated dc and tr in top of turning ch, yo, pull through all lps on hook.

Extended single crochet (ext sc): Insert hook in st as indicated in instructions, pull up Ip, yo, pull through 1 Ip on hook, yo, pull through all lps on hook.
Surface stitch (surface st): Holding yarn at back of work, insert hook between sts or rows, yo, pull Ip through to front and through Ip on hook.

## PATTERN STITCH

Row 1 (WS): Ch 3 (see Pattern Notes), [sk next st, shell (see Special Stitches) in next st, sk next st, dc in next st] across, turn.

Row 2: Ch 3, *shell in ch sp of next shell**, fptr (see Stitch Guide) around next dc, rep from * across, ending last rep at ${ }^{* *}$, dc in top of turning ch, turn.

Row 3: Ch 3, *shell in ch sp of next shell**, bpdc (see Stitch Guide) around next post st, rep from * across, ending last rep at ${ }^{* *}$, dc in turning ch, turn.

Rep rows 2 and 3 alternately for Pattern.

## CARDIGAN

Body
Row 1: First foundation sc (see Special Stitches), 96 [112, 128, 144, 160] next
foundation sc (see Special Stitches), turn. (97 [113, 129, 145, 161] sc)

Row 2: Work row 2 of Pattern. (24 [28, 32, 36, 40] shells)

Rows 3-30 [3-30, 3-32, 3-34, 3-34]: [Rep rows 3 and 4 alternately of Pattern] 14 [14, 15, 16, 16] times.

Row 31 [31, 33, 35, 35]: Ch 3, [shell in ch sp of next shell, fptr around next post st] 4 [4, $6,6,6]$ times, [(cl, ch 2, cl) in ch sp of next shell, fptr around next post st] $2[4,4,4,6]$ times, [shell in ch sp of next shell, fptr around next post st] 12 [12, 14, 16, 16] times, [(cl, ch 2, cl) in ch sp of next shell, fptr around next post st] 2 $[4,4,4,6]$ times, *shell in ch sp of next shell ${ }^{* *}$, fptr around next post st, rep from * across, ending last rep at ${ }^{* *}$, dc in turning ch, turn.

## First Front Shaping

Row 1: Ch 2, [shell in ch sp of next shell, bpdc around next post st] 3 [3,5,5,5] times, shell dec (see Special Stitches) in next shell ch sp and post st, leaving rem sts unworked, turn.

Row 2: SI st across ch sp of first shell, ch 2, cl in same ch sp, [fptr around next post st, shell in ch sp of next shell] across to last post st, fptr around post $s t$, cl in ch sp of last shell, turn. (2 [2, 4, 4, 4] shells)

Row 3: Ch 2, [bpdc around post of next post st, shell in ch sp of next shell] across to last post st, bpdc dec (see Special Stitches) in last post st and turning ch, turn.

Row 4: Ch 2, [shell in ch sp of next shell, fptr around next post $s t$ ] across to last shell, shell dec in ch sp of last shell and turning ch, turn.

## Sizes Small \& Medium Only

Row 5: Sl st across to ch sp of first shell, ch 2, cl in ch sp, bpdc around next post, cl in ch sp of next shell, leaving rem sts unworked, turn.

Row 6: Ch 3, fptr dec (see Special Stitches) in next post st and turning ch. Fasten off.

## Sizes Large, X-Large \& 2X-Large Only

Row [5]: Sl st across to ch sp of first shell, ch 2 , cl in same ch sp as beg ch-2, [bpdc around next post st, shell in ch sp of next shell] across to last post st, bpdc around last post st, cl in ch sp of last shell, turn. ([2, 2, 2] shells)

Row [6]: Ch 3, [fptr around next post st, shell in ch sp of next shell] across to last post st, fptr dec in next post st and turning ch, turn.

Row [7]: Ch 2, shell in ch sp of next shell, bpdc around next post st, shell dec in ch sp of last shell and turning ch, turn.

Row [8]: Sl st across to ch sp of first shell, ch 2 , cl in same ch $s p$ as beg ch-2, fptr around next post $s t$, cl in ch $s p$ of last shell, turn.

Row [9]: Ch 2, bpdc dec around next post st and turning ch. Fasten off.

## Back Shaping

Row 1: Sk next $2[4,4,4,6]$ shells from end of row 1 on First Front Shaping, join (see Pattern Notes) in next dc, ch 2, [shell in ch sp of next shell, bpdc around next post st] 12 [12, $14,16,16$ ] times, shell dec in ch $s p$ of next shell and post st, turn.

Rows 2-4: Rep rows 2-4 of First Front Shaping. ( 10 [10, 12, 14, 14] shells at end of last row)

## Sizes Small \& Medium Only

Row 5: Sl st across to first ch-3 sp, ch 2, cl in same ch sp as beg ch-2, [bpdc around next post st, shell in ch sp of next shell] across to last post st, bpdc around post st, cl in ch sp of last shell, turn. (8 [8] shells)

Row 6: Ch 3, [fptr around next post st, (cl, ch $2, \mathrm{cl}$ ) in ch sp of next shell] across to last
post sts, fptr dec in last post st and turning ch. Fasten off.

## Sizes Large, X-Large \& 2X-Large Only

Rows [5 \& 6]: Rep rows [5 and 6] of First Front Shaping. ([10, 12, 12] shells at end of last row)

Row [7]: Ch 2, [shell in ch sp of next shell, bpdc around next post st] across to last shell, shell dec in ch sp of last shell and turning ch, turn.

Row [8]: SI st across to ch sp of first shell, ch 2 , cl in same ch $s p$ as beg ch-2, [fptr around next post $s t$, shell in ch sp of next shell] across to last post st, fptr around last post st, cl in ch sp of last shell, turn. ([8, 10, 10] shells)

Row [9]: Ch 2, [bpdc around next post st, (cl, ch 2, cl) in ch sp of next shell] across to last post st, bpde dec around last post st and turning ch. Fasten off.

## 2nd Front Shaping

Sk next $2[4,4,4,6]$ shells from end of row 1 of Back Shaping, join in next dc, rep instructions for First Front Shaping, working in turning ch instead of post st at end of first row.

## Sleeve

Make 2.
Row 1: First foundation $s c, 40[44,52,56,60]$ next foundation sc, turn. (41 [45, 53, 57, 61] sc)

Row 2: Work row 2 of Pattern. (10 [11, 13, 14, 15] shells)

Rows 3-10 [3-10, 3-12, 3-12, 3-14]:
[Work rows 3 and 4 of Pattern alternately] 4 [ $4,5,5,6]$ times.

Row 11 [11, 13, 13, 15]: Ch 3, [(cl, ch 2, cl) in ch sp of next shell, fptr around next post st] $1[2,2,2,3]$ time(s), [shell in ch sp of next shell, fptr around next post st $8[7,9,10,9]$ times, [(cl, ch 2, cl) in ch sp of next shell, fptr around next post st] across, ending with dc in turning ch. Fasten off.

## Sleeve Cap Shaping

Row 1: Sk next 1 [2, 2, 2, 3] shell(s) from end, join in next dc, ch 2, [shell in ch sp of next shell, bpdc around next post $s t]\left[\begin{array}{ll} \\ \hline\end{array}, 9,8\right]$
times, shell dec in ch $s p$ of next shell and post st, turn. (8 [7, 9, 10, 9] shells)

Next rows: Work same as Back Shaping. (4 [3, 3, 4, 3] shells at end of last row)

## Finishing

Pin Body and Sleeves out to measurements on schematics. Spray with water to block and allow to dry.

## Edging

With RS facing, join to Body with sc, evenly sp sc around, join in beg sc. Fasten off.
Rep Edging around each Sleeve.

## Raglan Seam

Pin Sleeve to Body with WS facing. Align front raglan, underarm and back raglan, join to RS of seam, sl st in each sc down raglan, across underarm and up opposite raglan working both Sleeves at once. Fasten off.

## Collar Edging

Getting started: Place st markers at back neck inside corners and collar at outside edge, join to bottom edge of Body on WS.

Row 1: Ch 2, ext sc (see Special Stitches) each sc up edge, around neck and back down opposite side, turn.

Rows 2-7: Ch 2, ext sc in each st across to first marker, 2 ext sc in marked st, [ext sc in each st across to next marker, sk marked st] twice, ext sc in each st across to next marker, 2 sc in marked st, ext sc in each st across, turn.

Row 8: Ch 1, sc in each st across. Fasten off.

## Embroidery

Join dewberry to row 1 at bottom edge of Collar Edging, surface st (see Special Stitches) across to opposite end. Fasten off.
Rep across row 8.

## Sleeve Edging

Getting started: Join to RS of underarm on edge of 1 Sleeve.

Row 1: Ch 8, sc in 2nd ch from hook and in each ch across, $s l$ st in each of next 2 sts on rnd 1 of Sleeve, turn. (7sc)

Row 2: Sk sl sts, working in back Ips (see Stitch Guide), sc in each sc across, turn.

Row 3: Working in back lps, ch 1 , sc in each sc across, sl st in each of next 2 sts on rnd 1 of Sleeve, turn.

Next rows: Rep rows 2 and 3 across Sleeve. At end of last row, leaving long end, fasten off. Sew first and last rows tog.
Rep on rem Sleeve. C!

Rnd 11 [11, 13, 13, 13, 13]: Ch 5 (see Pattern Notes), sc in next ch-5 sp, ch 2, [dc in next sc, ch 2, sc in next ch-5 sp, ch 2] around, join in 3 rd ch of beg ch-5, turn. ( 23 [26, 29, 32, $35,38] d c, 23[26,29,32,35,38] ~ s c)$

Rnd 12 [12, 14, 14, 14, 14]: Ch 1 , sc in first st, ch 5 , [sc in next dc, ch 5] around, join in first $s$, turn.

Rnd 13 [13, 15, 15, 15, 15]: Ch 1 , sc in first $s t, 4$ sc in next ch-5 sp, [sc in next sc, 4 sc in next ch-5 sp] around, join in first sc, turn.

Rnd 14 [14, 16, 16, 16, 16]: Ch 1 , sc in each st around, join in first sc, turn.

Rnds 15-42 [15-42, 17-48, 17-48, 17-48, 17-48]: [Rep rnds 1-14 [1-14, 1-16, 1-16, 1-16, 1-16 consecutively] twice.

Rnds 43-47 [43-47, 49-54, 49-54, 49-54, 49-54]: Rep rnds 1-5 [1-5, 1-6, 1-6, 1-6, 1-6].

## Back \& Back of Sleeves

Row 6 [6, 7, 7, 7, 7]: Ch 1, sc in first st, [ch 5, sk next 4 sts, sc in next st] across, turn. ( $32[34,35,37,38,40]$ sc, 31 [33, 34, 36, 37, 39] ch-5 sps)

Row $\mathbf{7}[\mathbf{7 , 8 , 8 , 8 , 8 ] : ~ C h} 5$, sc in next ch-5 $\mathrm{sp}, \mathrm{ch} 2$, dc in next sc, [ch 2, sc in next ch-5 sp, ch 2 , dc in next sc] across, turn. ( 32 [ $34,35,37$, $38,40] d c, 31[33,34,36,37,39]$ sc)

Row 8 [8, 9, 9, 9, 9]: Ch 1, sc in first st, [ch 5 , sc in next dc] across, turn.

Row 9 [9, 10, 10, 10, 10]: Ch 1 , sc in first st, [4 sc in next ch-5 sp, sc in next sc] across, turn.

Rows 10-18 [10-18, 11-21, 1121, 11-21, 11-21]: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.

Rows 19-22
[19-22, 22-25, 22-25, 22-25,
22-25]: Rep rows 6-9 [6-9, 7-10, 7-10, 7-10, 7-10].

Rows 23-27
[23-27, 26-31,
26-31, 26-31,
26-31]: Ch 1 , sc in
each st across, turn. At end of last row, fasten off.

## Front \& Front of Sleeves

Row 1: For first Sleeve, first foundation sc, 49 next foundation sc, with RS facing, for Front, sc in next unworked st on last row of Body, sc in same st, sc in each of next 59 [64, 74, 79, 89, 94] sts, for 2nd Sleeve, insert hook in same st as last st made, pull up lp , yo, pull through first Ip on hook (ch 1), yo, pull through both Ips on hook (sc), 49 next foundation sc, turn. ( $161[166,176,181,191,196]$ sc)
Rows 2-8 [2-8, 2-9, 2-9, 2-9, 2-9]:
Rep rows 2-8 [2-8, 2-9, 2-9, 2-9, 2-9] for Back \& Back of Sleeve.

Row 9 [10]: Ch 1, sc in first st, [4 sc in next ch-5 sp, sc in next sc] across, turn. (161 [181, 191, 196] sc)

Row [9]: Ch 1, sc in first st, [4 sc in next ch-5 sp, sc in next sc] 10 times, 5 sc in next ch-5 sp, [ 2 sc in next $\mathrm{sc}, 5 \mathrm{sc}$ in next $\mathrm{ch}-5 \mathrm{sp}$ ] twice, sc in next $s c$, [ 4 sc in next ch-5 sp, sc in next sc] across, turn. ([171] sc)

## Size Medium Only

Row [10]: Ch 1 , sc in first st, [4 sc in next ch- 5 sp, sc in next sc] 10 times, 5 sc in next ch-5 sp, [sc in next sc, 5 sc in next ch-5 sp] 4 times, scin next sc, [ 4 sc in next ch-5 sp, sc in next sc] across, turn. ([181] sc)

## All Sizes

## First Shoulder

Row 1: Ch 1, sc in first st, sc in each of next $70[75,80,80,85,85]$ sts, leaving rem sts unworked, turn. ( 71 [ $76,81,81,86,86]$ sc)


Rows 2-9 [2-9, 2-11, 2-11, 2-11, 2-11]: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.

Rows 10-13 [10-13, 12-15, 12-15, 12-15, 12-15]: Rep rows 6-9 [6-9, 7-10, 7-10, 7-10, 7-10] for Back \& Back of Sleeve.

Rows 14-18 [14-18, 16-21 16-21, 16-21, 16-21]: Ch 1 , sc in each st across, turn. At end of last row, fasten off.

## 2nd Shoulder

Row 1: Sk next 19 [19, 19, 19, 19, 24] sts on last row of Front \& Front of Sleeve, join with sc in next st, sc in each st across, turn.

Rows 2-18 [2-18, 2-21, 2-21, 2-21, 2-21]: Rep rows 2-18 [2-18, 2-21, 2-21, 2-21, 2-21] for First Shoulder.

## Assembly

Matching up sts on bottom of each Sleeve, sew bottom seam. Matching up sts on top of each Sleeve and Shoulders, sew top seam.

Rnd 2: Ch 3 (see Pattern Notes), dc in each st around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3.
Rnd 3: Ch 1, sc in first st, fpdc (see Stitch Guide) around next st, [sc in next st, fpdc around next st] around, join in first sc. Fasten off.

## Sleeve Cuff

Rnd 1: Working in ends of rows around end of Sleeve, join with sc in any row, sc in each sc row, 2 sc in each dc row, around, join in first sc. (58 [58, 66, 66, 66, 66] sc)

Rnd 2: Ch 3, dc in each st around, join in 3 rd ch of beg ch-3.

Rnds 3-6: Ch 1, sc in first st, fpdc around next st, [sc in next st, fpdc around next st] around, join in first sc. At end of last rnd, fasten off.
Rep on rem Sleeve.

## Ribbing

Rnd 1: Working on opposite side of foundation row of Body, join in any st, ch 3, 2 dc in next $1[0,1,0,1,0] \mathrm{st}(\mathrm{s})$, dc in each st around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (116 [130, $146,160,176,190] \mathrm{dc})$

Rnds 2-6: Ch 1, sc in first st, fpdc around next st, [sc in next st, fpdc around next st] around, join in first sc. At end of last rnd, fasten off. C!

Rows 30-32: Rep Rows 27-29.

## MATERIALS

First, crocheted cords are woven into 2 large Celtic Knots. Then Knots are framed to make top Bodice pieces. Sleeves and lower half of Bodice are then worked in mesh stitch. The mesh stitch and Knots provide quite a bit of stretch.

For all sizes, both Knot motifs remain the same diameter.

For left-handers: When working Bodice, Front and Back, work as written except reverse all wrong side and right side directives (meaning every time it states to have "RS facing", lefthanders would start with "WS facing" but in same place.
Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.
Chain-2 counts as first half double crochet unless otherwise stated.

## TOP

## Knot

For all cords, work with 2 strands held tog, working in back bar of ch (see illustration), sc in 2nd ch from hook and in each ch across. Fasten off.


Back Bar of Chain

Make 6 of each type of Cord for each Knot.
Straight Cords leave 4-inch ends; mark each with stitch marker.

Looped Cords leave 12-inch ends.

## Back Large Knot <br> Straight Cords:

With ch 46, work Knot.
Looped Cords: With ch 53, work Knot.
Place all Cords in small plastic baggie to keep separate from other Cords.

## Front Small Knot <br> Straight Cords:

With ch 40, work Knot.
Looped Cords: With ch 47, work Knot.
Place all Cords in small plastic baggie to keep separate from other Cords.

## Weave Cords

1. Photocopy Knot diagrams on page 50 as indicated to achieve measurements.
2. Place Back Large Knot diagram on board and secure with pins.
3. Work with Cords RS up.
4. Lay each Cord marked with stitch marker along straighter cord paths shaded on diagram.
5. Secure each Cord with pins and make sure to pass correctly over and under previous Cords.
6. Lay rem Cords along looped paths making sure to pass correctly over and under; secure with pins.

8. Once Knot is woven and still pinned to board, use ends to sew all joins tog being careful not to have sts show on RS.

11. Rep entire process with Front Small Knot.
12. Using steam iron set to wool and cotton pressing cloth, steam-block each Knot for a few seconds. Adjust sps and Cords again and pin in place. Let dry overnight.


## Back Right-Hand Side (G)

Row 1: With RS facing, join with sc in 12th sc of Ip F, [ch 7, tr in 6th sc of next lp, ch 7, tr in 10th sc of same Ip] 6 times, ch 3 , tr in 4th sc of next lp, turn leaving rem sts unworked.

Row 2: [Ch 5, 2 dc in next ch-7 sp] 12 times, turn.

Row 3: [Ch 5, 2 dc in next ch-5 sp] 11 times, ch 2, dtr in next ch-5 sp, turn.

Row 4: [Ch 5, 2 dc in next ch-5 sp] 10 times, ch 5, sk next dc , tr in next dc leaving rem sts unworked, turn.

## Size Small Only

Fasten off.

## Sizes Medium, Large \& X-Large Only

Row [5]: [Ch 5, 2 dc in next ch-5 sp] across, turn.

Rows [6, 6-8, 6-10]: Rep row [5] [1, 3, 5] time(s). At end of last row, fasten off.

## Back Left-Hand Side (H)

Repeat as for $G$ except start with WS facing and in 12th sc of $D$.

## Top Back Bodice

Rnd 1: Working around Large Knot with 1 strand of yarn throughout, join with sc to any Right point of any 2 close points (see * on Large Knot Diagram), [ch 10, sc in next point, ch 10, dtr in concave point between current point and next point (** on diagram), ch 10 , sc in next point] around, join (see Pattern Notes) in first sc.

Rnd 2: Work 15 sc in each ch-10 sp around, join in first sc. Fasten off.

Mark center top 3 lps and center bottom 3 lps (labeled A, B, C and D, E, F in diagram) with stitch markers, mark B with 2 more stitch markers. Mark E with 1 more stitch marker.

## Section I

Row 1: With RS facing, join in first dc in 3rd 2-dc group from top edge, [ch 5, 2 dc in next ch- 5 sp] across, turn.

Row 2: [Ch 5, 2 dc in next ch-5 sp] across, turn.
Rows 3 \& 4 [3-6, 3-7, 3-8]: [Rep
row 2] $2[4,5,6]$ times. At end of last row, fasten off.

## Section K

Rep Section I but start with WS facing.

## Section J

Row 1: With RS facing, join in first dc, [ch 5, 2 dc in next sp] 3 times, dtr in next ch-5 sp , turn.

Row 2: [Ch 5, 2 dc in next sp] 3 times, turn.
Row(s) 3 [3 \& 4, 3-5, 3-6]: [Rep row 2] $0[1,2,3]$ time(s). At end of last row, fasten off.

## Section L

Rep as for Section J but beg with WS facing.

## Bottom Back Edging

Row 1: With RS facing, join with hde at T, work 2 hdc across each dc row and 3 hdc in each $s p$ up to large sp just before knot, 6 hdc in next $s p, s k$ next $s c, s c$ in each of next $8 s c, s k$ next 2 sc , sl st in each of next 14 sc , sk next 2 $s c$, $s c$ in each of next $8 \mathrm{sc}, \mathrm{sk}$ next $\mathrm{sc}, 6$ hdc in next sp , continue working 2 hdc across each dc row and 3 hdc in each sp to other end, turn.

Row 2: Ch 2, hdc in each st across. Fasten off.

## Top Front Bodice

Rnd 1: Working around Small Knot, with RS facing, join with sc to any left point of 2 close points (see * on Small Knot Diagram), [ch 12, sc in next point] around, join in first sc.

Row 2: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.
Row 3: Ch 1, sc in each sc across, working fpdc around each of 6 fpdc on row before last, sk sts on working row behind fpdc (see Pattern Notes), turn.

Row 4: Rep row 2.
Rep rows 1-4 consecutively for Body Pattern.

## VEST

## Back

With size H hook, ch 65 [71, 79, 85, 93], work foundation row of Body Pattern, then rep rows 1-4 of Body Pattern for 24 rows, you will have a total of 25 rows.

Dec row (RS): Ch 1, sc dec (see Stitch Guide) in first 2 sts, work in established pattern across, ending with sc dec in last 2 sts , turn. ( 62 [68, 76, 82, 90] sc)

Next rows: Work 5 rows even in Body Pattern.

Next row: Rep dec row. (60 [66, 74, 80, 88] sts)

## Armhole Shaping

Next rows: Continue established pattern and dec 1 st each edge every row $4[4,6,6,8]$ times. $(44[46,50,54,58]$ sts at end of last row)

Next rows: Work even in established pattern until armhole measures $61 / 4[63 / 4,71 / 4$, $73 / 4,81 / 4]$ inches from beg of Armhole, ending with WS.

## Back Neck \& Shoulder Shaping

Left Side: Work in pattern across first $10[11,13,15,17]$ sts, dec 1 st at neck edge every row 7 times until $3[4,6,8,10]$ sts rem, then work 2 rows even, at end of last row, fasten off.

Right Side: Sk center 24 sts, join with sc in next st and work $9[10,12,14,16]$ sc for total of 10 [11, 13, 15, 17] sc, complete as for Left Side.

## Front

Work as for Back through completion of Armhole Shaping. Work 5 rows in established Body Pattern.

Chain-3 at beginning of round counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.
Chain-2 at beginning of round counts as first half double crochet unless otherwise stated.

## SPECIAL STITCHES

Slip ring: Leaving 4-inch end (see illustration), lap thread over end forming Ip, insert hook through Ip from front to back, yo, pull through Ip to form ring, yo, pull through Ip on hook.
Beginning double crochet cluster (beg dc cl): Ch $\mathbf{3}$ (see Pattern Notes), holding back last



Slip Ring
Ip of each st on hook, 2 dc in same st as beg ch-3, yo, pull through all lps on hook.

Double crochet cluster (dc cl): Holding back last lp of each st on hook, 3 dc as indicated in instructions, yo, pull through all lps on hook.
Beginning half double crochet cluster (beg hdc cl): Ch 2 (see Pattern Notes), holding back last Ip of each st on hook, 2 hdc in same st as beg ch-2, yo, pull through all lps on hook.
Half double crochet cluster (hdc cl): Holding back last Ip of each st on hook, 3 hdc as indicated in instructions, yo, pull through all lps on hook.
Joining chain-5 (joining ch-5): Ch 2, insert hook in corresponding Ip of finished Block, yo, pull Ip through, ch 2.

## SCARF

## First Block

Rnd 1: Make slip ring (see Special Stitches), ch 1,6 sc in ring, join (see Pattern Notes) in first $s c$. ( 6 sc )

Rnd 2: Beg de cl (see Special Stitches) in first st, ch 4, [dc cl (see Special Stitches) in next st, ch 4] around, join in top of beg dc cl. ( 6 dc cls , 6 ch sps)

Rnd 3: SI st in first ch sp, (beg hdc clsee Special Stitches, ch 3, dc cl, ch 3, hdc clsee Special Stitches) in same ch sp as beg slst, ch 3, sc in next ch sp, ch 3, [(hdc cl, ch 3, dc cl, ch 3, hdc cl) in next ch sp, ch 3, sc in next ch sp, ch 3] around, join in beg hde cl.

Rnd 4: Sl st in first ch sp, ch $1,(2 \mathrm{sc}$, ch $3, \mathrm{sc})$ in same ch sp as beg ch-1, *ch 5 , (sc, ch 3,2 sc) in next ch sp, ch 3, [2 sc in next ch sp, ch 3] twice**, (2 sc, ch 3, sc) in next ch sp, rep from * around, ending last rep at ${ }^{* *}$, join in beg sc. Fasten off.

- Tapestry needle
- Sewing needle
- Sewing thread to match barley
- $7 / 8$-inch La Mode button from Blumenthal Lansing \#26287
- 58 -inch La Mode buttons from Blumenthal Lansing \#26293: 2
- Stitch markers


## GAUGE

Size I hook: $14 \mathrm{sc}=4$ inches; 16 sc rows $=$ 4 inches

## PATTERN NOTES

Body of Beret is worked with 2 strands of yarn held together.
Beret trim and Mitts are worked with single strand of yarn.
Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

Chain-3 at beginning of round counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

## BERET

## Brim

Row 1: With size $L$ hook and 2 strands of barley held tog (see Pattern Notes), ch 8, sc in 2nd ch from hook and in each ch across, turn. (7 sc)
Row 2: Top edge of Brim will be edge with starting end of yarn, working in back lps (see Stitch Guide), ch 2, sc in first st and in each st across, turn.

Row 3: Working in back lps, ch 1 , sc in each st across, turn.

Rows 4-42 [4-44] or until bottom edge of Brim when stretched is as wide as your head circumference: [Rep rows 2 and 3 alternately] 20 [21] times, ending last rep with row 2.

Rows 43-46 [45-48]: [Rep rows 3 and 2 alternately] twice.

## Frill Edging

Working in front Ips (see Stitch Guide), ch 2, $s l s t$ in next $s t,[c h 2$, s $s t$ in next $s t] 5$ times, leaving rem sts unworked.

Leaving 12 -inch end, fasten off.

## Finishing

Fold Brim so last 4 rows or 2-inch section overlap with Frill Edging on top of beg few rows of Brim, pin in place. Try on and adjust placement of overlap if necessary so Brim fits snugly at bottom edge.
Sew overlap in place along top and bottom edge of Brim. Edge of overlap will be at front of Beret toward left side.

## Crown

Getting started: With size M hook, join (see Pattern Notes) 2 strands of barley at top edge of Brim in back area, in 1 of ch-2 sps which were formed at beg of each even numbered row, to work on RS. Place marker to indicate end of rnd and move it up after completing each rnd.
Rnd 1: Ch $\mathbf{3}$ (see Pattern Notes), 2 dc in same ch sp as beg ch-3, 3 dc in each ch-2 2 sp around top edge of Brim working through back layer of overlap, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (63 [66] dc)

Rnd 2: Working in back lps, ch 3, dc in each st around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3.

Rnd 3: Working in both lps, ch 3, dc in each of next 7 sts, dc dec (see Stitch Guide) in next 2 sts , [dc in each of next 8 sts , dc dec in next 2 sts] around, ending with dc each of last 3 [6] dc , join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (57 [60] dc)
Rnd 4: Ch 3, dc in each of next 2 sts, dc dec in next 2 sts , [dc in each of next 7 sts , dc dec in next 2 sts] around, ending with dc each of last 7 [1] st(s), join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (57 [53] dc)

Rnd 5: Ch 3, dc in each of next 5 sts , dc dec in next 2 sts, [dc in each of next 6 sts, dc dec in next 2 sts] around, ending with dc in each of last 3 [5] sts, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (45 [47] dc)

Rnd 6: Ch 3, dc in next st, dc dec in next 2 sts, [dc in each of next 5 sts, dc dec in next 2 sts] around, ending with dc in each of last 6 [1] st(s), join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (39 [40] dc)

Rnd 7: Ch 3, dc in each of next 3 sts , dc dec in next 2 sts , [ dc in each of next 4 sts , dc dec in next 2 sts] around, ending with dc in each of last 3 [4] sts, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3.
(33 [34] dc)
Rnd 8: Ch 3, dc in next st, dc dec in next 2 sts, [dc in each of next $2 \mathrm{sts}, \mathrm{dc}$ dec in next 2 sts ] around, ending with dc in each of last 1 [2] $\mathrm{st}(\mathrm{s})$, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (25 [26] dc)

Rnd 9: Ch 3, [dc dec in next 2 sts] around, ending with dc in last 0 [1] st(s), join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. Leaving 8 -inch end, fasten off. (13 [14] dc)
Weave yarn end through tops of sts on last rnd, pull to close. Secure end.

## Fob

Braid: With size $H$ hook and 1 strand of honey (see Pattern Notes), ch 4, sl st in first ch to form ring, [ch 7, sl st in ring] 5 times, leaving 10 -inch end, fasten off.

## Ribbon

## Make 2.

With size H hook and 1 strand of scarlet, ch 10 , sl st in 3rd ch from hook, sc in each of next 2 chs, hdc in each of next 2 chs, dc in each of last 3 chs. Leaving 10-inch end, fasten off.


## Assembly

Remove markers. Insert 11 [12]-inch dinner plate inside Beret with Crown centered at back of plate and Brim at front of plate.
Steam-block Beret, giving Crown extra steam to soften.



Rnd 2: Sc in each st around.
Rnds 3-5 or until Hand measurement from top of Cuff is 1 inch: Rep rnd 2.

## Thumb Gusset

Getting started: Place markers for Thumb in 11th [13th] and 13th [15th] sts using different color for end of rnd marker. Move marker up as you work.

Rnd 1: Sc in each st across to first marker, sc in marked st, 2 sc in next st, sc in next marked st (2 sc between marked sts), sc in each st around.

Rnd 2: Sc in each st around to first marker, $s c$ in marked st, 2 sc in next $s t, 2$ sc in each of next 2 sts, sc in next marked st ( 4 sc between marked sts), sc in each st around.

Rnd 3: Sc in each st around to first marker, sc in marked st, 2 sc in next st, sc in each st across to 1 st before next marker, 2 sc in next st, sc in next marked st ( 6 sts between marked sts), sc in each st around.

Rnds 4-6: Rep rnd 3, ending with 12 sts between marked sts on last rnd.

Rnd 7: Sc in each st around to first marker, remove marker, sc in marked sc, sc in next st, sk next 10 sts (thumb), sc in next st before next marker, remove marker, sc in marked st and in each st around.

## Hand Continued

Rnd 8: Sc in each st around, omitting Thumb Gusset. (23 [27] sc)

Rnds 9-12: Rep rnd 8.
Rnd 13: Ch 1, dc dec (see Stitch Guide) in first 2 sts, dc in each st around to center of rnd, dc dec in next 2 sts, dc in each st around, join in top of first dc dec. Fasten off.

## Hand Edging

With size $H$ hook and WS facing, join scarlet with sc in any st, sc in each st around, join in beg sc. Fasten off.

## Thumb

Rnd 1: Join barley with sc in area between Thumb and Hand, on rnd 7 of Thumb Gusset, sc in same place, sc in each of 10 sk sts, do not join. (12 [12] sc)

Rnd 2: Sc in each st around, join in beg sc. Fasten off.

## Thumb Edging

With WS facing and size H hook, join scarlet with sc in last st of rnd 2 on Thumb, sc in each st around, working sc dec (see Stitch Guide) in 2 sc at area near hand, join in first sc. Fasten off.

## Strap

With size H hook and honey, make ch 1 inch longer than circumference of Mitt above Cuff, dc in 4th ch from hook (end $A$ ), in each ch across. Leaving long end, fasten off.

## Finishing

Remove all markers.
Lightly steam-block Mitts.
Sew Strap above Cuff with end A overlapping the other end at outer side of Mitt.

Sew one $5 / 8$-inch button on Strap 1 inch from end $A$. $C$ !

Working in Tunisian pattern: 12 sts $=4$ inches; 12 rows $=4$ inches

PATTERN NOTES
Shawlette is worked vertically with short row shaping.
Tunisian crochet rows consist of 2 passes per row-a pick-up pass and a work-off or return pass. The right side of work is always facing.
First vertical bar of row is skipped as that stitch is already on your hook. This stitch is not referenced in instructions.
If you would like a more (or less) generous overlap you can add (or delete) a repeat of Rows 12-17. Each repeat adds or subtracts approximately 9 inches to the lower edge. If you are going to add repeats you will require another skein of yarn.
To cast on stitches: Holding hook with sts in right hand and positioning left hand with palm facing you, wrap working yarn from front to back around left thumb with left fingers lightly holding tail of working yarn to palm, insert hook into the resulting loop from front to back rotating hook to grab the back strand and pull it through the loop; let loop slide off the thumb and tighten it on the hook. Do not over tighten or it will be difficult to work loop off hook on the return pass of the row.


## SPECIAL STITCHES

Tunisian knit stitch (tks): Insert hook from front to back between strands of next vertical bar, yo and draw through, keeping Ip on hook.

## Extended Tunisian knit stitch (extks):

Insert hook as if to work tks (see Special Stitches), yo, and draw through, ch 1, keeping Ip on hook.
Tunisian simple stitch (tss): Insert hook from right to left under next vertical bar, yo and draw through, keeping Ip on hook.

## Extended Tunisian simple stitch (extss):

 Insert hook as if to work tss (see Special Stitches), yo and draw through, ch 1, keeping Ip on hook.
## SHAWLETTE

Row 1: Ch 39 loosely, working in back bar of ch (see illustration), pick up Ip in 2nd ch from hook and in each rem ch across (39 lps on hook).

Row 1 return: $\mathrm{Y}_{0}$, draw through 1 Ip on hook, ${ }^{*} y 0$, draw through 2 lps on hook, rep from * until 1 lp rem on hook.


## Back Bar of Chain

Row 4: Tks in next st, [yo, sk next st, tks in next st] 4 times, *yo, sk next st, extks in next st, rep from * until 2 sts rem, yo, sk next st, extss under both strands of final st.

Row 4 return: Yo, draw through 1 lp ; [yo, draw through 2 lps 28 times, leave rem 10 lps on hook.

Row 5: Tks in next st, *yo, sk next st, extks in next st, rep from * until 3 sts rem yo, sk next st, extss final 2 sts tog ( 37 lps on hook).

Row 5 return: Rep row 1 return.
Row 6: Rep row 2 (37 lps on hook).
Row 6 return: Yo, draw through 1 lp , [yo, draw through 2 lps] 27 times, leave rem 10 lps on hook.

Row 7: Rep row 3 ( 36 lps on hook).
Row 7 return: Rep row 1 return.
Row 8: Rep row 4 (36 lps on hook).
Row 8 return: $\mathrm{Y}_{\mathrm{o}}$, draw through 1 lp , [yo, draw through 2 lps] 26 times, leave rem 10 lps on hook.

Row 9: Rep row 5 (35 lps on hook).
Row 9 return: Rep row 1 return.
Row 10: Rep row 2 (35 Ips on hook).

Row 10 return: $\mathrm{Y}_{0}$, draw through 1 lp ; [yo, draw through 2 lps] 25 times, leave rem 10 lps on hook.

Row 11: Rep row 3 (34 lps on hook).
Row 11 return: Rep row 1 return.
Row 12: Rep row 4 ( 34 lps on hook).
Row 12 return: $\mathrm{Y}_{0}$, draw through 1 lp , [yo, draw through 2 lps] 24 times, leave rem 10 lps on hook.

Row 13: Rep row 5 (33 lps on hook).
Row 13 return: Rep row 1 return.
Row 14: Rep row 2 (33 lps on hook).
Row 14 return: Yo, draw through 1 lp, [yo, draw through 2 lps] 23 times, leave rem 10 lps on hook.

Row 15: Rep row 3 (32 lps on hook).
Row 15 return: Rep row 1 return.
Row 16: Rep row 4 (32 lps on hook).
Row 16 return: Yo, draw through 1 lp, [yo, draw through 2 lps] 22 times, leave rem 10 lps on hook.

Row 17: Tks in next st, *yo, sk next st, extks in next st, rep from * until 1 st rem, extss under both strands of final st, cast on 7 lps (see Pattern Notes). (39 Ips on hook)

Row 17 return: Rep row 1 return.
Rows 18-161: Rep rows 2-17 9 times.
Rows 162-176: Rep Rows 2-16.
Row 177: Tks in next st, *yo, sk next st, extks in next st, rep from * until 1 st rem, extss under both strands of final st ( 32 lps on hook).

Row 177 return: $\mathrm{Y}_{0}$, draw through 1 lp , *yo, draw through 2 lps, rep from * until one lp rem on hook.
Bind off first 9 sts with $s l s t$ as if to tss, bind off rem sts with sc as if to tks.

## Edging

Transfer final Ip to standard I hook, work 2 additional sc in same st, working along lower edge, *[ch 3, sc in end of next row] until next point, 3 sc in 2 strands from opposite side of
final cast-on st of point, [ch 3, sc in 2 strands from opposite side of next cast-on st] 5 times, ch 3, work sc dec (see Stitch Guide) in opposite side of next cast-on st and end of next row, rep from * across, end with 3 sc in first st on opposite side of foundation ch, working across opposite side of foundation ch along straight edge, $\Delta$ ch 3 , sk 1 st, sc in next st, rep from $\diamond$ across, end with 3 sc in opposite side of final ch, working along top edge, ${ }^{* *}$ ch 3, sk 1 row end, $s c$ in next row end, ch 3 , sc in skipped row end, rep from ** along top edge, end with 3 sc in final st, rep between $\diamond$ along 2nd straight edge, end with sl st in final sc of bind off to join.

## Finishing

Weave in all ends. If desired, block lightly. C!

$481 / 2$ inches wide at widest point x $311 / 2$ inches deep (blocked)

## MATERIALS

- Premier Yarns Deborah Norville Serenity Garden fine (sport) weight microfiber yarn ( $21 / 40 \mathrm{oz}$ ) 185 yds/65g per skein):

4 skeins \#0007 crocus

- Size G/6/4mm crochet hook or size needed to

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- Tapestry needle
- Stitch marker
- Blocking board
- Blocking pins


## GAUGE

In pattern: 3 pattern reps $=41 / 2$ inches;
8 pattern st rows $=41 / 2$ inches after blocking

## PATTERN NOTES

Mark center stitch with stitch marker and move up on each row.

Weave in ends as work progresses.
Chain-6 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet and chain 3 unless otherwise stated.

Chain-3 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

Chain-4 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet and chain 1 unless otherwise stated.

## SPECIAL STITCH

Cluster (cl): Holding back last lp of each dc, 5 dc in sp indicated, yo and draw through all Ips on hook.

## SHAWL

Row 1: Ch 6 (see Pattern Notes), dc in first ch, turn.

Row 2: Ch 3 (see Pattern Notes), 7 dc in ch-3 sp, dc in last dc, turn. (9 dc)

Row 3: Ch 4 (see Pattern Notes), sk first 2 dc , sc in each of next 5 sts, sk next dc, ch 1, dc in last dc, turn. (2dc, 5 sc)

Row 4: Ch 4, sc in next sc, ch 3, sk next sc, dc in next sc, place marker in st just made to indicate center st, ch 3, sk next sc, sc in next sc, ch 1 , dc in last dc , turn. ( $3 \mathrm{dc}, 2 \mathrm{sc}, 2 \mathrm{ch}-3 \mathrm{sps}$, 2 (h-1 sps)

Row 5: Ch 6, dc in first st, ch 2, (dc, ch 3, dc) in next dc, move marker to ch-3 sp just made to indicate center, ch 2, (dc, ch 3, dc) in last dc, turn. ( $6 d c, 3$ ch-3 sps, 2 ch-2 sps)

Row 6: Ch 3, 7 dc in next ch-3 sp, ch 1, cl (see Special Stitch) in center ch-3 sp, move marker to st just made, ch 1,7 dc in next ch-3 sp, dc in last dc, turn. ( $16 \mathrm{dc}, 1 \mathrm{cl}, 2$ ch-sps)

Row 7: Ch 4, sk 2 dc , sc in each of next 5 sts, sk next sc, ch 2, sc in top of cl, move marker to st just made, ch 2, sk next dc, sc in next 5 sts, ch $1, \mathrm{dc}$ in last dc , turn. ( $11 \mathrm{sc}, 2$ ch-sps, 2 dc )

Row 8: Ch 4, *sc in next sc, ch 3, sk next sc, dc in next sc, ch 3, sk next sc, sc in next sc*, sc in ch-2 sp, ch 3, dc in sc, move marker to st just
made, ch 3 , sc in ch-2 sp, rep between * once, ch 1 , dc in dc , turn. ( $5 \mathrm{dc}, 6 \mathrm{sc}, 6 \mathrm{ch}-3 \mathrm{sps}, 2 \mathrm{ch}-1 \mathrm{sps}$ )

Row 9: Ch 6, dc in first st, ch 2 *(dc, ch 3, dc) in next dc, ch 2, rep from * across to last st, ( $\mathrm{dc}, \mathrm{ch} 3, \mathrm{dc}$ ) in last dc, turn.

Row 10: Ch 3, *7 dc in next ch-3 sp, ch 1, rep from * to center st, cl in center st, **ch 1, 7 dc in next ch-3 sp, rep from ** across, end with dc in last dc, turn.

Row 11: Ch 4, sk first st, *sk next dc, sc in each of next 5 dc , sk next dc, ch 2 , rep from * to center, sc in cl, *ch $2, s k 1 \mathrm{dc}$, sc in each of next 5 dc , sk 1 dc , rep from * across, end with ch $1, \mathrm{dc}$ in last dc , turn.

Row 12: Ch 4, *sc in next sc, ch 3, sk next sc, dc in next sc, ch 3, sk next sc, sc in next sc, sc in next ch-2 sp, rep from * to center, ch 3, dc in center $s c$, ch 3 , *sc in ch-2 $s p$, sc in next sc, ch 3 , sk next sc, dc in next sc, ch 3, sk next sc, sc in last sc, rep from * across, end with ch 1, dc in last st, turn.

Rows 13-68: [Rep rows 9-12] 14 times. At end of last row, fasten off.

## Fringe

Cut seventeen 11-inch lengths of yarn. For each knot of Fringe, fold 7 lengths in half. Draw folded end through bottom of Shawl. Draw yarn ends through folded end and pull tight. Tie 1 knot at top left corner and 1 knot at top right corner. Tie 7 knots on each side of Shawl at the end of every other row 10 rep. Trim ends evenly.

## Finishing

Block to measurements.


# Cascading Leaves Bag

## MATERIALS

- Universal Yarn Classic Worsted medium (worsted) weight acrylic/ wool yarn ( $31 / 20 z / 197 \mathrm{yds} / 100 \mathrm{~g}$ per ball): 3 balls \#632 leaf green
- Sizes $\mathrm{G} / 6 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ and $\mathrm{H} / 8 / 5 \mathrm{~mm}$ crochet hooks or sizes needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle
- 6 -inch round cane handles
- Hand steamer
- Pressing ham or large cotton towel
- Straight pins
- Stitch marker


## GAUGES

Size G hook: 4 sc or hdc $=1$ inch; 4 sc rows = 1 inch

Size H hook: Complete leaf is $2 \frac{1}{2}$ inches wide x 3 inches high

## PATTERN NOTES

Leaf stitches are worked from top to bottom over 5 front post double crochet stitches on left side of leaf placement, then work is turned and stitches are worked from bottom to top up 5 front post double crochet stitches on right side of leaf placement.
Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.
Chain-2 at beginning of round counts as first half double crochet unless otherwise stated.

Chain-3 at beginning of round counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

## SPECIAL STITCH

Cable: Beg on WS, sk indicated st, dc in each of next 3 sts, yo, move hook to RS and insert hook from front to back into sk st before dc group, loosely pull up Ip, bring Ip up to height of dc group, yo, complete as dc.

## BAG

Rnd 1: Beg at bottom, with size $G$ hook, ch 19,5 hdc in 2nd ch from hook, hdc in each of next 16 chs, 5 hdc in last ch, working on
opposite side of ch, hdc in each of next 16 chs, join (see Pattern Notes) in top of first hdc. (42 hdc)

Rnd 2: Ch 2 (see Pattern Notes), hdc in same st as beg ch-2, 2 hdc in each of next 4 sts, hdc in each of next 16 sts, 2 hdc in each of next 5 sts, hdc in each of last 16 sts, join in 2nd ch of beg ch-2. ( 52 hdc )

Rnd 3: Ch 2, [2 hdc in next st, hdc in next st] 5 times, hdc in each of next 16 sts, [2 hdc in next st, hdc in next st] 5 times, hdc in each of last 15 hdc , join in 2nd ch of beg ch-2. ( 62 hdc )

Rnds 4-7: Ch 2, hdc in each hdc around, and at same time evenly sp inc 4 times at each end of oval, join in 2nd ch of beg ch-2. (94 hdc at end of last rnd)

Rnd 8: Ch 2, hdc in each hdc around, and at same time evenly sp inc 3 times at each end of oval, join in 2nd ch of beg ch-2. ( 100 hdc )

Rnd 9: Working in back Ips (see Stitch Guide), ch 2, hdc in each st around, join in 2nd ch of beg ch-2.

Rnd 10: Ch 2, hdc in each of next 2 sts, 2 fpdc (see Stitch Guide) around post of st in rnd 9 directly below last hdc made (beg of leaf placement), [sk st behind last fpdc just made, hdc in each of next 9 sts, 2 fpdc around post of $s t$ in rnd 9 directly below last hdc made] 9 times, sk st behind last fpdc just made, hdc in each of next 6 sts, join 2nd ch of beg ch-2, turn to WS. (110 sts)

Rnd 11: Ch 2, hdc in each of next 6 sts, hdc dec (see Stitch Guide) in next 2 fpdc , [hdc in each of next 9 sts, hdc dec in next 2 fpdc] 9 times, hdc in each of last 2 sts, join in 2nd ch of beg ch-2, turn to RS. (100 sts)

Rnd 12: Ch 2, hdc in each of next 3 sts, 2 fpdc around next fpdc, sk next hdc behind fpdc just made, [hdc in each of next 9 sts, 2 fpdc around next fpdc] 9 times, hdc in each of next 5 sts, join in 2nd ch of beg ch-2, turn. (110 sts)

Rnd 13: Rep rnd 11.
Rnds 14 \& 15: Rep rnds 12 and 13.
Rnd 16: Ch 2, hdc in each of next 3 sts, [fpdc around each of next 2 fpdc , hdc in each of next

4 sts, 2 fpdc around next dc of rnd 14 (beg of upper layer of leaf placement), sk next hdc or rnd 15 behind fpdc just made, hdc in each of next 4 hdc 8 times, fpdc around each of next 2 fpdc, hdc in each of next $4 \mathrm{hdc}, 2$ fpdc around next dc of rnd 14, join in 2nd ch of beg ch-2, turn. (120 sts)

Rnd 17: Ch 2, hdc dec in next 2 fpdc, [hdc in each of next 4 sts, hdc dec in next 2 fpdc] 19 times, hdc in each of next 3 sts, join in 2nd ch of beg ch-2, turn. ( 100 sts)

Rnd 18: Ch 2, hdc in each of next 3 sts, 2 fpdc around next fpdc, hdc in each of next $4 \mathrm{sts}, 2 \mathrm{fpdc}$ around next fpdc, [hdc in each of next 4 sts, 2 fpdc around next fpdc, hdc in each of next $4 \mathrm{sts}, 2 \mathrm{fpdc}$ around next fpdc] 9 times, join in 2nd ch of beg ch-2, turn. ( 120 sts)

Rnd 19: Rep rnd 17.
Rnd 20: Ch 2, hdc in each of next 4 sts, work the following steps to complete rnd:
A. with size H hook, turn and working from top to bottom around posts of next 5 fpdc on left side of first leaf placement, (sc, hdc, dc) around first fpdc, (tr, 2 dtr ) around next post, ( $2 \mathrm{dtr}, \mathrm{tr}$ ) around next post, (dc, hdc, sc) around next post, sl st around next post;
B. ch 1, turn and working from bottom to top around posts on right side of same leaf placement, sl st around next post, (sc, hdc, dc) around next post, (tr, 2 dtr ) around next post, (2 dtr, tr) around next post, (dc, hdc, sc) around next post;
C. sl st into last hdc made of this rnd, with size $G$ hook, do not sk any sts behind completed leaf;
D. [hdc in each of next $4 \mathrm{sts}, 2 \mathrm{fpdc}$ around next fpdc, hdc in each of next 5 sts, with size H hook, turn and working from top to bottom around posts of next 5 fpdc on left side of first leaf placement, (sc, hdc, dc) around first fpdc, (tr, 2 dtr ) around next post, (2 dtr, tr) around next post, (dc, hdc, sc) around next post, sl st around next post, ch 1, turn and working from bottom to top around posts on right side of same leaf placement, sl st around

Rnd 21: Ch 2, hdc dec in next 2 fpdc , [hdc in each of next 8 sts, hdc dec in next 2 fpdc$]$ 9 times, hdc in each of last 7 sts, join 2nd ch of beg ch-2, turn. (90 sts)

Rnd 22: Ch 2, hdc in each of next 7 sts, 2 fpdc around next fpdc, [hdc in each of next 8 sts, 2 fpdc around next fpdc] 9 times, join in 2nd ch of beg ch-2, turn. (100 sts)

Rnds 23 \& 24: Rep rnds 21 and 22.
Rnd 25: Rep rnd 21.
Rnd 26: Ch 2, hdc in each of next 8 sts, work the following steps to complete rnd;
A. with size H hook, turn and working from top to bottom around posts of next 5 fpdc on left side of first leaf placement, (sc, hdc, dc) around first fpdc, (tr, 2 dtr ) around next post, (2 dtr, tr) around next post, (dc, hdc, sc) around next post, sl st around next post;
B. ch 1, turn and working from bottom to top around posts on right side of same leaf placement, sl st around next post, (sc, hdc, dc) around next post, (tr, 2 dtr ) around next post, (2 dtr, tr) around next post, (dc, hdc, sc) around next post;
C. sl st into last hde made of this rnd;
D. [with size $G$ hook, hdc in each of next

9 sts, with size H hook, turn and working from top to bottom around posts of next 5 fpdc on left side of first leaf placement, ( $s c, h d c, d c$ ) around first fpdc, (tr, 2 dtr )
around next post, (2 dtr, tr) around next post, (dc, hdc, sc) around next post, sl st around next post, ch 1, turn and working from bottom to top around posts on right side of same leaf placement, sl st around next post, (sc, hdc, dc) around next post, (tr, 2 dtr ) around next post, (2 dtr, tr) around next post, (dc, hdc, sc) around next post, sl st in last hdc made of this rnd] 9 times;
E. join in 2nd ch of beg ch-2, do not turn. (90 sts and 10 leaves)

Rnd 27: Ch 1, [work 8 sc in between each leaf] around, join in first sc, turn. ( 80 sc )

Rnd 28: Ch 3 (see Pattern Notes), [sk next st, dc in each of next 3 dc , cable (see Special Stitch)] 19 times, sk next st, dc in each of next 2 sts, sl st in top of beg ch-3, yo, and with WS facing, move hook to RS and insert hook from front to back into sk st before dc group, loosely pull up $1 p$, bring it up to height of dc group, yo, complete as $d c$, join in first dc of next dc group, turn. (20 cables)

Rnd 29: Ch 1, sc in back Ip of same st as join and in back lp of each st around, join in first sc. Fasten off. (80 sc)
Use needle and 1 strand to tack sides of each leaf to Bag, where desired.

## Handle Ring <br> Make 2.

Row 1: With size G hook, ch 6, sc in 2nd ch from hook and in each ch across, turn. ( 5 sc )

Rows 2-65: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn. Leaving 18 -inch end, fasten off at end of last row.

Fold long edges of Handle Ring around bone ring, sew long edges tog and short edges tog to cover ring.

## Handle Casing <br> Make 2.

Row 1: With size G hook, ch 31, hdc in 2nd ch from hook and in each of next 9 chs , sc in each of next 10 chs, hdc in each of last 10 chs, turn. (30 sts)

Rows 2-20: Ch 2 (does not count as first $h d c$ ), working in back lps, hdc in first st and in
each of next 9 sts, sc in each of next 10 sts , hdc in each of last 10 sts, turn. Do not turn at end of last row. (30 sts)

## Handle Join

Beg at center of Bag side edge, divide top edge into front and back sections consisting of 40 sts each, turn Handle piece to right, working across ends of rows and in back lps of sts on RS of Bag front, work sl st, ch 1 in end of first row and in first st of Bag, sl st, ch 1 in end of same row and in next st of Bag, [(sl st, ch 1 in end of next row and in next st of bag) 2 times] 19 times. Leaving 24 -inch end, fasten off.
Fold casing through Handle Ring and to WS of Bag, use long end and sew opposite end of Casing to Handle Join.

Rep on opposite side of Bag.

## Flower

Rnd 1: With size G hook, ch 2,9 sc in first ch, do not join, mark first st of rnd. (9 sc)

Rnd 2: 2 sc in each ch around. (18 sc)
Rnd 3: Sc in back Ip in each st around.
Rnd 4: Sc in first sc, 2 sc in next sc, [sc in next $s c, 2$ sc in next $s c] 7$ times, $s c$ in next $s c$, 3 sc in last sc. (28 sc)

Rnd 5 (petal rnd): [Ch 9, sl st in 2nd ch from hook, dc in each of next 3 chs, tr in each of next 3 chs, sk next 3 sts of rnd 4 , sl st in next st] 7 times ending with $s l$ st in base of beg ch-9. Leaving 36-inch end, fasten off. (7 petals)

## Flower Center

With size G hook, ch 8, sl st in first ch to form ring, ch 2 (counts as hdc), hdc in each ch around, join in 2nd ch of beg ch-2. Leaving 12-inch end, fasten off. (8 hdc)

## Assembly

Beg at tip, roll petal up to flower rnd 2, use long end to tack in place.
Rep for rem 6 petals. Use 12 -inch end to sew beg ch of Center to Flower and Flower where desired on Handle Casing of Bag.
Insert pressing ham or rolled up towel into Bag and pin a few leaves flat to Bag. Lightly steam-block with hand steamer and allow to dry. Turn Bag and rep until all leaves have been steamed flat. C!

[sc in next ch, ch 7, sk next 5 chs] around, join (see Pattern Notes) in first sc. ( 60 ch-7 sps)

Rnd 2: Ch 6 (see Pattern Notes), *sc in next ch sp, ch $3^{* *}$, dc in next sc, ch 3, rep from * around, ending last rep at ${ }^{* *}$, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-6. ( 120 ch-3 sps)

Rnd 3: Ch 7 (see Pattern Notes), *sl st in next sc, ch $4^{* *}$, dc in next dc, ch 4, rep from * around, ending last rep at ${ }^{* *}$, join with sc in 3rd ch of beg ch-7.

Rnd 4: Ch 5, sk next sl st, [sc in next dc, ch 5, sk next sl st] around, join with sc in joining sc of last rnd. ( 60 ch-5 sps)

Rnd 5: Ch 7 (does not count as first dc and (h-4 sp), [sc in next sc, ch 7] around, join in joining sc of last rnd.

Rnds 6-9: Rep rnds 2-5 for pattern.
Rnds 10-12: Rep rnds 2 and 3. At end of last rnd, fasten off. C!

Holding 2 strands together throughout unless otherwise stated.

Chain-3 at the beginning of row counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

Row 3: Ch 3, dc dec in next 3 sts, bpdc around next st, [fpdc around each of next 2 sts, bpdc around each of next 2 sts] across to last st, dc in turning ch, turn. (10 sts)

Row 4: Ch 3, fpdc around each of next 2 sts, bpdc around each of next 2 sts, dc dec in next 3 sts, dc in turning ch, turn. (8 sts)

Row 5: Ch 3, dc dec in next 3 sts, bpdc around next st, fpdc around each of next 2 sts, dc in turning ch, turn. (6sts)

Row 6: Ch 3, fpdc around next st, dc dec in next 3 sts, dc in turning ch, turn. (4 sts)

Row 7: Ch 3, dc dec in next 2 sts and turning ch. Fasten off. (2 sts)

## Assembly

Sew Body Panel around Side Panels, leaving Rib edge of Body as front flap.
The non-ribbed edge of Body Panel should be lined up with straight edge of Side Panel as shown in diagram.

## PATTERN NOTES

Work stitches in top not first leg of cluster.

Rnd 5: Ch 1, sc in each st and in each ch $s p$ around, join in beg sc. ( $66[72,78] \mathrm{sc}$ )

Rnds 6-9: Rep rnds 2-5.
Rnds 10 \& 11: Rep rnds 2 and 3. At end of last rnd. Fasten off. C!

Motif $=6$ inches from straight side to straight side; 7 inches from point to point

Very slippery, do not use on any surface other than carpet without using rug backing.

Chain-3 at beginning of round counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.
Chain-4 at beginning of round counts as first double crochet and chain-1 unless otherwise stated.

## MAT

Full Motif
Make 12.
Rnd 1: With green, ch 4, sl st in first ch to form ring, ch 3 (see Pattern Notes), dc in ring, ch 1, [2 dc in ring, ch 1] 5 times, join (see Pattern Notes) in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (6 ch sps, 12 dc )

Rnd 2: SI st in next st and in next ch sp, ch 4 (see Pattern Notes), dc in same ch sp as beg ch-4, fpdc (see Stitch Guide) around each of next 2 sts, [(dc, ch 1, dc) in next ch sp, fpdc around each of next 2 sts ] around working last 2 fpdc over sl sts at beg of this rnd, join in 3 rd ch of beg ch-4.

Rnd 3: Sl st in first ch sp, ch 4, dc in same ch $s p$ as beg ch-4, fpdc around each dc with
(dc, ch 1, dc) in each ch sp around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-4.

Rnd 4: Rep rnd 3. Leaving 8-inch end, fasten off.

## Half Motif Make 6.

Row 1: With green, ch 4, sl st in first ch to form ring, ch 4, [2 dc in ring, ch 1] 3 times, dc in ring, turn. (4 ch sps, 8 dc )

Row 2 (WS): Ch 4, dc in first ch sp, [fpdc around each st, (dc, ch 1, dc) in next ch sp] twice, fpdc around each st, dc in last ch sp, ch 1 , dc in 3 rd ch of turning ch, turn.

Row 3 (RS): Ch 4, dc in first ch sp, *bpdc (see Stitch Guide) around each st across to next ch $\mathrm{sp}^{* *}$, (dc, ch 1,dc) in next ch sp, rep from * across, ending last rep at ${ }^{* *}$, dc in last ch sp , ch $1, \mathrm{dc}$ in 3 rd ch of turning ch, turn.

Row 4: Ch 4, dc in first ch sp, *fpdc around each st across to next ch sp**, (dc, ch 1, dc) in next ch sp, rep from * across, ending last rep at ${ }^{* *}$, dc in last ch sp, ch 1, dc in 3rd ch of turning ch. Leaving 8-inch end, fasten off.

## Assembly

Lay Motifs out same as Asssembly Diagram with RS or ridged side down.
Using 8-inch ends, sew Motifs 1 and 2 tog, continue with RS tog, sew Motifs 2 and 6 tog, 6 and 7 tog, 7 and 11 tog, 11 and 12 tog, and 12 and 16 tog.
Next with RS tog, sew Motifs 2 and 3 tog, 2 and 8 tog, 7 and 8 tog, 7 and 12 tog, 12 and 13 tog, and 12 and 17 tog.
Next with RS tog, sew Motifs 3 and 4 tog, 4 and 8 tog, 8 and 9 tog, 9 and 13 tog, 13 and 14 tog, and 14 and 17 tog.


Raised Hexagons Mat Assembly Diagram

Next sew Motifs 4 and 5 tog, 4 and 10 tog, 9 and 10 tog, 9 and 15 tog, 14 and 15 tog, and 14 and 18 tog.
Sew rem seams in red on Assembly Diagram tog. Wet-block in cold water, shape lightly.

## Edging

Rnd 1: With RS facing, join natural with sc in corner ch sp on 1 short end, [evenly sp 54 sc across edge, 2 sc in corner ch sp, evenly sp 68 sc across long edge, 2 sc in corner ch sp] twice, sc in same ch sp as first sc, join in beg sc.

Rnd 2: Working from left to right, ch 1, reverse sc (see Stitch Guide) in each st around, join in beg reverse sc. Fasten off.

4 skeins \#332 ranch red
1 skein \#718 shocking pink

- Size J/10/6mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge


## GAUGE

Rnds 1-4 = $51 / 2$ inches across
Motif $=9$ inches square

## PATTERN NOTES

Chain-4 at beginning of round counts as first treble crochet unless otherwise stated.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

## THROW

First Motif
Rnd 1: With red, ch 4, sl st in first ch to form ring, ch 4 (see Pattern Notes), 4 tr in ring, ch 5, [5 tr in ring, ch 5] 3 times, join (see Pattern Notes) in 4th ch of beg ch-4. (20 tr)

Rnd 2: Ch 4, tr dec (see Stitch Guide) in next 4 tr, ch 6, sc in next ch-5 sp, ch 6, [tr dec in next 5 tr, ch 6, sc in next ch-5 sp, ch 6] around, join in top of first tr dec.

Rnd 3: Sl st in next ch-6 sp, ch 1, [6 sc in same ch sp as beg ch-1, ch 1 , sk next sc, 6 sc in next ch-6 $s p$, ch 1] around, join in beg sc.

Rnd 4: Ch 1, sc in first st, *ch 1, sk next st, hdc in next st, ch 1, sk next st, dc in next st, ch 1, sk next st, (2 tr, ch 2, 2 tr) in next ch-1 sp, ch 1, sk next st, dc in next st, ch 1, sk next st, hdc in next st, ch 1, sk next st, sc in next st, sc in next ch sp**, sc in next st, rep from * around, ending last rep at ${ }^{* *}$, join in beg sc.

Rnd 5: Ch 1, sc in each st and in each ch $s p$ around with ( $s c, c h 3, s c$ ) in each corner ch- 2 sp , join in beg sc. Fasten off.

Rnd 6: Join pink with sc in 2nd sc to left of any corner ch-2 sp, [ch 2, sk next st, sc in next st] around with [ch 2, sk next sc, (sc, ch 2, sc) in ch-3 sp ] in each corner, join in beg sc. Fasten off.

Rnd 7: Join red with sc in first sc to left of corner ch-2 sp, [sk next ch-2 sp, (dc, ch 1, dc) in next sc, sk
next ch-2 $s p$, $s c$ in next $s c]$ around with $[(2 \mathrm{dc}$, ch 2, 2 dc ) in corner ch-2 $s p$, $s c$ in next $s c]$ in each corner, join in beg sc.

Rnd 8: [Ch 1, (sc, ch 2, sc) in ch-1 sp between next 2 dc, ch 1 , sl st in next sc] around to corner, [ch 1, sk next dc, (sc, ch 2, sc) in next dc , ( $s c, \mathrm{ch} 4, \mathrm{sc}$ ) in next corner ch-2 sp, ( $s c$, ch $2, s c$ ) in next dc, ch 1, sk next dc, sl st in next $s c$, ch 1] in each corner, join in joining sl st of rnd 6. Fasten off.

## Joined Motifs <br> Make 29 forming 5 rows of 6 Motifs.

Rnds 1-7: Rep rnds 1-7 of First Motif.
Rnd 8: Rep rnd 8 of First Motif and at same time:

To join on 1 side from corner to corner: Join in ch-4 sps by ch 2, drop Ip from hook, insert hook in corresponding ch-4 sp on next Motif, place Ip back on hook and pull through ch sp , ch 2;

To join in ch-2 sps: Ch 1, drop Ip from hook, insert hook in corresponding ch-2 sp on next Motif, place Ip back on hook and pull through ch sp, ch 1;

To join on 2 sides where 4 corners meet: Ch 2, drop Ip from hook, insert hook in opposite ch-4 sp on next Motif, place Ip back on hook and pull through ch sp, ch 1, drop lp from hook, sk next corner ch-4 sp, insert hook in next corner ch-4 sp, ch 2;
After joining number of times needed, continue with rnd 8. Fasten off.

## Finishing

With WS facing, block lightly.

- Size G/6/4mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle
- Stitch marker


## GAUGE

13 sts $=4$ inches; 6 rows $=4$ inches

## PATTERN NOTES

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

Chain-3 at beginning of round counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

## SPECIAL STITCHES

Cluster (cl): Holding back last Ip of each st on hook, 2 dc as indicated in instructions, yo, pull through all Ips on hook.
Joining double crochet (joining dc): Place slip knot on hook, hold lp with your finger so it does not twist around hook, yo, insert hook as indicated in instructions, yo, pull lp through st (3 Ips on hook), yo, pull through 2 lps on hook (2 lps on hook), yo, pull through all Ips on hook.

Joining cluster (joining cl): Place slip knot on hook, hold Ip with your finger so it does not twist around hook, yo, insert hook as indicated
in instructions, yo, pull lp through st (3 lps on hook), yo, pull through 2 lps on hook (2 lps on hook), yo, insert hook in same st, yo, pull Ip through st (4 Ips on hook), yo, pull through 2 lps on hook (3 Ips on hook), yo, pull through all lps on hook.

## Square <br> Make 6.

Rnd 1: With first color, ch 4, sl st in first ch to form ring, ch 2, dc in ring (ch-2 and dc counts as first (c), ch 1, [cl (see Special Stitches) in ring,

ch 1] 7 times, join (see Pattern Notes) in top of beg cl. Fasten off first color. (8 cls)

Rnd 2: Join 2nd color with joining dc (see Special Stitches) in any ch-1 sp, 2 dc in same ch-1 sp, ch 2, [3 dc in next ch-1 sp, ch 1, 3 dc in next ch-1 sp, ch 2] 3 times, 3 dc in next ch-1 sp, ch 1 , join in top of joining dc. Fasten off. ( 8 dc groups)

Rnd 3: Join 3rd color with joining dc in any ch-2 sp, (2 dc, ch 2, 3 dc ) in same ch-2 sp as joining dc, ch 1, [ 3 dc in next ch-1 sp, ch 1 , ( 3 dc , ch $2,3 \mathrm{dc}$ ) in next ch-2 sp, ch 1] 3 times, 3 dc in next ch-1 sp, ch 1, join in top of joining dc. Fasten off. ( 12 dc groups)

Rnd 4: Join 4th color with joining dc in any ch-2 sp, (2 dc, ch 2, 3 dc ) in same ch-2 sp as joining dc, ch $1,{ }^{*}[3 \mathrm{dc}$ in next ch-1 sp, ch 1] twice**, ( 3 dc , ch $2,3 \mathrm{dc}$ ) in ch-2 sp, ch 1 , rep from * around, ending last rep at **, join in top of joining dc. Leaving long end, fasten off. ( 16 dc groups)

## Octagon

Make 12.
Rnd 1: With first color, ch 4, sl st in first ch to form ring, ch 2, dc in ring (ch-2 and $d c$ counts as first c ), ch 1 , [cl in ring, ch 1] 7 times, join in top of first cl. Fasten off. (8 c/s)

Rnd 2: Join 2nd color with joining cl (see Special Stitches) in any ch-1 sp, ch 1, cl in same ch-1 sp as joining $\mathrm{cl},[(\mathrm{cl}, \mathrm{ch} 1$, cl) in next ch-1 sp] 7 times, join in top of joining cl. Fasten off. (8 cl groups)


Rnd 3: Join 3rd color in sp between any 2 cl groups, [(hdc, 4 dc , hdc) in next ch-1 sp, sl st in sp between next 2 cl groups (petal)] 8 times, join in beg sl st. Fasten off. (8 petals)
Rnd 4: Join 4th color in 3rd dc of any dc group (this will be in the center of petal), ch 3, [sc in sp between cls on rnd 2 over sl st from rnd 3, ch 3, sl st in 3rd dc of next dc group, ch 3] 7 times, sc in sp between cls on rnd 2 over sl st from rnd 3, ch 3 , sl st in ch- 3 sp , do not change colors or fasten off. (16 ch-3 sps)

Rnd 5: Ch 3, 3 dc in same ch-3 sp as beg ch-3 (half petal), [sc in next sc, 4 dc in next ch-3 sp, 4 dc in next ch-3 sp (petal)] 7 times, sc in next $\mathrm{sc}, 4 \mathrm{dc}$ in next ch-3 sp, join in 3rd ch of beg ch 3. Fasten off. (8 petals)

Rnd 6: Join 5th color in 5th dc of any 8-dc group, [ch 4, dc in sc on rnd 4, ch 4, sl st in 5th dc] 8 times, do not change colors or fasten off. (16 ch-4 sps)
Rnd 7: Ch 3, [4 dc in next ch-4 sp, ch 2, 4 dc in next ch-4 sp, dc in next sl st] 7 times, 4 dc in next ch-4 sp, ch 2, 4 dc in next ch-4 sp , join in 3 rd ch of beg ch-3. Fasten off. (8 9-dc groups)
Rnd 8: Join 6th color with joining dc in any ch-2 sp , [dc in each of next 9 dc , ( $\mathrm{dc}, \mathrm{ch} 2, \mathrm{dc}$ ) in next ch-2 sp] 7 times, dc in each of next 9 dc , dc in next ch-2 sp, ch 2, join in top of joining dc. Fasten off. (8 11-dc groups)

Rnd 9: Join 7th color with joining dc in any ch-2 sp, [dc in each of next 11 dc , (dc, ch 2, dc) in next ch-2 sp] 7 times, dc in each of next 11 dc , dc in next ch-2 sp , ch 2, join in top of joining dc. Fasten off. (8 13-dc groups)

Rnd 10: Join 8th color with joining dc in any ch-2 sp, *dc in each of next 2 dc , [ch 1, sk next st, dc in each of next 3 dc$]$ twice, ch 1 , sk next st, dc in each of next $2 \mathrm{dc}^{* *}$, (dc, ch 2,
dc) in next ch-2 sp, rep from * around, ending last rep at ${ }^{* *}$, dc in ch-2 sp, ch 2, join in top of joining dc. Leaving long end, fasten off. (32 3-dc groups)

## Assembly

Using Assembly Diagram on page 81 lay out pieces facedown; the diagram is WS of Throw.
Sew pieces tog using long ends. Place a marker in corner sp designated with an arrow on Assembly Diagram, turn Throw over to RS to beg Border. Beg Border rnds $1-6$ in marked corner.

## Border

Rows 8-13: [Rep rows 5-7 consecutively] twice.

Row 14: Ch 1, sc in first dc, [2 sc in next dc, sc in each of next 5 dc$] 7$ times, sc across, turn. (56 sc)

Row 15: Ch 1, sc in each sc across, turn.
Row 16: Ch 1 , $s c$ in first $s c, 2$ sc in next $\mathrm{sc}, \mathrm{sc}$ across to last $2 \mathrm{sc}, 2 \mathrm{sc}$ in next $\mathrm{sc}, \mathrm{sc}$ in last sc, turn. (58 sc)

Rows 17-21: Rep row 15.

Rows 22-23 [22-25, 22-27, 2229, 22-31]: Alternating, rep rows 14 and 15. (60 [62, 64, 66, 68] sc after last row worked)

Rows 24-52 [26-54, 28-56, 30-58, 32-60]: Ch 1, sc in each sc across, turn.

Next 8 rows: Alternating, rep rows 14 and 15. (68 [70, 72, 74, 76] sc after last row)

Next 5 rows: Rep row 15. At end of last row, fasten off.

## Sleeve Lace Edging

Work rows 1-3 of Lace Edging as for Front and Back.

## Assembly

Sew Shoulder seams.
Ease Sleeves into Armholes, sew into place.
Sew side seams and Sleeve seams.

## Neck Edging

Row 1: With RS facing, join in center st on neck edge of Back, ch 1, sc in same st, sc evenly around neck edge, sl st into first sc, turn.

Row 2: Ch 1, sc in each sc around, sl st into first sc.

Fasten off.

## Finishing

Block. C!

Row 16 [18, 20, 22]: Working in both lps, ch 2 , hdc in first st and in each of next 11 sts, leaving rem sts unworked, turn.

Row 17 [19, 21, 23]: Rep row 3.
Row(s) 18 [20-22, 22-26, 24-30]:
[Rep rows 4 and 3 alternately] 1 [2,3,4] time(s), ending last rep with row $4[4,4,4]$. At end of last row, fasten off.

Right Side of Front ( $\mathbf{N}$ )
Row 1: With RS facing, join in 8th sc of

12 -sc Ip to right of bottom center Ip (0), ch 10 , sk next 8 sc , hdc in next sc and in next 26 sc , ch 4 , sk next 8 sc, dtr in next sc (which is 8 th sc of next $12-s(1 p)$, leaving rem sts unworked, turn.

Row 2: Work as for row 2 of Section M.
Row 3: Work as for row 3 of Section M.
Row 4: Work as for row 4 of Section M.
Row 5: Working in back lps, ch 2, hdc in first and in each st across up to last st, 2 hdc in last st, turn.

Rows 6-9 [6-11, 6-13, 6-15]: [Rep rows 4 and 5 alternately] $2[3,4,5]$ times.

Row 10 [12, 14, 16]: Working in both lps, ch 2, hdc in each st across, place Ip on hook on st marker, with short length of yarn, sl st to first st of this row, ch 12 [14, 16, 18]. Fasten off short length of yarn.

Row 11 [13, 15, 17]: Place Ip back on hook from st marker, turn, working in back lps only, hdc in each st across, work hdc in each ch across, turn.

Row 12 [14, 16, 18]: Work as for row 4 of Section M.

Rows 13 \& 14 [15-17, 17-21, 19-25]:
[Rep rows 3 and 4 of $M$ alternately] $1[2,3,4]$ time(s), ending last rep with row $4[3,3,3]$.

## Front Collar Edging

Row 1: With RS facing, join with hdc in first st at shoulder, work hdc in each st and each end of row across up to first $s p, 4$ hdc in next sp, sk next st, sl st in each of next 5 sts, sk next 2 sc , $s l$ st in each of next 10 sc , sk next $2 \mathrm{sc}, \mathrm{sl}$ st in each of next 5 sts, sk next st, 4 hdc in next sp, work hdc in each end of row and st up to other shoulder, turn.

Row 2: Ch 2 (see Pattern Notes), hdc in each hdc across, work sc in each sl st and hdc dec (see Stitch Guide) at 4 points P, Q, R and S as shown in diagram, turn.

Row 3: Working in back lps, ch 2, hdc in each st across, turn.

Row 4: Working in both lps, ch 2, hdc in each hdc across. Fasten off.

## Front Bottom Edging

Row 1: With RS facing, join with hde at V, work hdc in end of each row to first sp, 5 hdc in next $s p$, $s k$ next $s c$, $s c$ in each of next 6 sts, $s k$ next 2 sc , sl st in each of next 10 sts (center of knot edge), sk next 2 sc , sc in each of next 6 sts, sk next sc, 5 hdc in next sp, hdc in end of rem rows across, turn.

Row 2: Ch 2, hdc in every hdc and sc across, sc in each sl st in center, turn.

Row 3: Working in back Ips, hdc in each st across, turn.

Row 4: Working in both lps, hdc in each st across. Fasten off.

## Sleeve

Make 2.
Row 1: Ch 69 [74, 79, 84], dc in 4th ch from hook (first 3 chs count as first dc), [ch 5, sk next 3 chs, dc in each of next 2 chs] across, turn.

Row 2: Ch 6, dc in 4th ch from hook, [ch 5, 2 dc in next ch-5 sp] across, end with ch 5 , dc in each of last 2 dc , turn.

Row 3: Rep row 2.
Row 4: Ch 3, dc in next dc, [ch 5, 2 dc in next ch-sp] across, ending with ch $5, \mathrm{dc}$ in each of last 2 dc , turn.

Row 5: [Ch 5, 2 dc in next ch sp ] across, turn.
Rows 6 \& 7: Rep row 5.
Row 8: Ch 4, [2 dc in next ch-5 sp, ch 5] across, ending with ch $3, \mathrm{dc}$ in last ch-5 sp , turn.
Row 9: [Ch 5, 2 dc in next ch sp] across, ending with ch $3, \mathrm{dc}$ in last ch sp , turn.
Row 10: Ch 3, dc in next ch sp, [ch 5, 2 dc in next ch sp ] across, turn.

Row 11: [Ch 5, 2 dc in next ch sp] across, turn.
Rows 12-23 [12-25, 12-27, 12-29]:
Rep row 11.
Row 24 [26, 28, 30]: [Ch 6, 2 dc in next ch sp] across, turn.

You may remember another of Jennifer Ryan's award-winning concepts made into the Kerry Shrug, which was published in the spring 2013 issue of Crochet!

Rows 25-36 [27-38, 29-40, 31-42]:
Rep row 24 [26, 28, 30]. At end of last row, fasten off.

## Preparing Pieces

Steam-block completed pieces as for Knots and let dry overnight.

## Assembly

Sew all pieces tog with RS facing.
Sew shoulder and underarm seams tog making sure ends match.
Sew on Sleeves. Line up center of each Sleeve with shoulder seam and stretch mesh stitch to fit around arm opening. Make sure bottom edge of Sleeve is even and sew seam down to wrist.

## Skirt

Rnd 1: Beg at waist, with RS facing and working in back lps, join with hdc in center of Back Bodice piece, hdc in each hdc around, join in first hdc, turn.

Rnd 2: Working in both lps, ch 2, hdc in first hdc and in each hdc around, join in first hdc, turn.

Rnd 3: Working in back lps only, ch 2, hdc in first hdc and in each hdc around, join in first hde, turn.
Rnd(s) 4 [4-6, 4-8, 4-10]: [Rep rnds 2 and 3 alternately] 1 [2, 3, 4] time(s), ending last rep with rnd 2.

## Skirt Bottom

Rnd 1: Ch 3, dc in next st, [ch 5, sk next 2 sts, dc in each of next 2 sts] around, ending with ch 5 , join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3, do not turn.

Note: Make sure there is an even number of ch-5 sps. You may need to sk 3 sts in a few places to make an even number fit.
Rnd 2: SI st in next dc, sl st in each of next 2 chs, ch 3 , dc in same ch sp, [ch 5, 2 dc in next ch sp] around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3.

Rnds 3 \& 4 [3-5, 3-6, 3-7]: Rep rnd 2.
Rnd 5 [6, 7, 8]: Sl st in next dc, sl st to center of next ch sp , ch 3 , dc in same ch sp , [ch 6, 2 dc in next ch sp] around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3.

Rnds 6-8 [7-10, 8-12, 9-14]: Rep rnd $5[6,7,8]$.

Rnd 9 [11, 13, 15]: Sl st in next dc, sl st to center of next ch $s p$, ch 4, tr in same ch $s p$, [ch 7, 2 tr in next ch sp] around, ending with ch 7, join in 4th ch of beg ch-4.

Rnd(s) $\mathbf{1 0}$ [12 \& 13, 14-16, 16-19]: Rep rnd $9[11,13,15] 1[2,3,4]$ time(s).

Rnd 11 [14, 17, 20]: Sl st in next tr and in each of next 4 chs, ch 1 , sc in same ch sp, [ch 10, sc in next ch sp] around, join in first sc.

Rnd 12 [15, 18, 21]: Sl st in first sc, [ch 1, (tr, ch 1) 10 times in next ch sp, sc in next sc] around, join in first sl st.

Rnd 13 [16, 19, 22]: *[Ch 2, sk next ch sp , $s$ c in next sp , ch 3] 8 times, ch 2, sk next ch sp, sl st in next sc, rep from * around, join in bottom of beg ch-2. Fasten off.

## Top Collar Edging

Rnd 1: With top 2 pieces sewn tog and RS facing, join with sc in seam at left shoulder, sc in each hdc across Front, working along Back, make 3 sc in each sp and 2 sc across each dc up to Knot, sk first sc, sc in each of next 10 sc , sk next $2 \mathrm{sc}, \mathrm{sc}$ in each of next 10 sc , sk next 2 $s c, s c$ in each of next 8 sc , $s k$ next $s c$, continue working 3 sc in each sp and 2 sc across each dc up to first sc of rnd, join in first sc.

Rnd 2: Ch 3, dc in next st, [ch 5, sk next 2 sts, dc in next st] around, ch 5 , join in 3 rd ch of beg ch-3.

Note: When working in a curve, you may need to sk next 3 sts for a few reps in row. Also, make sure there is an even number of ch-5 sps around.

Rnd 3: Sl st to center of first ch-5 sp, ch 1, sc in same ch sp, [ch 5, sc in next ch sp] around, join in first sc.

Rnd 4: [Ch 1, (dc, ch 1) 5 times in next ch sp, sc in next ch sp] around, join in joining sl st of last rnd.

Rnd 5: *Ch 2, sk next ch sp, [sc in next ch sp, ch 2] 4 times, sl st in next sc, rep from * around, join in joining sl st of last rnd. Fasten off.

## Sleeve Edging

Rnd 1: Join with sc in center of any ch sp, [ch 7, sc in next ch sp] around, join in first sc.

Rnd 2: Ch 1 , sc in first $s c,[(d c, c h 1) 5$ times in next ch sp, sc in next ch sp] around, join in first sc.

Rnd 3: Rep rnd 5 of Top Collar Edging. C!

Row 4: Rep row 2.
Next rows: [Rep rows 3 and 4 alternately] $6[5,5,4,4]$ times. ( 14 [16, 18, 21, 23] sts at end of last row)

Dec row (RS): Ch 1 , sc in each of first 6 [ $8,10,13,15]$ sc, sc dec in next 2 sts, work in pattern across last 6 sts, turn. ( 13 [15, 17, 20, 22] $s t s)$

Next row: Ch 1, sc in each sc across, turn.
Next rows: Work 2 rows even.
Next rows: Working 1 less sc at beg of row, rep last 4 rows until you have 10 [11, 13, 15, 17] sts rem.

Next rows: Work even in Body Pattern until piece measures $241 / 2$ [ $25,251 / 2,26,261 / 2]$ inches from beg, ending with WS row.

## Neckband

Row 1: With RS facing, sl st in each of first 3 [4, 6, 8, 10] sts, work in Body Pattern across last 7 sts.

Rows 2-22: Work in established Body Pattern. At end of last row, fasten off.

## V-Neck Shaping Left Side

With RS facing, join with sc in first st, work in Body Pattern across next 5 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each st across to end, turn.

Next row: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.
Next rows: [Rep last 2 rows alternately] $7[6,6,5,5]$ times. ( $14[16,18,21,23]$ sts at end of last row)

Next row: Work in Body Pattern across first 6 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each st across to end, turn.

Next row: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.
Next row: Ch 1, work in Body Pattern across first 6 sts, sc in each st across to end, turn.

Next row: Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.
Next rows: Rep last 4 rows consecutively until you have $10[11,13,15,17]$ sts rem.

Next rows: Work to same length as Right Side, ending with WS row.

## Neckband

Work in Body Pattern across first 7 sts, leave rem $3[4,6,8,10]$ sts unworked. Complete as for Right Side.

## Finishing

Join shoulder seams.
Sew Neckbands tog. With RS tog, pin Neckband around back neck, sl st in place.
Sew side seams, leaving last 20 rows or $43 / 4$ inches free.

## Armhole

Rnd 1: With size G hook and RS facing, work $82[90,94,100,104]$ sc evenly spaced around, join (see Pattern Notes) in first sc, ch 1, sc in same sc as join and in each sc around, do not join.

Rnd 2: SI st in each sc around, do not join.
Rnds 3 \& 4: Working below previous rnd of $s l s t s$, $s l$ st in each st around, do not join. At end of last rnd, fasten off.

## Side Vents

Row 1: With RS facing and size $H$ hook, sc in end of each of 19 rows, sc dec in next 2 rows,
sc in end of next 19 rows, turn.
Row 2: SI st in each sc across. Fasten off.

## Neck

Row 1: From beg of V-Neck, count up 31 [33, $33,35,35$ ] rows along each edge and place markers. Sts between markers are for Back Neck. Working along back neck only, with size G hook and RS facing, work 44 hdc, turn.
Row 2: Ch 1, sc in first hdc, [sc dec in next 2 hdc, sc in each of next 2 hdc 10 times, sc dec in next 2 hdc, sc in last hdc. Fasten off. (33 sts)


Right Side: With RS facing and size H hook, beg on right side of V and work 31 [33, 33, 35, 35] sc alongside, 33 sc along back neck and 31 [33, 33, 35, 35] sc along next side, turn. (95 [99, 99, 103, 103] sts)

Row 2: SI st in each sc across, turn.
Row 3: Working below previous row of sl sts, sl st across. Fasten off.

V-stitch (V-st): (Tr, ch 3, tr) as indicated in instructions.
Cluster (cl): Holding back last lp of each st on hook, 3 dc as indicated in instructions, yo, pull through all Ips on hook.

## STOLE

First Panel
Row 1 (RS): Ch 177, dc in 4th ch from hook
(first 3 chs count as first dc) and in each ch across, do not turn. (175 dc)

Rows 2-11: Work broomstick lace (see Special Stitches) using size 35 knitting needle and sc. At end of last row, turn.

Row 12: Ch 4 (see Pattern Notes), sk next st, (tr, ch 2, tr) in next st, [sk next 4 sts, V-st (see Special Stitches) in next st] across to last 7 sts, sk next 4 sts, ( tr , ch 2, tr) in next st, sk next st, tr in last st, turn. (2 tr, 35 V -sts)

Row 13: Ch 4,4 tr in ch sp of first V-st, V-st in ch sp of next V-st, [5 tr in ch sp of next V-st, V-st in ch sp of next V-st] across, ending with 4 tr in ch sp of last V -st, tr in last tr, turn.
(17 V-sts, 18 tr groups)

Row 14: Ch 4, sk next st, (tr, ch 2, tr) in next st, 5 tr in ch sp of next V-st, [V-st in center dc of next group, 5 tr in ch sp of next $V$-st] across, ending with ( $\mathrm{tr}, \mathrm{ch} 2, \mathrm{tr}$ ) in center tr of last group, tr in last st, turn. (17 tr groups, 18 V - sts)

Rows 15 \& 16: Rep rows 13 and 14.
Row 17: Rep row 13.
Row 18: Ch 4, sk next st, (tr, ch 2, tr) in next st, V-st in ch sp of next V-st, [V-st in center tr of next tr group, V-st in ch sp of next V-st] across, ending with sk next 2 tr , (tr, ch 2, tr) in next tr, tr in last st, turn.

Row 19: Ch 3 (see Pattern Notes), dc in each st and in each ch across, do not turn. (175 dc)

Rows 20-25: Work broomstick lace using size 17 knitting needle and dc. At end of last row, turn.

Rows 26-33: Rep rows 12-19.
Next rows: [Rep rows 2-33 consecutively] twice.


Next rows: Rep rows 2-11. At end of last row, fasten off.

## 2nd Panel

Row 1: With RS facing, working in starting ch on opposite side of row 1, join (see Pattern Notes) in first ch, ch 1, pull up Ip in same ch and in each ch across.

Next rows: Beg with row 2, work same as First Panel. At end of last row, do not turn or fasten off.

## Edging

Ch 1, *[evenly sp hdc across long edge, working 6 hdc in end of dc broomstick lace rows and 5
hdc in ends of sc broomstick lace rows] across, working across short end, [sc in next sc, sk next sc, cl (see Special Stitches) in next sc, ch 3, cl in 3rd ch from hook, cl in same st as last cl, sk next st, sc in next st] 35 times, rep from * once, join in beg ch-1. Fasten off.

## Finishing

Wet-block to measurements.
With doubled strand of yarn, sew 1 leaf bead securely to tip of each point on RS of short ends. C!

Fasten off.

Rnd 7: Join Shenandoah with sc in any corner ch-2 sp, ch 2 , sc in same ch-2 sp, *sc in each st across to next corner ch-2 $\mathrm{sp}^{* *}$, $(\mathrm{sc}, \mathrm{ch} 2, \mathrm{sc}$ ) in corner ch-2 sp, rep from * around, ending last rep at ${ }^{* *}$, join in joining sc. Fasten off.

Rnd 8: With Denali, rep rnd 7.
Rnd 9: With Hot Springs, rep rnd 7.

Rnd 10: With Acadia, rep rnd 7.
Rnd 11: With redwood, rep rnd 7, do not change colors or fasten off.

## Edging

Getting started: You may have to sk more than 1 st along some of edges while making the Edging in order to reach corners at the correct point.

Rnd 12: *5 dc in corner ch-2 sp, sk next st, [sl st in next st, sk next st, 4 dc in next st, sk next st] across edge to next corner ch-2 sp, rep from * around, join in joining sl st of last rnd. Fasten off. C!

Front post stitch (fp): Back post stitch (bp): When working post st, insert hook from right to left around post of st on previous row.


Half double crochet (hdc): Yo, insert hook in st, yo, pull through st, yo, pull through all 3 lps on hook.


Double treble crochet (dtr): Yo 3 times, insert hook in st, yo, pull through st, [yo, pull through 2 lps ] 4 times.


Treble crochet decrease (tr dec): Holding back last lp of each st, tr in each of the sts indicated, yo, pull through all lps on hook.


Slip stitch (sl st): Insert hook in st, pull through both lps on hook.


Chain color change (ch color change) Yo with new color, draw through last ip on hook.


Double crochet color change (dc color change)
Drop first color, yo with new color, draw through last 2 lps of st.


Treble crochet (tr):
Yo twice, insert hook in st, yo, pull through st, [yo, pull through 2 lps] 3 times.



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
