#### **Crocheting Clothes Kids Love**

By Shelby Allaho and Ellen Gormley (Creative Publishing International, 144 pages, \$24.99)

It's a fact that crocheting for babies and kids is fun. Small bodies, bright colors, cute styles—what's not to love? Unfortunately, once kids are past toddler age, it can be hard to find cute styles that they are willing to wear.

*Crocheting Clothes Kids Love* solves this dilemma with a collection of 28 fun-towear projects, including garments and accessories that are just perfect for that hardto-please school-age child.

A variety of yarn types and easy-care fibers are used to make sweaters, vests, leg warmers, mittens, scarves and more. And boys are not forgotten—you may find yourself making more than one Mohawk Earflap Hat for every male child you know—and maybe for a few grown-up boys too!

Clear photography and clean layouts along with excellent how-tos make this book a winner for all skill levels.

#### Yarn Reviews

Kismet is an exciting yarn from Tahki Stacy Charles. It's 54 percent alpaca, 46 percent nylon in a brushed, textured strand. A 4-inch single crochet swatch can be achieved with an H/8/5mm hook in 16 stitches and 20 rows. Hand-wash this yarn in cool water, and lay flat to dry. Alpaca is a very warm fiber and nylon will give it strength. It retails for \$13.25 per ball and has 250 yards. It comes in eight colors. The yarn is very soft and has a very luxurious feel to it. While the yarn suggests a size H hook, the swatch is made with a J because the larger stitches might show the yarn's lovely fuzzy halo to it's best

advantage.

From the Premier Yarns Deborah Norville Collection, machine-washable and -dryable Serenity Chunky yarn has many great features. This 100 percent acrylic yarn comes in a 109yard skein. The label suggests a size L crochet hook to work a 4-inch-square swatch in single crochet that is 9 stitches wide by 12 rows long. This yarn is very soft. It's twoply and somewhat loosely spun with an S-twist. It retails for \$3.99 a ball and comes in a wide variety of solids, prints and heathers. It's also available in tweeds, sprinkles and sequin varieties with different yardages and prices. Guaranteed to work up quickly, this yarn would be excellent for hats, quick scarves and garments that will get ongoing use.

#### Tahki Select Hudson

Tahki Select has an innovative new yarn called Hudson. It's two yarns in one ball! One of the yarns in the ball is a thick printed chainette and the second is a faux fur yarn. With two balls you can make both the hat and headbad shown below, giving you both wooly texture and softness! Though you can work both yarns together at the same time, in the featured patterns, you'll use one yarn at a time. The yarn is a super bulky acrylic, nylon, wool and polyester blend and has 65 yards per ball. It is shown using 2 balls of camouflage #4. Check out AnniesCatalog.com to purchase both the pattern and the yarn.




#### Amamani Puzzle Balls

## Illusion Scarf

#### DESIGN BY HAZEL FURST

Subtle stitch variations make a stunning visual effect in this beginner two-color scarf.

#### **123456** CONFIDENT BEGINNER

#### FINISHED MEASUREMENTS

53/8 inches wide x 50 inches long



- Red Heart With Love medium (worsted) weight acrylic yarn (7 oz/370 yds/198g per skein): 1 skein each #1401 pewter and
  - #1012 black
- Size K/10½/6.5mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle

#### GAUGE

3 sts = 1 inchGauge is not important for this project.

#### **PATTERN NOTES**

Refer to Stitch Diagram as needed.

To change colors, work the last stitch in the first color until there are 2 loops left on the

hook. Leaving a 5-inch end of the new color at the back, pull the new color through the last 2 loops on the hook. When working the first stitch with the new color, loop the old color around the first stitch and work over the old color with the new color.

Work in the new color, leaving the old color until it is needed.

If joining a 2nd ball of yarn, avoid knots to maintain reversible nature of design.

#### SPECIAL STITCH

#### Back-to-front single crochet (btfsc):

Holding yarn to front of work, insert hook in both lps of next st from back to front, yo, pull up lp, yo, pull through all lps on hook.

#### SCARF

4

**Row 1 (RS):** With pewter, ch 17, sc in 2nd ch from hook and in each of next 3 chs, **btfsc** (see Special Stitch) in each of next 4 chs, sc in each of next 4 chs, btfsc in each of last 4 chs, turn. (16 sts)

**Row 2:** Ch 1, [sc in each of next 4 sts, btfsc in each of next 4 sts] twice, **change color to black** (see Pattern Notes), turn.

**Row 3:** With black, ch 1, btfsc in each of first 4 sts, sc in each of next 4 sts, btfsc in each of next 4 sts, sc in each of last 4 sts, turn.


Row 4: Rep row 3, change color to pewter.

**Row 5:** With pewter, ch 1, sc in each of first 4 sts, btfsc in each of next 4 sts, sc in each of next 4 sts, btfsc in each of last 4 sts, turn.


**Row 6:** Rep row 5, change color to black.

**Next rows:** Rep rows 3–6 consecutively until piece measures 49½ inches or desired length, ending with black row. Fasten off black.

Last row: Rep row 5. Fasten off pewter. C!

## Crochet Solutions 101

#### BY DORIS CHAN


Our guest columnist, designer and author Doris Chan shares a few of her secrets for choosing the right yarn.

#### YARN TWIST

**Q:** I bought some beautiful, fairly expensive yarn that is very highly rated. I tried crocheting a lacy scarf, but by the time I got halfway through, I was completely disgusted. The yarn split and shredded, the stitches started looking ragged and terrible, and the scarf seemed like it was already worn. I didn't really rip out that much as I went, so I don't think I mishandled the yarn. What am I doing wrong?

A: It sounds like you have discovered the twist issue, related to the construction of the yarn. What you've experienced sometimes happens to crocheters when using plied and twisted yarn, the sort that has multiple strands (plies) that are given a final twist to become one strand. Plied varn can be finished with either S-twist or Z-twist, and although manufacturers could easily do it either way, you'll find the vast majority of yarn is S-twist. On the other hand, most thread (crochet and sewing) is Z-twist. Tubular or flat ribbon, railroad yarn, woven yarn and other constructions that don't have a finished twist can also develop their own kind of twist problems.

Q: How can you tell the twist of a yarn? A: Look at a strand, holding it vertically; it makes no difference which end is up. If the plies lean like the center stroke of the letter S, then it is S-twist yarn; if the plies lean like the center stroke of the letter Z, then it is Z-twist.

**Q:** Why does twist matter for crochet?

A: If you are a right-handed crocheter, each time you make a standard yarn over (bringing the yarn from behind the hook, winding it up forward toward you, and then down across the front of the hook) you are giving the yarn a bit

of Z-twist. When you crochet this way with an S-twist yarn, you are essentially untwisting the yarn as you go. Taken to the extreme, the yarn will eventually lose coherence and stability, fall apart, and look frayed and worn!

Q: Why are there so few Z-twist yarns? A: The fact that the industry labels it "hand-knitting" yarn is a clue. A standard, right-handed yarn over in knitting is either neutral or slightly reinforces S-twist. This does not mean knitters are to blame. In my opinion, it seems not enough crafters notice the problem, or we don't say anything because we assume it's our own fault, or we don't think about demanding Z-twist products!

Q: Why am I just now noticing this? A: The untwisting is not always apparent. It is magnified under certain circumstances, such as:

- The yarn is a loose S-twist to begin with.
- The stitch pattern is open and lacy (this is not as apparent with solidstitch fabric).
- The gauge is loose for the weight of the yarn.
- There are many tall stitches with multiple yarn overs.
- The same section has been ripped and re-crocheted too many times.

• The work has been twisted and turned with unusual frequency.

**Q:** Can I crochet with S-twist yarn? **A:** Of course you can! But if you are using a yarn and not loving the results, if you frequently have twist-related issues, or if you have many of the factors above, then you might want to keep in mind the construction of the yarn when shopping in the same way you consider weight, fiber, texture and color. If no Z-twist yarns are to your liking, try firm S-twist yarns instead, or those without twist, such as tape and ribbon yarns. Most "singles" (one big ply) are loosely Z-twist and work fine.

**Q:** What can I do to minimize the twist issue?

**A:** A few yarn management techniques can help a little. The goal is

to either reduce sources of Z-twist or replace a bit of S-twist.

Try not to wind and re-wind balls of yarn over and over. If you have to rip, just let the yarn pile as neatly as possible.

Do you constantly pull large amounts of feed from the skein and tend to run your fingers down the feed, tugging and smoothing over and over to straighten it as you go? You are forcing the twist action of your crochet further and further into the skein. Try to keep the feed closer to the skein, loosen your grip occasionally and allow the yarn twist (or untwist) to come up into your work instead of pushing it down the line. This technique will also help you deal with twisting ribbon yarn or with the opposite twist issue—that is, when a firmly Z-twist yarn gets too kinky. Pay attention to how you pull yarn from a skein. This one will take a bit of thought. When yarn is put up into skeins by the manufacturer, or when you wind a hank of yarn with a ball winder, the core of the skein rotates with each wind. This puts no additional twist into the yarn no matter which direction you crank. What matters is how you take the varn off the skein. If the entire skein is able to turn while you remove the yarn, then you are taking the yarn off in the same way it was put on, without adding twist. However, most of us pull from a stationary skein, with either an outside or inside pull, which adds user twist. I know it's difficult to wrap your head around this because we have been told it makes no difference, but a little conscious effort will make your life so much easier in the long run! C!

## En Fleur Cowl


Bold shapes and chunky yarn give dramatic dimension to this floral-inspired cowl.

#### 123456 EASY

#### FINISHED MEASUREMENTS

6 inches wide x 21 inches in circumference

#### MATERIALS



- 1 skein each #7283 lavender mix • Size L/11/8mm crochet hook or size needed
- to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle
- Pins

GAUGE

Motif = 6 inches square

#### **PATTERN NOTES**

Refer to Stitch Diagram as needed.

Petals with groups of 3 double treble crochets are right side of Cowl.

Chain 5 at beginning of round counts as first double treble crochet unless otherwise stated.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

#### SPECIAL STITCH

Invisible fasten off: Cut yarn leaving a 3-inch tail, working in **back lp** (see Stitch Guide), insert hook in indicated st, yo, draw yarn through st and lp on hook, insert hook in both lps of next st, yo with tail and pull through st, working in front lp (see Stitch Guide), insert hook in previous st, yo and draw down through st.

Many years ago I made a very large off-white blanket for my grandmother covered in a variety of textured cable stitches. I was delighted to discover that crocheters could make textures similar to knitted cables by simply crossing front and back post stitches. A few years ago, I started playing with cables again, challenging myself to find ways to recreate other types of cables I had seen done in knitting but had not yet found in crochet.

Typically, crocheted cables are made all on one side of the fabric by alternating a row of crossed front-post stitches with a row of crossed back-post stitches. The height of the stitches is determined by the number of stitches that will be crossed in each cable. For example, double crochets may be tall enough for a 1 over 1 crossed cable, and treble crochets work better for 2 over 2 or 3 over 3. When you get to 4 over 4, it is best to use double treble crochet.

Since the cables are worked on a background of flat or upright stitches, and generally all on one side of the fabric, they are seldom truly reversible. But what if we take away that background of flat stitches, creating continuous cables throughout the BY LAURINDA REDDIG

fabric? Using only crossed post stitches can create a very stretchy fabric, so it's great for cowls and even garments.


To take your cables completely over the edge, rather than making upright stitches on either side of your cable pattern, try removing the flat stitches all the way up to the edges. This will create a scalloped edging with your cables as you work the main fabric. The easiest way to do this is to add an extra half-repeat to the total number of stitches you need for your crossed cables. This way, you can begin every row with a chain and additional upright stitches, followed by all of your crossed cables.

By beginning each row with upright stitches, your two edges will not be quite the same because the scallops will be alternated on each side. If you have a pattern where you need both sides to be the same, you can skip that extra halfrepeat, but you will need to begin each row by slip-stitching over to the center of the last cross made. Your beginning chain will be the first crossed post stitch *(see Photo 1)*, and the second half of the first crossed cable will be worked into the stitches you have already slipstitched into *(see Photo 2)*.





Finally, by alternating front and back post stitches on the same row, you can even make your cables reversible. After skipping the indicated number of stitches (*see Photo 3*), you will complete the first set of post stitches on one side of the fabric; then you work back around the posts of the skipped stitches on the other side of the fabric (*see Photo 4*). Once you have completed the first couple of rows, you will begin to see the pattern, recognizing when to work front or back post stitches. The other trick to making cables reversible is to work into the "lower bar" (see Photos 5 and 6) of the stitches along each edge. By inserting your hook under three loops rather than the standard two loops at the top of a stitch, you can achieve a more continuous cable look on both sides of your work because it eliminates the hole formed when you work into only the top two loops of a stitch. C!






#### FOR EVEN CABLES Be careful of your

tension when working across skipped stitches to avoid stitches that are loose at the top and can

cause holes.

Hold stitch between your thumb and forefinger as you work post stitches, moving them up the stitch with each "yarn over, pull through 2" to keep them even. This avoids the tendency to draw up longer and longer loops as the stitch gets taller.

#### 123456 INTERMEDIATE

#### FINISHED MEASUREMENTS

5<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> inches wide x 80 inches in circumference

#### MATERIALS

- Tahki Soufflé medium (worsted) weight angora/viscose/merino wool yarn (1¾ oz/108 yds/50g per skein): 6 hanks #02 mocha
- Size I/9/5.5mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle

#### GAUGE

20 sts in pattern = 4 inches; 6 pattern rows = 4 inches

#### **PATTERN NOTES**

Refer to Stitch Diagram as needed.

When working into a chain at the end of a row, insert hook under 2 loops of the top chain stitch.

Chain-3 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.


#### SPECIAL STITCH




Row 2: Ch 3 (see Pattern Notes), dc-lb (see Special Stitch) in each of next 2 sts, [sk 3 sts, bptr (see Stitch Guide) around each of next 3 sts, working in front of 3 bptr just made, fptr (see Stitch Guide) around each of 3 sk sts] across, turn.

**Row 3:** Ch 3, dc-lb in each of next 2 sts, [sk 3 sts, fptr around each of next 3 sts, working behind 3 fptr just made, bptr around each of 3 sk sts] across, turn.

**Rows 4–130:** Rep rows 2 and 3 alternately. At end of row 130, fasten off. Leave long tail for sewing ends tog.

#### Finishing

Block finished piece, pinning each scallop on the sides of the cable pattern to open up the cables and provide greater definition. Use long tail to **whipstitch** (*see illustration*) short ends with RS tog, being careful to match each st to the corresponding st on the other end. **C!** 



Whipstitch Edges





Rep row 2 until piece measures 8 inches or desired width, ending with light country blue row. Fasten off.

#### Edging

Join (see Pattern Notes) autumn red in last st, [ch 3, dc in 3rd ch from hook, sc in sp between next 2 3-dc groups] across first long side and next short side, working sc in corner, change to country blue, rep across 2nd long side and short side, join in first st. Fasten off. C!



**Row 2: Ch 3** (see Pattern Note), dc in next st and in each rem sc and ch-1 sp across, turn.

**Row 3:** Ch 1, sc in first dc, tr in first sk ch on row 1, sk dc behind tr just made, sc in next dc, ch 1, sk next dc, sc in next dc, \***tr dec** *(see Stitch Guide)* in previous sk ch and next sk ch on row 1, sk dc behind tr dec just made, sc in next dc, ch 1, sk next dc, sc in next dc, rep from \* across to last 2 dc, tr in same st as 2nd leg of previous tr dec, sk dc behind tr just made, sc in top of beg ch-3, turn.

**Row 4:** Ch 3, dc in next st and in rem st across, turn.

**Row 5:** Ch 1, sc in first dc, tr in first sk dc 3 rows below, sk dc behind tr just made, sc in next dc, ch 1, sk next dc, sc in next dc, \*tr dec in previous sk dc and next sk dc 3 rows below, sk dc behind tr dec just made, sc in next dc, ch 1, sk next dc, sc in next dc, rep from \* across to last 2 dc, tr in same st as 2nd leg of previous tr dec, sk dc behind tr just made, sc in top of beg ch-3, turn.

Rep rows 4 and 5 alternately for pattern. C!

#### SUNFLOWER SQUARE

**Rnd 1:** With bluebell, ch 5, sl st in first ch to form ring, ch 5 (see Pattern Notes), 19 dtr in ring, **join** (see Pattern Notes) in first st. Fasten off bluebell. (20 sts)

Rnd 2: Join jam in any st, beg cl (see Special Stitches) in same st, ch 7 (corner made), cl (see Special Stitches) in next st, [ch 3, sk next st, cl in next st, ch 3, sk next st, cl in next st, ch 7

#### **FINISHED MEASUREMENTS**

**Armhole depth:** 7 inches *(small)* [7½ inches *(medium)*, 8 inches *(large)*, 8¼ inches *(X-large)*, 8¾ inches *(2X-large)*, 9 inches *(3X-large)*]

Back length: 22–23 inches (all sizes)

#### MATERIALS

- Berroco Remix medium (worsted) weight nylon/cotton/acrylic/silk/ linen yarn (3½ oz/216 yds/100g per ball): 5 [5, 6, 7, 8, 8] balls #3985 merlot
- Size H/8/5mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle

#### GAUGE

18 sts in pattern = 4 inches; 9½ pattern rows = 4 inches

Take time to check gauge.

#### **PATTERN NOTES**

Cardigan body is worked side to side.

Chain-4 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet and chain-1 unless otherwise stated.

Chain-3 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

To work an increase row, chain 3 and then work a double crochet in the stitch at the base of the chain, work in the established pattern across to the last stitch, and work 2 double crochets in the last stitch. Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

#### CARDIGAN Left Front

**Row 1 (WS):** Ch 85 [87, 89, 93, 95, 99] loosely, 1 dc in 4th ch from hook, \*ch 1, sk 1 ch, 1 dc in next ch, rep from \* across, ending with 1 dc in last ch, turn. (43 [44, 45, 47, 48, 50] dc, 40 [41, 42, 43, 45, 47] ch sps)

**Row 2 (RS): Ch 4** (see Pattern Notes), sk 1 dc, \*1 dc in next ch sp, ch 1, rep from \* across, ending with 1 dc in ch-3 from previous row, turn.

**Row 3: Ch 3** (see Pattern Notes), \*1 dc in next ch sp, ch 1, rep from \* across, ending with 1 dc in last ch sp, 1 dc in last st, turn.

Rep rows 2 and 3 until piece measures 15¼ [15¾, 16¼, 16¾, 17¼, 17¾] inches from Left Front edge, ending with WS row.

#### **First Armhole Shaping**

**Row 1 (RS):** Ch 3, 1 dc in each dc and ch sp across. (*83 [85, 87, 91, 93, 97] dc*)

**Row 2:** Ch 3, dc in each of next 3 dc, ch 25 [27, 28, 29, 31, 32], sk 25 [27, 28, 29, 31, 32] sts, dc in each of rem sts across, turn.

Row 3: Ch 3, dc in each st across.

#### Back

**Row 1 (WS):** Ch 3, \*dc in next dc, ch 1, sk 1 st, rep from \* across, ending with 1 dc in last st, turn.

**Row 2:** Ch 4, sk 1, \*dc in next ch sp, ch 1, rep from \* across, ending with dc in last st, turn.

**Row 3:** Ch 3, \*dc in next ch sp, ch 1, rep from \* across, ending with dc in last ch sp, dc in last st, turn.

**Bust:** 37 inches (*small*) [41 inches (*medium*), 45 inches (*large*), 49 inches (*X-large*), 53 inches (*2X-large*), 57 inches (*3X-large*)]

**Length:** 29½ inches (*small*) [29½ inches (*medium*), 29½ inches (*large*), 29½ inches (*X-large*), 32 inches (*2X-large*), 32 inches (*3X-large*)]

#### MATERIALS

 Crystal Palace Panda Silk super fine (fingering) weight bamboo/ machine-washable merino wool/combed silk yarn (1¾ oz/204 yds/50g per skein):

8 [9, 10, 11, 12, 12] skeins #3001 pearl blue

- Size D/3/3.25mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle
- Stitch markers

#### GAUGE

**Note:** Gauge is measured after blocking. "Hanging gauge" means Lace Panels are blocked primarily vertically and then horizontally, and then measured.

37 sts in Herringbone dc pattern =  $7\frac{3}{4}$  inches; 22 Herringbone dc pattern rows =  $6\frac{1}{4}$  inches

Front Lace Panel hanging gauge:  $29 \text{ sts} = 5\frac{1}{2} \text{ inches}; 22 \text{ rows} = 6\frac{3}{4} \text{ inches}$ 

**Center Back Lace Panel hanging gauge:** 69 sts = 10 inches; 18 pattern rows = 8 inches

#### PATTERN NOTES

All chain spaces and tops of cluster stitches count as 1 stitch.

When instructed to work in pattern stitch as established, work next row of pattern stitch and ensure stitches line up as in previous rows.

Left and right sides of garment refer to left and right sides from the wearer's perspective.





**First 6-double crochet split cluster (first 6-dc split cl):** [Yo, insert hook in same ch-3 sp just worked, yo, pull up lp, yo, pull through 2 lps on hook] 3 times (*4 lps on hook*), sk next 2 ch-3 sps, yo, insert hook in next ch-3 sp, yo, pull up lp, yo, pull through 2 lps on hook (*5 lps on hook*), [yo, insert hook in same ch-3 sp just worked, yo, pull up lp, yo, pull through 2 lps on



hook] twice (7 lps on hook), yo, pull through all 7 lps on hook.

**2nd 6-double crochet split cluster (2nd 6-dc split cl):** Yo, insert hook in next st, yo, pull up lp, yo, pull through 2 lps on hook (*2 lps on hook*), [yo, insert hook in same st, yo, pull up lp, yo, pull through 2 lps on hook] twice, (*4 lps on hook*), sk next ch-3 sp, yo, insert hook in next ch-3 sp, yo, pull up lp, yo, pull through 2 lps on hook (*5 lps on hook*), [yo, insert hook in same ch-3 sp, yo, pull up lp, yo, pull through 2 lps on hook] twice (*7 lps on hook*), yo, pull through all 7 lps on hook.

**Double crochet V-stitch (dc V-st):** (Dc, ch 1, dc) as indicated in instructions.

**2-double crochet cluster V-stitch (2-dc cl V-st):** (2-dc cl, ch 2, 2-dc cl) as indicated in instructions.



**Row 2:** Beg dc, dc in next st, ch 2, 3-dc cl V-st in next ch-3 sp, dc in next st, [ch 1, sk next ch-1 sp, dc in next st] twice, 3-dc cl V-st in next ch-3 sp, ch 3, sk next ch-3 sp, [sc in next ch-3 sp, ch 3] twice, sk next ch-3 sp, 3-dc cl V-st in next ch-3 sp, ch 5, 3-dc cl V-st in next ch-5 sp, ch 5, 3-dc cl V-st in next ch-3 sp, ch 3, sk next ch-3 sp, [sc in next ch-3 sp, ch 3] twice, sk next ch-3 sp, 3-dc cl V-st in next ch-3 sp, dc in next st, [ch 1, sk next ch-1 sp, dc in next st]

**Row 4:** Beg dc, dc in next st, ch 2, 3-dc cl V-st in next ch-3 sp, dc in next st, [ch 1, sk next ch-1 sp, dc in next st] twice, **3-dc cl** (see Special Stitches) in next ch-3 sp, ch 3, work **first 6-dc split cl** (see Special Stitches), ch 3, 3-dc cl in same ch-3 sp just worked, ch 1, [dc in next st, ch 1] 5 times, sk next ch-3 sp, 3-dc cl V-st in next ch-3 sp, ch 1, [dc in next st, ch 1] 5 times, sk next ch-3 sp, 3-dc cl in next ch-3 sp, ch 3, first 6-dc split cl, ch 3, 3-dc cl in same ch-3 sp just worked, dc in next st, [ch 1, sk next ch-1 sp, dc in next st] twice, 3-dc cl in next ch-3 sp, ch 2, dc in each of last 2 sts, turn.

**Row 5:** Beg dc, dc in next st, ch 2, 3-dc cl V-st in next ch-3 sp, dc in next st, [ch 1, sk next ch-1 sp, dc in next st] twice, work **2nd 6-dc split cl** (*see Special Stitches*), ch 3, 3-dc cl in same ch-3 sp just worked, ch 1, sk next ch-1 sp, [dc in next st, ch 2, sk next ch-1 sp] 4 times, dc in next st, ch 2, sk next ch-1 sp, 3-dc cl V-st in next ch-3 sp, ch 1, sk next ch-1 sp, [dc in next st, ch 2, sk next ch-1 sp] 4 times, dc in next st, ch 2, sk next ch-1 sp] 4 times, dc in next st, ch 1, sk next ch-1 sp, 3-dc cl in next ch-3 sp, ch 3, 2nd 6-dc split cl, dc in next st, [ch 1, sk next ch-1 sp, dc in next st] twice, 3-dc cl in next ch-3 sp, ch 2, dc in each of last 2 sts, turn.

**Row 4:** Ch 1, sc in each of first 2 sts, ch 2, sk next 7 sts, [(dc, ch 1) 3 times in next ch-2 sp, sk next st] twice, ({dc, ch 1} twice, dc, ch 2) in next ch-2 sp, sk next 7 sts, sc in next ch-2 sp, ch 2, sk next 7 sts, [(dc, ch 1) 3 times in next ch-2 sp, sk next st] twice, ({dc, ch 1} twice, dc, ch 2) in next ch-2 sp, sk next 7 sts, sc in each of last 2 sts, turn.

**Row 5:** Beg dc, dc V-st in next st, ch 1, sk next 5 sts, [sc in next ch-1 sp, ch 2, sk next st] 5 times, sc in next ch-1 sp, ch 2, sk next 5 sts, dc V-st in next sc, ch 2, sk next 5 sts, [sc in next ch-1 sp, ch 2, sk next st] 5 times, sc in



next ch-1 sp, ch 2, sk next 5 sts, dc V-st in next st, dc in last st, turn.

**Row 6: Beg dc** (see Special Stitches), dc in next st, ch 1, **2-dc cl** (see Special Stitches) in next ch-1 sp, ch 3, sk next 4 sts, [sc in next ch-1 sp, ch 2, sk next st] 4 times, sc in next ch-1 sp, ch 3, sk next 4 sts, 2-dc cl V-st in next ch-1 sp, ch 3, sk next 4 sts, [sc in next ch-1 sp, ch 2, sk next st] 4 times, sc in next ch-1 sp, ch 3, sk next 4 sts, 2-dc cl in next ch-1 sp, sk next st, dc in each of last 2 sts, turn.

**Row 7:** Beg dc, dc in next st, ch 1, (3-dc cl, ch 2, 3-dc cl) in next ch-1 sp, ch 2, sk next 5 sts, [sc in next ch-2 sp, ch 3, sk next st] 3 times, sc in next ch-2 sp, ch 2, sk next 5 sts, (3-dc cl, ch 2) 4 times in next ch-2 sp, sk next 5 sts, [sc in next ch-2 sp, ch 2, sk next st] 3 times, sc in next ch-2 sp, ch 2, sk next 5 sts, (3-dc cl, ch 2, 3-dc cl) in next ch-1 sp, ch 1, dc in each of last 2 sts, turn.

**Row 8:** Beg dc, dc in next st, ch 1, dc in next ch-1 sp, ch 1, sk next st, {{dc, ch 1} twice, dc} in next ch-2 sp, ch 2, sk next 7 sts, sc in next ch-2 sp, ch 2, sk next 7 sts, [(dc, ch 1) 3 times in next ch-2 sp, sk next st] twice, ({dc, ch 1} twice, dc, ch 2) in next ch-2 sp, sk next 7 sts, sc in next ch-2 sp, ch 2, sk next 7 sts, (dc, ch 1) 3 times in next ch-2 sp, sk next st, dc in next ch-1 sp, ch 1, dc in each of last 2 sts, turn.

Rep rows 1–8 consecutively for pattern.

#### Herringbone Double Crochet (Herringbone dc)

**Row 1: Beg dc** (see Special Stitches), [yo, insert hook in next st, yo, pull up lp through st and first lp on hook, yo, pull through 1 lp on hook, yo, pull through 2 lps on hook] across to last st, dc in last st, turn.





#### GAUGE

#### Size H hook with worsted-weight yarn:

15 dc = 4 inches; 7 dc rows = 4 inches

**Row 3: Dec** (see Pattern Notes), [dc in front lp, dc in back lp] across to last 3 sts, dc in front lp, **dc dec** (see Stitch Guide) in last 2 sts, turn. (81 [89, 97, 105, 113] dc)

**Rows 4–7:** Ch 3, [dc in front lp, dc in back lp] across to last 2 sts, dc in front lp, dc in top of beg ch-3, turn.

**Row 8:** Dec, [dc in back lp, dc in front lp] across to last 3 sts, dc in back lp, dc dec in last 2 sts, turn. (*79* [*87*, *95*, *103*, *111*] *dc*)

**Rows 9–13:** Ch 3, work in established pattern across, turn.





Rep last 6 rows until 69 [77, 85, 93, 101] sts rem, then work even until piece measures 35 inches, ending with WS row.

#### **Shape Armholes**

**Row 1 (RS):** Sl st in first 5 [7, 9, 11, 13] sts, ch 3, work in established pattern across to last 4 [6, 8, 10, 12] sts, turn, leaving rem sts unworked. *(61 [65, 69, 73, 77] sts)* 

**Rows 2–5 [2–6, 2–7, 2–8, 2–9]:** Dec, work in established pattern across to last 2 sts, dc dec in last 2 sts, turn. *(53 [55, 57, 59, 61] sts after last row)* 

Work even in established pattern for 11 [10, 11, 10, 9] more rows. Fasten off.

#### Left Front

**Row 1 (WS):** With grey and size H hook, ch 41 [45, 49, 53, 57], dc in 4th ch from hook and in each ch across, turn. (*39 [43, 47, 51, 55] sts*)



**Rows 4–7:** Ch 3, work in established pattern across, turn.

**Row 8:** Ch 3, work in established pattern across to last 2 sts, dc dec in last 2 sts, turn. (*37 [41, 45, 49, 53] sts*)

**Rows 9–13:** Ch 3, work in established pattern across, turn.

Rep last rows 8–13 until 32 [36, 40, 44, 48] sts rem, then work even until piece measures 35 inches, ending with WS row.

#### Shape Armhole

**Row 1 (RS):** Ch 3, work in established pattern across to last 4 [6, 8, 10, 12] sts, turn, leaving rem sts unworked. (*28 [30, 32, 34, 36] sts*)

**2–8, 2–8]:** Dec, work in established pattern across to last 2 sts, dc dec in last 2 sts, turn. (41 [39, 37, 33, 33] sts after last row)

Sizes Small & Medium Only Row 6 [7]: Ch 2, dc dec in next 2 sts, work in established pattern across to last 3 sts, dc dec in last 3 sts. (37 [35] sts)

All Sizes Fasten off.

#### Finishing

Sew shoulder seams. Sew Cap of Sleeves into armholes. Sew Sleeve and side seams.

#### **Front Bands**

With RS facing and size H hook, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) grey in bottom corner of Right Front.

**Row 1:** Ch 1, sc evenly sp along Right Front edge, around Neck opening and down Left Front to bottom corner, working 3 sc in each Front Neck corner, turn.

**Rows 2–4:** Ch 1, sc in each sc, working 3 sc in each Front Neck corner sts.

Place marker ½ inch from top of Neck on Right Front Band, place marker 12 inches from bottom corner on Right Front Band. Evenly sp 4 [4, 5, 5, 5] markers between first 2 to indicate buttonhole placement.

**Row 5:** Ch 1, sc as before working (ch 3, sk next 3 sc) at each st marker for buttonholes, turn.

**Length:** 22 inches (*small*) [22½ inches (*medium*), 23 inches (*large*), 23½ inches (*X-large*), 24 inches (*2X-large*)]

#### MATERIALS

- Kolláge Yarns Fantastic medium (worsted) weight merino wool yarn (1¾ oz/93 yds/50g per hank): 15 [15, 16, 16, 17] hanks #7504 dusty rose
- Sizes G/6/4mm and H/8/5mm crochet hooks or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle

#### GAUGE

**Size H hook:** 12 sts in Textured Pattern = 4 inches; 12 Textured Pattern rows = 4 inches

Take time to check gauge.

#### **PATTERN NOTES**

Chain-1 at beginning of row does not count as a stitch.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

#### STITCH PATTERNS Textured Pattern

Odd number of sts.

**Foundation row (RS):** Work an even number of chs, sc in 2nd ch from hook and in each ch across, turn.

**Row 1 (WS): Ch 1** (see Pattern Notes), sc in first st, \*tr in next sc, sc in next sc, rep from \* across, turn.

**Row 2:** Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn. Rep rows 1 and 2 alternately for pattern.

#### **Sideways Rib**

Any number of sts.

Foundation row (RS): Sc in 2nd ch from hook and in each ch across, turn.

**Row 1:** Ch 1, sc in **back lp** (see Stitch Guide) only of each sc across, turn. Rep row 1 for pattern.

#### PULLOVER

Back

**Getting started:** With size H hook, ch 52 [58, 64, 70, 76].

Beg **Textured Pattern** (see Stitch Patterns) and work even on 51 [57, 63, 69, 75] sts until piece measures 15 inches from beg, ending with WS row.

#### **Shape Armholes**

Row 1: SI st in first 3 [4, 5, 5, 6] sts, ch 1,

work in established pattern across to last 2 [3, 4, 4, 5] sts, turn, leaving rem sts unworked.

**Row 2:** SI st in first 3 [3, 3, 4, 4] sts, ch 1, work in established pattern across to last 2 [2, 2, 3, 3] sts, turn, leaving rem sts unworked.

**Row(s) 3 [3 & 4, 3 & 4, 3 & 4, 3 & 4]:** Ch 1, **sc dec** (*see Stitch Guide*) in first 2 sts, work in established pattern across to last 2 sts, sc dec in last 2 sts, turn.

**Row 4 [5, 5, 5, 5]:** Ch 1, work in established pattern across, turn.

Row 5 [6, 6, 6, 6]: Rep row 3.

Rep last 2 rows 0 [0, 0, 1, 1] time(s). (39 [41, 45, 47, 51] sts at end of last row)

Work even in established pattern until piece measures 22 [22½, 23, 23½, 24] inches from beg, ending with WS row. Fasten off.

#### Front

Work as for Back until piece measures 19 [19½, 20, 20½, 21] inches from beg, ending with WS row.

#### Left Neck Edge

**Row 1 (RS):** Work in established pattern across first 14 [15, 17, 18, 20] sts, turn, leaving rem sts unworked.

**Row 2:** SI st in first 4 sts, ch 1, work in established pattern across, turn. (*11 [12, 14, 15, 17] sts*)

**Row 3:** Ch 1, work in established pattern across to last 2 sts, sc dec in last 2 sts, turn. *(10 [11, 12, 14, 16] sts)* 

**Row 4:** Ch 1, sc dec in first 2 sts, work in established pattern across, turn. (*9* [10, 12, 13, 15] sts)

Work in established pattern even until piece measures same as Back to shoulders. Fasten off.

#### **Right Neck Edge**

**Row 1 (RS):** From first sl st of Left Neck Edge, skip center 11 sts, **join** (see Pattern Notes) in next st, sc in each st across, turn.

**Row 2:** Ch 1, work in established pattern across 11 [12, 14, 15, 17] sts, turn, leaving rem sts unworked.



**Row 3:** Ch 1, sc dec in first 2 sts, work in established pattern across, turn. *(10 [11, 12, 14, 16] sts)* 

**Row 4:** Ch 1, work in established pattern across to last 2 sts, sc dec in last 2 sts, turn. (9 [10, 12, 13, 15] sts)

Work in established pattern even until piece measures same as Back to shoulders. Fasten off.

#### Sleeve Make 2.

**Getting started:** With size H hook, ch 48 [50, 54, 56, 60].

Beg Textured Pattern and work even on 47 [49, 53, 55, 59] sts for 10 [12, 10, 12, 10] rows.

#### Sizes Small, Large & 2X-Large Only

**Row 1:** Ch 1, sc dec in first 2 sts, work in established pattern across to last 2 sts, sc dec in last 2 sts, turn.

**Rows 2–10:** Ch 1, work in established pattern across, turn.

[Rep last 10 rows consecutively] 4 times. (39 [45, 51] sts after last row)

Rows 11 & 12: Ch 1, work in established pattern across, turn.

**Row 13:** Ch 1, sc dec in first 2 sts, work in established pattern across to last 2 sts, sc dec in last 2 sts, turn. (*37 [43, 49] sts*)

#### Sizes Medium & X-Large Only

Row 1: Ch 1, sc dec in first 2 sts, work in

established pattern across to last 2 sts, sc dec in last 2 sts, turn.

**Rows 2–12:** Ch 1, work in established pattern across, turn.

Row 13: Ch 1, sc dec in first 2 sts, work in established pattern across to last 2 sts, sc dec in last 2 sts, turn.

Rows 14–26: Ch 1, work in established pattern across, turn.

Row 27: Ch 1, sc dec in first 2 sts, work in established pattern across to last 2 sts, sc dec in last 2 sts, turn.

[Rep rows 14–27] once. ([41, 47] sts after last row)

#### All Sizes

Work even until piece

measures 18½ inches from beg, ending with WS row, turn.







Melissa Leapman is a prolific designer and is the author of several bestselling crochet and knitting books, keep an eye out for her newest title this September. **Rows 13 & 14 [15 & 16, 16 & 17, 18 & 19, 19 & 20]:** SI st in first 3 sts, ch 1, work in established pattern across to last 2 sts, turn, leaving rem sts unworked. After last row, fasten off.

#### Neckband

With size G hook, ch 16, work even in **Sideways Rib** (see Stitch Patterns) until Neckband fits around neckline when slightly stretched. Fasten off.

#### Finishing

Sew shoulder seams. Sew foundation row of Neckband to the last row of Neckband. Sew Neckband into place onto neckline, placing seam at center of Back neck.

Set in sleeve caps.

**Size F hook:** 22 sts in Seed St = 4 inches; 27 Seed St rows = 5 inches

Chain-3 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

Multiple of 4 sts plus 3 sts plus 2 chs.

Foundation row (WS): Dc in 4th ch from hook and in next ch, \*ch 1, sk 1 ch, dc in each of next 3 chs, rep from \* across, turn.

**Row 1: Ch 3** (see Pattern Notes), dc in each of next 2 dc, \*ch 1, sk 1 ch, dc in each of next 3 sts, rep from \* across, turn.

Rep row 1 indicated number of times for pattern.

#### Seed Stitch (Seed St)

Multiple of 2 sts plus 1 st.

Row 1 (WS): Ch 1, sc in first sc, sc in first ch-1 sp, \*ch 1, sk 1 sc, sc in next ch-1 sp, rep from \* across, ending with sc in last sc, turn.

Row 2: Ch 1, sc in first sc, \*ch 1, sk 1 sc, sc in next ch-1 sp, rep from \* across, ending with ch 1, sk 1 sc, sc in last sc, turn.

Rep rows 1 and 2 for pattern.

#### **PULLOVER** Back

With size F hook, ch 93 [101, 113, 125, 133], work foundation row of Border (see Stitch Patterns). (91 [99, 111, 123, 131] sts)

[Rep row 1 of Border] 8 times.

#### Body

Set-up row (RS): With size F hook, ch 1, sc in first dc, \*ch 1, sk 1 dc, sc in next dc, ch 1, sk next ch-1 sp, sc in next dc, rep from \* across, ending with ch 1, sk next dc, sc in last dc, turn.

Rep rows 1 and 2 of Seed St (see Stitch Patterns) until piece measures 13<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> inches from beg, ending with WS row.

#### Shape Raglan

**Row 1:** SI st in first 3 [3, 4, 4, 5] sts, ch 1, sc in same st, work in established pattern across to last 2 [2, 3, 3, 4], turn, leaving rem sts unworked. (87 [95, 105, 117, 123] sts)

Row 2: Ch 1, work in established pattern across, turn.

Row 3: Ch 1, sc dec (see Stitch Guide) in next 2 sts, work in established pattern across to last 2 sts, sc dec in last 2 sts, turn.

[Rep rows 2 and 3 alternately] 14 [13, 8, 6, 5] times. (57 [67, 87, 103, 111] sts)

Next row: Ch 1, sc dec in next 2 sts, work in established pattern across to last 2 sts, sc dec in last 2 sts, turn.

Next rows: Rep last row until 51 [53, 53, 57, 57] sts rem. Fasten off.

#### Front

Work as for Back.

#### Sleeve

Make 2.

With size F hook, ch 45 [45, 49, 53, 57]. Work foundation row of Border. (43 [43, 47, 51, 55] sts)

[Rep row 1 of Border] 8 times.

#### Body

Set-up row (RS): With size F hook, ch 1, sc in first dc, \*ch 1, sk 1 dc, sc in next dc, ch 1, sk next ch-1 sp, sc in next dc, rep from \* across, endimg with ch 1, sk next dc, sc in last dc, turn.





**Next 4 rows:** [Rep rows 1 and 2 of Seed St pattern alternately] twice.

Next row: Rep row 1 of Seed St.

**Next row:** Ch 1, 2 sc in first st, work in established pattern across to last st, 2 sc in last st, turn.

**Next 3 rows:** Work even in established pattern.

[Rep last 4 rows 12 times.] (69 [69, 73, 77, 81] sts after last row)

Work even until piece measures 14¾ inches from beg.

#### Shape Raglan

**Next row:** SI st in each of first 3 [3, 4, 4, 5] sts, ch 1, sc in same st, work established pattern across to last 2 [2, 3, 3, 4], turn, leaving rem sts unworked. (65 [65, 67, 71, 73] sts)


**Next row:** Ch 1, work established pattern across, turn.

**Next row:** Ch 1, sc dec in next 2 sts, work established pattern across to last 2 sts, sc dec in last 2 sts, turn.

#### Finishing

Sew Raglan edges of Sleeve to Front and Back Raglan edges. Rep for other Sleeve. Sew side and Sleeve seams.

#### Neckband

**Rnd 1:** With RS facing and size E hook, \*work 51 [53, 53, 57, 57] sc along Back neck opening, 23 [23, 27, 31, 31] sc along Sleeve edge, rep from \* across Front and other Sleeve. (*148* [*152*, *160*, *176*, *176*] sts)

**Rnd 2:** \*Sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of next 47 [49, 49, 53, 53] sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of next 23 [23, 27, 31, 31] sts, rep from \* once. (144 [148, 156, 172, 172] sts)


**Rnd 3:** \*Sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of next 45 [47, 47, 51, 51] sts, sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of next 23 [23, 27, 31, 31] sts, rep from \* once. (*140* [*144*, *152*, *168*, *168*] *sts*)

**Rnd 4:** \*Sc dec in next 2 sts, sc in each of next 43 [45, 45, 49, 49] sts, sc dec in next 2 sts,







Row 4: Ch 4 (see Pattern Notes), [5 dc in 3rd ch of next ch-5, ch 1] across, dc in last st, turn.

Row 5: Ch 8 (see Pattern Notes), [dc in next ch-1 sp, ch 5] across, dc in last st, turn.

Row 6: Ch 8, [dc in next dc, ch 5] across, dc in last st, turn.

Row 7: Ch 5 (see Pattern Notes), [working over ch-5 sp of last row, sc in ch-5 sp on row before last, ch 2, dc in next dc, ch 2] across, dc in last st, turn.

**Row 8:** Ch 3, 2 dc in next ch-2 sp, [ch 7, sk next 3 sc and next 2 ch sps, dc in next ch sp, dc in next dc, dc in next ch sp] across, ch 7, 2 dc in last ch-2 sp, dc in last st, turn.

Rows 9–80: [Rep rows 3–8 consecutively] 12 times.

Row 81: Ch 1, sc in each st and in each ch across, turn. (83 sc)

Row 82: Ch 1, sc in first st, [sm picot (see Special Stitches), sc in next st, **Ig picot** (see Special Stitches), sc in next st, sm picot, sc in each of next 7 sts] across, ending with sm picot, sc in next st, lq picot, sc in next st, sm picot, sc in last st. Fasten off.

Row 83: Working in starting ch on opposite side of row 1, join with sc in first st, [sm picot, sc in next st, lq picot, sc in next st, sm picot, sc in each of next 7 sts] across ending with sm picot, sc in next st, lq picot, sc in next st, sm picot, sc in last st. Fasten off.

Block to measurements. C!



• Size I/9/5.5mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge

#### GAUGE

Row 1 = 2 inches across top; row  $1 = 1\frac{1}{2}$  inches high

#### **PATTERN NOTES**

Chain-4 at beginning of row counts as first treble crochet unless otherwise stated.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

#### SPECIAL STITCHES

**Cluster (cl):** Holding back last lp of each st on hook, 2 dc as indicated in instructions, yo, pull through all lps on hook.

**First half of flower:** Ch 3, **cl** (*see Special Stitches*) in 3rd ch from hook, ch 4, cl in 3rd ch from hook, ch 1.

**2nd half of flower:** (Cl, ch 3, sl st, ch 3, cl) in ch-1 sp between petals.

#### SHAWL

**Row 1:** Ch 5, (tr, ch 1, 2 tr) in 5th ch from hook (*first 4 chs count as first tr*), turn.



**Row 2: Ch 4** (see Pattern Notes), (tr, ch 5, sc) in ch-1 sp, ch 5, tr in top of turning ch, turn. (2 ch-5 sps)

**Row 3:** Ch 4, tr in next st, ch 5, [sc in next ch-5 sp, ch 5] twice, tr in each of last 2 sts, turn.

**Row 4:** Ch 4, tr in next st, ch 5, [sc in next ch-5 sp, ch 5] 3 times, tr in each of last 2 sts, turn.

**Row 5:** Ch 4, tr in next st, ch 5, [sc in next ch-5 sp, ch 5] 4 times, tr in each of last 2 sts, turn.

**Row 6:** Ch 4, tr in next st, ch 5, [sc in next ch-5 sp, ch 5] 5 times, tr in each of last 2 sts, turn.

**Row 7 (first flower row):** Ch 4, tr in next st, ch 5, sc in next ch-5 sp, \***first half of flower** (*see Special Stitches*), sc in next ch-5 sp\*\*, ch 5, sc in next ch-5 sp, rep from \* across, ending last rep at \*\*, ch 5, tr in each of last 2 sts, turn. (*3 half flowers*)


**Row 8 (2nd flower row):** Ch 4, tr in next st, ch 5, sc in next ch-5 sp, \*ch 3, **2nd half of flower** (*see Special Stitches*), ch 3, sc in next ch-5 sp, rep from \* twice, ch 5, tr in each of last 2 sts, turn. (*3 completed flowers*)

**Row 9:** Ch 4, tr in next st, ch 5, sc in next ch-5 sp, [ch 5, sc in top of next flower petal] twice, \*first half of flower, sc in top of flower petal, ch 5, sc in top of next flower petal, rep from \* once, ch 5, sc in next ch-5 sp, ch 5, tr in each of last 2 sts, turn. (*2 half flowers*)

**Row 10:** Ch 4, tr in next st, [ch 5, sc in next ch-5 sp] 3 times, \*ch 3, 2nd half of flower, ch 3, sc in next ch-5 sp, rep from \* once, [ch 5, sc in next ch-5 sp] twice, ch 5, tr in each of last 2 sts, turn. (*2 completed flowers*)

**Row 11:** Ch 4, tr in next st, [ch 5, sc in next ch-5 sp] 3 times, [ch 5, sc in top of flower petal, ch 5, sc in top of next petal] twice, [ch 5, sc in next ch-5 sp] 3 times, ch 5, tr in each of last 2 sts, turn. *(11 ch-5 sps)* 

**Rows 12–14:** Ch 4, tr in next st, [ch 5, sc in next ch-5 sp] across, ch 5, tr in each of last 2 sts, turn. (*14 ch-5 sps at end of last row*)



**Row 15:** Ch 4, tr in next st, ch 5, sc in next ch-5 sp, \*first half of flower, sc in next ch-5 sp, ch 5\*\*, sc in next ch-5 sp, rep from \* across, ending last rep at \*\*, tr in each of last 2 sts, turn. (*7 half flowers*)

**Row 16:** Ch 4, tr in next st, sc in next ch-5 sp, \*ch 3, 2nd half of flower, ch 3, sc in next ch-5 sp, rep from \* across, ch 5, tr in each of last 2 sts, turn. (*7 completed flowers*)

**Row 17:** Ch 4, tr in next st, ch 5, sc in next ch-5 sp, ch 5, sc in next of next flower petal, ch 5, sc in top of next petal, \*first half of flower, sc in top of petal, ch 5, sc in of next petal, rep from \* 5 times, ch 5, sc in next ch-5 sp, ch 5, tr in each of last 2 sts, turn. *(6 half flowers)* 

**Row 18:** Ch 4, tr in next st, [ch 5, sc in next ch-5 sp] 3 times, \*ch 3, 2nd half of flower,

ch 3, sc in next ch-5 sp, rep from \* 5 times, [ch 5, sc in next ch-5 sp] twice, ch 5, tr in each of last 2 sts, turn. (6 completed flowers)

**Row 19:** Ch 4, tr in next st, [ch 5, sc in next ch-5 sp] 3 times, [ch 5, sc in top of next flower petal, ch 5, sc in top of next petal] across to last flower, [ch 5, sc in next ch-5 sp] 3 times, ch 5, tr in each of last 2 sts, turn. (*19 ch-5 sps*)

**Rows 20–22:** Ch 4, tr in next st, [ch 5, sc in next ch-5 sp] across, ch 5, tr in each of last 2 sts, turn. (22 ch-5 sps at end of last row)

**Rows 23–31:** [Rep rows 15–22 consecutively] twice, ending last rep with row 16. At end of last row, fasten off. (*16 completed flowers at end of last row*)

Block if desired. C!

Across shoulders: 47 inches

Front length: 32½ inches

Center back length: 28 inches

#### MATERIALS

- Premier Yarns Deborah Norville Fashion Jeweltones fine (sport) weight acrylic/wool/polyester yarn (1¾ oz/99 yds/50g per skein): 14 skeins #2201 moonshine
- Size M/N-13/9mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle
- Stitch markers: 3

#### GAUGE

2 pattern reps = 5 inches; 4 rows = 3 inches

#### **PATTERN NOTES**

Pattern is worked in multiple of 8 + 2.

Stitch markers identify corners as work progresses. In row 1, place marker in chain-3 space indicated. In row 2, move marker to chain-3 space of corner. In row 3, move marker to chain-1 sp indicated. Repeat marker placement for rows 2 and 3 in sequence for remainder of pattern.

Chain-7 at beginning of row counts as first treble crochet and chain-3 unless otherwise stated.

Chain-3 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated. Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

#### SPECIAL STITCHES

**Shell:** (3 dc, ch 1, 3 dc) as indicated in instructions.

**Corner:** (Sc, ch 1, dc, ch 3, dc, ch 1, sc) as indicated in instructions.

**Beginning half shell (beg half shell): Ch 3** (see Pattern Notes), 3 dc in same st as beg ch-3.

**End half shell:** 4 dc as indicated in instructions.

Picot: Ch 3, sl st in top of last st made.

#### WRAP

**Row 1 (RS):** Ch 226, sc in 2nd ch from hook \*[sk next 3 chs, **shell** (see Special Stitches) in next ch, sk next 3 chs, sc in next ch]\* 13 times, ◊ch 3, sc in same ch as last sc, **place marker** (see Pattern Notes)◊, rep between \* twice, rep between ◊ once, rep between \* across, turn. (28 shells, 2 ch-3 sps)

**Row 2: Ch 7** (see Pattern Notes), \*sk next 3 dc, (sc, ch 3, sc) in next ch-1 sp, ch 3, sk next 3 dc, tr in next sc\*\*, ch 3\*, rep between \* to marker, **¢corner** (see Special Stitches) in next ch-3 sp, **move marker** (see Pattern Notes), ch 3, tr in next sc, ch 3¢, rep between \* twice,





Insert hook through work from front to back between strands of next vertical bar on each of next 2 sts, yo, pull lp through.

With long end and working in back lp of last row and front lp of first row, sew row 1 and last row of Ribbing tog.

B. work lps off hook.

#### Row 5:

**A.** 2 TKS, 2 TPS, **cable cross** (see Special Stitches), 2 TPS, 2 TKS, [inc, 1 TPS] twice, 18 TPS, TSS in last st (*36 lps on hook*);

Row 4: Ch 1, hdc in each of first 2 sts, fpdc (see Stitch Guide) around each of next 2 sts, hdc in each of next 2 sts, sk next 2 sts, fptr around each of next 2 sts, fptr around each of 2 sts just sk, hdc in each of next 2 sts, fpdc around each of next 2 sts, hdc in each of last 2 sts, turn.

**Row 5:** Ch 1, hdc in each of first 2 sts, bpdc around each of next 2 sts, hdc in each of next 2 sts, bpdc around each of next 4 sts, hdc in each of next 2 sts, bpdc around each of next 2 sts, hdc in each of last 2 sts, turn.

Row 6: Rep row 4.



**Row 7:** Ch 1, hdc in each of first 2 sts, bpdc around each of next 2 sts, sk next 2 sts, bptr around each of next 2 sts, tr in each of 2 sts just sk, sk next 2 sts, tr in next 2 sts, bptr around each of 2 sts just sk, bpdc around each of next 2 sts, hdc in each of last 2 sts, turn.

Row 8: Rep row 2.

**Row 9:** Ch 1, hdc in each of first 2 sts, bpdc around each of next 4 sts, hdc in each of next 4 sts, bpdc around each of next 4 sts, hdc in each of last 2 sts, turn.

**Next rows:** [Rep rows 2–9 consecutively] 16 times or to desired length, ending last rep with row 8.

**Next row:** Ch 1, hdc in each st across, turn.

**Last rnd:** Ch 1, evenly sp sc around outer edge working 3 sc in each corner, join with sl st in first sc. Fasten off. **C!**

#### FINISHED MEASUREMENTS

**Collar circumference:** 28 inches (*small/ medium/large*) [33 inches (*X-large/2X-large*)]

**Length:** 21 inches (*small/medium/large*) [24½ inches (*X-large/2X-large*)]

#### MATERIALS

- Omega Mimosa fine (sport) weight cotton/rayon yarn (3½ oz/ 240 yds/100g per ball): 4 [5] balls #55 purple
- Size H/8/5mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge

#### GAUGE

13 dc = 3 inches; 4 dc rows = 2 inches

#### **PATTERN NOTES**

Chain-2 at beginning of round **does not** count as first stitch unless otherwise stated.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

Chain-3 at beginning of round counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

The collar rounds are turned, the lace rounds are not turned.

#### CAPE Cabled Collar

**Rnd 1:** Ch 92 [108], sl st in first ch to form ring, being careful not to twist, **ch 2** (see *Pattern Notes*), dc in 3rd ch from hook, dc in each of next 3 chs, ch 1, [dc in each of next

4 chs, ch 1] around, **join** (*see Pattern Notes*) in top of first dc. (92 [108] dc)

**Rnd 2:** Ch 2, sk first 2 sts, **fptr** (*see Stitch Guide*) around each of next 2 sts, working in front of fptr just made, fptr around each of 2 sk sts, [ch 2, sk next 2 sts, fptr around each of

next 2 sts, working in front of fptr just made, fptr around each of next 2 sts] around, ch 2, join in top of first fptr, **turn**. (23 [27] cable)

**Rnd 3:** Ch 2, **bpdc** (see Stitch Guide) around each of first 4 fp sts, 2 dc in next ch sp, [bpdc around each of next 4 fp sts, 2 dc in next ch sp] around, join in top of first bpdc, turn. (138 [162] sts)

**Rnd 4:** Ch 2, dc in each of first 2 sts, sk next 2 sts, fptr around each of next 2 sts, working in front of last 2 fptr made, fptr around each of last 2 sk sts] around, join in top of first dc, turn.

**Rnd 5:** Ch 2, bpdc around each of first 4 fp sts, 2 dc in each of next 2 dc, [bpdc around each of next 4 fp sts, 2 dc in each of next 2 dc] around join in top of first bpdc, turn. (184 [216] sts) **Rnd 6:** Ch 2, sk first 2 sts, fptr around each of next 2 sts, working in front of last 2 fptr sts made, fptr around each of 2 sk sts, [sk next 2 sts, fptr around each of next 2 sts, work in front of last 2 fptr sts made, fptr around each of 2 sk sts] around, join in top of first fptr, turn.

#### **FINISHED MEASUREMENTS**

9 inches long x 20 inches in circumference

#### MATERIALS



- Berroco Boboli medium (worsted) weight wool/acrylic/viscose yarn (3½ oz/206 yds/100g per skein): 1 skein #5350 garden walk
- Size H/8/5mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle

#### GAUGE

7 rnds from center = 4 inches

#### **PATTERN NOTES**

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

Chain-3 at beginning of round counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

#### HAT

**Rnd 1:** Ch 4, 11 dc in 4th ch from hook (*first 3 chs count as first dc*), **join** (*see Pattern Notes*) in 4th ch of beg ch-4. (*12 dc*)

Rnd 2: Ch 1, 2 sc in first st, [(dc, ch 1, dc) in next st, 2 sc in next st] 5 times, (dc, ch 1, dc) in last st, join in first sc. **Rnd 3:** Ch 1, sc in each of first 2 sts, \*dc in next st, (dc, ch 1, dc) in next ch-1 sp, dc in next st\*\*, sc in each of next 2 sts, rep from \* around, ending last rep at \*\*, join in first sc.

**Rnd 4:** Ch 1, sc in each of first 2 sts, \*dc in each of next 2 sts, (2 dc, ch 1, 2 dc) in next ch-1 sp, dc in each of next 2 sts\*\*, sc in each of next 2 sts, rep from \* around, ending last rep at \*\*, join in first sc.

**Rnd 5:** Sl st in each of next 2 sts, **ch 3** (see *Pattern Notes*), dc in each of next 3 sts, \*(2 dc, ch 1, 2 dc) in next ch-1 sp, dc in each of next 4 sts\*\*, sk next 2 sts, dc in each of next 4 sts, rep from \* around, ending last rep at \*\*, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3.

**Rnd 6:** Sl st in next st, ch 3, dc in each of next 4 sts, \*(dc, ch 1, dc) in next ch-1 sp, dc in each of next 5 sts\*\*, sk next 2 sts, dc in each of next 5 sts, rep from \* around, ending last rep at \*\*, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3.

Rnds 7-17: Rep rnd 6.

**Rnd 18:** Ch 1, sc in first st, \*sk next 2 sts, sc in each of next 5 sts, (sc, ch 1, sc) in next ch-1 sp\*\*, sc in each of next 5 sts, rep from \* around, ending last rep at \*\*, sc in each of last 4 sts, join in first sc. Fasten off. **C**!

### 023456 EASY

#### FINISHED MEASUREMENTS

5 x 75 inches

#### MATERIALS

- Red Heart Boutique Treasure medium (worsted) weight acrylic/ wool yarn (3½ oz/151 yds/100g per skein): 2 skeins #1901 mosaic
- Size H/8/5mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Yarn needle
- Stitch marker

#### GAUGE

Rows 1-5 = 2 inches

#### PATTERN NOTES

Weave in loose ends as work progresses.

Chain-5 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet and chain-2 unless otherwise stated.



Chain-6 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet and chain-3 unless otherwise stated.

#### SCARF

**Row 1:** Ch 19, sc in 2nd ch from hook, [ch 5, sk each of next 4 chs, sc in each of next 2 chs] twice, ch 5, sk each of next 4 chs, sc in last ch, turn. (6 sc, 3 ch-5 sps)

**Row 2: Ch 5** (see Pattern Notes), [sc in next ch-5 sp, ch 2, dc in each of next 2 sc, ch 2] twice, sc in next ch-5 sp, ch 2, dc in next sc, turn. (6 dc, 3 sc, 6 ch-2 sps)

**Row 3: Ch 6** (see Pattern Notes), [sl st in sc, ch 3, dc in each of next 2 dc, ch 3] twice, sl st in next sc, ch 3, dc in 3rd ch of ch-5, turn.

**Row 4:** Ch 1, sc in same st as beg ch-1 dc, [ch 4, sk sl st, sc in each of next 2 dc] twice, ch 4, sk sl st, sc in 3rd ch of beg ch-6 ch, turn.

**Row 5:** Ch 1, sc in first sc, [ch 5, sc in each of next 2 sc] twice, ch 5, sc in last sc, turn.

[Rep rows 2–5 consecutively] until Scarf measures 75 inches, ending with row 4. Fasten off. **C**!

To make a size different from those listed in the instructions, try working fewer number side rows and fewer number sole rows for a shorter size, or add more side rows and more sole rows for a larger size.

If you want a narrower sole, try working fewer stitches; for a wider sole, try adding a couple stitches, remembering to center the sole stitches onto the slipper side when making any adjustments.



**Sole:** 3 inches wide x 5 inches long *(small)* [3 inches wide x 5½ inches long *(medium)*, 3 inches wide x 6 inches long *(large)*], before assembly

#### MATERIALS



- Size J/10/6mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Bamboo marking pins from Clover

#### GAUGE

4 sc = 1 inch; 4 rows = 1 inch

#### **PATTERN NOTES**

Work stitches in back loops unless otherwise stated.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

#### SLIPPERS Side

Make 2.

**Row 1 (RS):** Ch 11, working in **back lps** (see Stitch Guide and Pattern Notes), 2 sc in 2nd ch from hook, sc in each of next 7 chs, **sc dec** (see Stitch Guide) in last 2 chs, turn. (10 sts)

**Row 2:** Ch 1, sc in each st across to last st, 2 sc in last st, turn. *(11 sts)* 

**Row 3:** Ch 1, 2 sc in first st, sc in each rem st across, turn. (*12 sts*)

**Rows 4–49 [4–53, 4–57]:** Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.

**Row 50 [54, 58]:** Ch 1, sc in each of next 10 sts, sc dec in last 2 sts, turn. *(11 sts)* 

**Row 51 [55, 59]:** Ch 1, sc dec in first 2 sts, sc in each of next 9 sts, turn. (*10 sc*)

**Row 52 [56, 60]:** Ch 1, 2 sc in first st, sc in each of next 7 sts, sc dec in last 2 sts, turn.

#### Sole Make 2.

**Row 1:** With RS of Side facing and curve at top edge, sk first 20 [22, 24] rows from beg ch, **join** (*see Pattern Notes*) in end of next row, ch 1, sc in same sp, sc in end of each of next 11 rows (*heel*), turn. (*12 sts*)

**Rows 2–19 [2–21, 2–23]:** Ch 1, sc in each st across, turn.

Row 20 [22, 24]: Ch 1, sc dec in first 2 sts, sc in each st across to last 2 sts, sc dec in last 2 sts, (*toe*). Fasten off. (*10 sts*)

#### Assembly First Slipper


With RS facing and referring to Assembly Diagrams, fold left edge (A) of Side to toe (B) of Sole matching corner 1 to corner 2 and aligning side A with side B and side C with side D (see Assembly Diagram 2). Pin edges tog with marking pins. Join in **front lp** (see Stitch Guide) of first st at heel, ch 1, working through both thicknesses, (sl st, ch 1) evenly sp across side C/D to toe, do not fasten off. Fold right edge (E) of Side to toe (B) of Sole matching corner 3 to corner 4 and aligning side E with side B and side F with side G. Pin edges tog with marking pins. Working through 3 thicknesses, (sl st, ch 1) in each st across toe (side A/B/E), turn piece to work along side F/G, working through both thicknesses, (sl st, ch 1) across side F/G to heel. Fasten off.

#### 2nd Slipper

With RS facing and referring to Assembly Diagrams, fold right edge (E) of Side to toe (B) of Sole matching corner 3 to corner 4 and aligning side E with side B and side F with side G. Pin edges tog with marking pins. Join in front lp of first st at heel, ch 1, working through both thicknesses, (sl st, ch 1) evenly sp across side F/G to toe, do not fasten off. Fold left edge (A) of Side to toe (B) of Sole matching corner 1 to corner 2 and aligning side A with side B and side C with side D. Pin edges tog with marking pins. Working through 3 thicknesses, (sl st, ch 1) in each st across toe (side E/B/A), turn piece to work along side C/D, working through both thicknesses, (sl st, ch 1) across side C/D to heel. Fasten off.

#### Edging

Turn Slipper RS out, join first row end at toe seam, ch 1, sc evenly around entire upper edge, fasten off. Rep for 2nd Slipper. **C!**

**Row 2:** \*Sk next st, dc in next st, working in front of st just made, **fpdc** (*see Stitch Guide*) in sk st, hdc in each of next 2 sts, sk next st, fpdc in next st, working behind st just made, dc in sk st, rep from \* twice.

**Row 3:** \*Hdc in next st, bpdc in next st, hdc in each of next 2 sts, bpdc in next st, hdc in next st, rep from \* twice.

**Row 4:** \*Hdc in next st, sk next 3 sts, fpdc in next st, working behind st just made, hdc in each of 2nd and 3rd sk sts, working in front of 3 sts just made, fpdc in first sk st, hdc in next st, rep from \* twice.

Row 5: Rep row 3.

**Row 6:** \*Sk next st, fpdc in next st, working behind st just made, dc in sk st, hdc in each of next 2 sts, sk next st, dc in next st, working in front of st just made, fpdc in sk st, rep from \* twice.

Row 7: Rep row 1.

**Row 8:** \*Fpdc in next st, hdc in each of next 4 sts, fpdc in next st, rep from \* twice.

**Rows 9–23:** [Rep rows 1–8 consecutively] once, then [rep rows 1–7 consecutively] once.

**Row 24:** Fpdc in next st, hdc in each of next 4 sts, fpdc in next st.

(72

**Row 25:** Bpdc in next st, hdc in next 4 sts, bpdc in next st.

**Row 26:** Sk next st, dc in next st, working in front of st just made, fpdc in sk st, hdc in each of next 2 sts, sk next st, fpdc in next st, working behind st just made, dc in sk st.

**Row 27:** Hdc in next st, bpdc in next st, hdc in each of next 2 sts, bpdc in next st, hdc in next st.

**Row 28:** Hdc in next st, sk next 3 sts, fpdc in next st, working behind st just made, hdc in 2nd and 3rd sk sts, working in front of 3 sts just made, fpdc in first sk st, hdc in next st.

Row 29: Rep row 27.

**Row 30:** Sk next st, fpdc in next st, working behind st just made, dc in sk st, hdc in each of next 2 sts, sk next st, dc in next st, working in front of st just made, fpdc in sk st.

Row 31: Rep row 25.

**Row 32:** Fpdc in next st, hdc in each of next 4 sts, fpdc in next st.

Rep rows 25–32 the number of times indicated.

## DRESS

#### Skirt

With bashful, ch 112 [124, 140, 156], **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) in first ch being careful not to twist ch.

**Set-up row (RS): Ch 2** (see Pattern Notes), dc in first ch, dc in each rem ch, join in first dc, turn. (112 [124, 140, 156] dc)

Place st markers in chs 28 [31, 35, 39], 56 [62, 70, 78], 84 [93, 105, 117] and 112 [124, 140, 156]. Move each marker up as each rnd is worked.

**Rnd 1:** Ch 2, **hdc dec** (see Stitch Guide) in first 2 sts, \*hdc in each st to next marker, hdc dec in next 2 sts, rep from \* 3 times, hdc to last 18 sts, work row 1 of **Cable Panel** (see Stitch Pattern), join in first st, turn. (108 [120, 136, 152] sts)

**Rnd 2:** Ch 2, work next row of Cable Panel, hdc in each rem st, join in first st, turn.

**Rnd 3:** Ch 2, hdc dec in first 2 sts, \*hdc in each st to next marker, hdc dec, rep from \*





3 times, hdc to last 18 sts, work next row of Cable Panel, join in first st, turn. (104 [116, 132, 148] sts)

**Rnds 4–12:** Rep rnds 2 and 3 alternately, ending with rnd 2. (88 [100, 116, 132] sts)

**Rnd 13:** Ch 2, hdc to last 18 sts, work next row of Cable Panel, join in first st, turn.

**Rnd 14:** Rep rnd 2.

Rnd 15: Rep rnd 3. (84 [96, 112, 128] sts)

Rnd 16: Rep rnd 2.

Rnd 17: Rep rnd 13.

Rnd 18: Rep rnd 2.

**Rnds 19–22:** Rep rnds 15–18 consecutively. (80 [92, 108, 124) sts)

**Rnd 23:** Rep rnd 3. (*76 [88, 104, 120) sts*)

**Rnd 24:** Ch 2, hdc in first 6 sts, work next row of Cable Panel, hdc in each rem st, join in first st, turn.

**Rnd 25:** Ch 2, hdc to last 12 sts, work next row of Cable Panel, hdc in each rem st, join in first st, turn.

#### Rnd 26: Rep rnd 24.

**Rnd 27:** Ch 2, hdc dec in first 2 sts, \*hdc in each st to next marker, hdc dec, rep from \* 3 times, hdc to last 12 sts, work next row of Cable Panel in next 6 sts, hdc in each rem st, join in first st, turn. (72 [84, 100, 116] sts)

Rnds 28 & 29: Rep rnds 24 and 25.

Rnd 30: Rep rnd 24.

Sizes 2, 4 & 6 Only Rnd [31]: Rep rnd 27.

Rnd [32]: Rep rnd 24.

Rnd [33]: Rep rnd 25.

Rnd [34]: Rep rnd 24. ([80, 96, 112] sts)

Sizes 4 & 6 Only Rnds [35–42, 35–50]: Rep rnds 31–34 consecutively. ([88, 96] sts)

All Sizes Remove markers.

Row 31 [35, 43, 51]: Rep rnd 13.

Sizes 2, 4 & 6 Only Row [36, 44, 52]: Rep rnd 2.

Row [37, 45, 53]: Rep rnd 13.

#### **Shape Front Armholes**

**Row 1 (RS):** SI st in each of first 2 [2, 3, 3] sts, (sI st, ch 2, hdc) in next st, hdc in next 3 [3, 2, 2] sts, work next row of Cable Panel, hdc in next 22 [26, 29, 33] sts, turn, leaving rem sts unworked. (*32 [36, 38, 42] sts*)

**Row 2:** Ch 2, hdc dec in first 2 sts, hdc to last 10 [10, 9, 9] sts, work next row of Cable Panel, hdc in next 2 [2, 1, 1] st(s), hdc dec, turn. (*30* [*34*, *36*, *40*] *sts*)

Size 12 Months Only Row 3: Ch 2, hdc in first 3 sts, work next row of Cable Panel, hdc in each rem st, turn.

**Sizes 2, 4 & 6 Only Row [3]:** Ch 2, hdc dec in first 2 sts, hdc in [1, 0, 0] st(s), work next row of Cable Panel, hdc in next [23, 26, 30] sts, hdc dec in next 2 sts, turn. *([32, 34, 38] sts)* 

#### All Sizes

**Row 4:** Ch 2, hdc to last 9 [8, 7, 7] sts, work next row of Cable Panel, hdc in rem sts, turn.

**Row 5:** Ch 2, hdc in first 3 [2, 1, 1] st(s), work next row of Cable Panel, hdc in each rem st, turn.

Row 6: Rep row 4.

#### **Front Left Shoulder**

**Row 1(RS):** Ch 2, hdc in first 3 [2, 1, 1] st(s), work next row of Cable Panel, hdc in each of next 0 [1, 3, 3] st(s), turn, leaving rem sts unworked. (*9* [*9*, 10, 10] sts)

**Row 2:** Ch 2, hdc in 0 [1, 3, 3] st(s), work next row of Cable Panel, hdc in each rem st, turn.

**Rows 3–4 [3–4, 3–6, 3–6, 3–8):** [Rep rows 1 and 2 alternately] 1 [1, 2, 2, 3] time(s). Fasten off.

#### Front Right Shoulder

**Row 1:** With RS facing, sk 12 [14, 14, 18] sts across last row of Front bodice, join in next st, ch 2, hdc in same st as join, hdc in each rem st, turn. (9 [9, 10, 10] sts)

**Rows 2–4 [2–6, 2–6, 2–8]:** Ch 2, hdc in each st, turn. Fasten off.

#### **Shape Back Armholes**

**Row 1 (RS):** With RS facing, sk 4 [4, 6, 6] sts on last row of Skirt from where first st of Front Armholes is worked, join in next st, ch 2, hdc in same st as join, hdc in next 31 [35, 37, 41] sts, turn, leaving rem sts unworked. (32 [36, 38, 42] sts)

**Row 2:** Ch 2, hdc dec in first 2 sts, hdc to last 2 sts, hdc dec in last 2 sts, turn. (*30 [34, 36, 40] sts*)

Sizes 2, 4 & 6 Only Row [3]: Rep row 2.

**Rows [4 & 5, 4 & 5, 4–7]:** Ch 2, hdc in each st, turn.

#### **Back Left Shoulder**

**Row 1 (WS):** Ch 2, hdc in first 15 [16, 17, 18] sts, turn, leaving rem sts unworked. *(15 [16, 17, 19] sts)* 

**Rows 2–7 [2–9, 2–9, 2–11]:** Ch 2, hdc in each st, turn.

**Row 8 [10, 10, 12]:** Sl st in first 6 [7, 7, 9] sts, (sl st, ch 2, hdc) in next st, hdc in each rem st, turn. (*9 [9, 10, 10] sts*)

Rows 9 & 10 [11 & 12, 11 & 12, 13 & 14]: Ch 2, hdc in each hdc, turn. Fasten off.

## **Back Right Shoulder**

**Row 1 (WS):** Join in first unworked st on Back next to beg of Left Shoulder, ch 2, hdc in same st, hdc in each rem st, turn. (15 [16, 17, 19] sts)

**Rows 2–6 [2–8, 2–8, 2–10]:** Ch 2, hdc in each st, turn.

**Row 7 [9, 9, 11]:** Ch 3 (*button lp made*), hdc in each st across, turn.

**Row 8 [10, 10, 12]:** Ch 2, hdc in each of first 9 [9, 10, 10] sts, turn, leaving rem sts unworked. (*9 [9, 10, 10] sts*)

**Rows 9 & 10 [11 & 12, 11 & 12, 13 & 14]:** Ch 2, hdc in each hdc across, turn. Fasten off.

## Assembly

With WS facing, working through both layers, sl st in each st across Shoulders to seam.

## **Bottom Edging**

**Rnd 1:** With lily and with RS facing, working in sts on opposite side of foundation ch, join

in first st, ch 1, sc in same st, sc in each st around, join in first sc, do not turn. (112 [124, 140, 156] sc)

**Rnd 2:** Ch 1, (sc, ch 1) in each st around, join in first st.

**Rnd 3:** (Sl st, ch 1, sc, ch 2) in first ch sp, (sc, ch 2) in each ch sp around, join in first sc.

**Rnd 4:** (Sl st, ch 1, sc, ch 3) in first ch sp, (sc, ch 3) in each ch sp around, join in first sc. Fasten off.

#### Armhole Edging Work around each Armhole.

**Rnd 1:** With bashful and with RS facing, join in center of bottom Armhole, ch 1, sc in same st, sc evenly around Armhole, join in first sc. Fasten off.

## **Neckline Edging**

**Rnd 1:** With bashful and RS facing, join in left side of bottom keyhole opening, ch 1, sc in same st, sc evenly sp across to next corner, 3 sc in corner, \*sc evenly sp to 1 st before next corner, sc dec in next 3 sts, rep from \* 3 times, sc evenly sp across to button lp, 4 sc in button lp, sc evenly sp to bottom of keyhole opening, 3 sc along bottom of keyhole opening, join in first sc. Fasten off.

## Tie

**Row 1:** With bashful, ch 10, hdc in 3rd ch from hook, hdc in each of rem chs, turn. *(8 sts)* 

Rows 2 & 3: Ch 2, hdc in each st, turn.

**Row 4:** Ch 2, hdc in each of first 3 sts, ch 2, sk 2 sts, hdc in each of last 3 sts, turn. *(6 hdc, 1 ch sp)* 

**Row 5:** Ch 2, hdc in each of first 3 hdc, 2 hdc in ch sp, hdc in each of last 3 sts, turn. (8 hdc)


Rows 6 & 7: Ch 2, hdc across, turn.

Rep rows 4–7 until Tie measures 59 [62, 68, 73] inches.

## Finishing

Fold Tie in half to locate middle. Center the fold of Tie under back edge of Right Armhole, ¼ inch below Armhole. With bashful and tapestry needle, sew in place. Using sewing thread and needle, attach button to top left edge of keyhole opening, opposite button lp. Weave in all ends. **C**!





- to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle

**GAUGE** 6 pattern rows = 3½ inches

#### **PATTERN NOTES**

Rug is intended to be used on carpeted floors only unless a nonskid backing is applied to back of Rug. Switching between skeins of yarn while working will help give more variation in color pattern.

All Motifs begin at centermost point of Motif being worked onto unless otherwise stated.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

Chain-3 at beginning of row or round counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.



**Row 4:** 2 sc in first st, sc in each of next 2 sts, [2 sc in next st, sc in each of next 2 sts] across, sk next 3 sts on indicated Motif, sl st in next st, turn. (*32 sc*) **Row 5:** Ch 3, dc in same st as beg ch-3, dc in each of next 3 sts, [2 dc in next st, dc in each of next 3 sts] across, sk next 3 sts on indicated Motif, sl st in next st, turn. (40 dc)

**Row 6:** 2 sc in first st, sc in each of next 4 sts, [2 sc in next st, sc in each of next 4 sts] across, sk next 3 sts on indicated Motif, sl st in next st, turn. Fasten off. *(48 sc)* 

## Motif 3

**Row 1:** Join to center point between 2 adjoining Motifs, ch 3, 2 dc in same st as beg ch-3, sk next 3 sts, sl st in next st, turn. (*3 dc*)

**Row 2:** 2 sc in first st and in each st across, sk next 3 sts on adjoining Motif, sl st in next st, turn. *(6 sc)* 

**Row 3:** Ch 3, dc in same st as beg ch-3, dc in next st, [2 dc in next st, dc in next st] across, sk next 3 sts on adjoining Motif, sl st in next st, turn. (9 dc)

**Row 4:** 2 sc in first st, sc in each of next 2 sts, [2 sc in next st, sc in each of next 2 sts] across, sk next 3 sts on adjoining Motif, sl st in next st, turn. (*12 sc*)

**Row 5:** Ch 3, dc in same st as beg ch-3, dc in each of next 3 sts, [2 dc in next st, dc in each of next 3 sts] across, sk next 3 sts on adjoining Motif, sl st in next st, turn. (*15 dc*)

**Row 6:** 2 sc in first st, sc in each of next 4 sts, [2 sc in next st, sc in each of next 4 sts] across, sk next 3 sts on adjoining Motif, sl st in next st, turn. Fasten off. *(18 sc)* 

## Motif 4

**Row 1:** Join to center of last row of indicated Motif (9th st), ch 3, 7 dc in same st as beg ch-3, sk next 3 sts on adjoining Motif, sl st in next st, turn. (8 dc)

**Row 2:** 2 sc in next st, 2 sc in each st across, sk next 3 sts on adjoining Motif, sl st in next st, turn. (*16 sc*)

**Row 3:** Ch 3, dc in same st as beg ch-3, dc in next st, [2 dc in next st, dc in next st] around,

sk next 3 sts on adjoining Motif, sl st in next st, turn. (24 dc)

**Row 4:** 2 sc in first st, sc in each of next 2 sts, [2 sc in next st, sc in each of next 2 sts] across, sk next 3 sts on adjoining Motif, sl st in next st, turn. (*32 sc*)

**Row 5:** Ch 3, dc in same st as beg ch-3, dc in each of next 3 sts, [2 dc in next st, dc in each of next 3 sts] across, sk next 3 sts on adjoining Motif, sl st in next st, turn. (40 dc)

**Row 6:** 2 sc in first st, sc in each of next 4 sts, [2 sc in next st, sc in each of next 4 sts] across, sk next 3 sts on adjoining Motif, sl st in next st, turn. *(48 sc)* 

**Row 7:** Ch 3, dc in same st as beg ch-3, dc in each of next 5 sts, [2 dc in next st, dc in each of next 5 sts] across, sk next 3 sts on adjoining Motif, sl st in next st, turn. (*56 dc*)

**Row 8:** 2 sc in first st, sc in each of next 6 sts, [2 sc in next st, sc in each of next 6 sts] across, sk next 3 sts on adjoining Motif, sl st in next st, turn. Fasten off. (64 sc)

## Motif 5

**Row 1:** Join to 12th st from edge on indicated Motif, ch 3, 7 dc in same ch, sk next 3 sts on adjoining Motif, sl st in next st, turn. *(8 dc)* 

Rows 2–6: Rep rows 2–6 of Motif 2.

## Motif 6

**Row 1:** Join in 24th st from edge on indicated Motif, ch 3, 7 dc in same ch as beg ch-3, sk next 3 sts on adjoining Motif, sl st in next st, turn. (*8 dc*)

Rows 2–6: Rep rows 2–6 of Motif 2.

## Motif 7

**Row 1:** Join in 36th st from edge on indicated Motif, ch 3, 7 dc in same ch as beg ch-3, sk next 3 sts on adjoining Motif, sl st in next st, turn. (*8 dc*)

Rows 2–6: Rep rows 2–6 of Motif 2. C!



When working extended front post double crochets, you will be working around stitches 2 rows below, skipping stitches on this row behind front post stitches unless otherwise stated.

Chain-2 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

#### SPECIAL STITCHES

**Extended front post double crochet (ext fpdc):** Yo, insert hook around post of st in row below, yo, pull lp through st (*3 lps on hook*), yo, pull through 1 lp on hook, [yo, pull through 2 lps on hook] twice.

Small cable (sm cable): Sk next st 2 rows below, ext fpdc around next st 2 rows below, ext fpdc (see Special Stitches) around st just sk, sk sts on this row behind sm cable.

#### BLANKET

**Row 1 (WS):** Ch 100, hdc in 3rd ch from hook (*first 2 chs count as first hdc*), hdc in each ch across, turn. (*99 hdc*)

Row 2 (RS): Ch 2 (see Pattern Notes), sm cable (see Special Stitches) around sts on last row, [sc in next st, sm cable around sts on last row] across, ending with sc in last st, turn. (33 sm cables)

**Row 3:** Ch 2, hdc in each st across, turn.

**Row 4:** Ch 2, [sk ext fpdc 2 rows below, **fpdc** (see Stitch Guide) around next ext fpdc, fpdc around ext fpdc just sk, sk sts on this row behind fpdc, sc in next st] across, sc in last st, turn.

Row 5: Ch 2, hdc in each st across, turn.

**Rows 6–9:** [Rep rows 4 and 5 alternately] twice.

**Row 10:** Ch 2, ext fpdc around each of next 2 sts, sc in next st, [sk next 2 ext fpdc, ext fpdc around sc 2 rows below, ext fpdc around next ext fpdc, ext fpdc around each of 2 sk sts 2 rows below, sk next ext fpdc and next sc 2 rows below, ext fpdc around each of next 2 ext fpdc, working behind last 2 ext fpdc, ext fpdc around each of last 2 sk sts 2 rows below, sc in next st, ext fpdc around each of next 2 sts, sc in next st] across, sc in last st, turn. (*8 cables*)

Row 11: Ch 2, hdc in each st across, turn.

**Row 12:** Ch 2, ext fpdc around each of next 2 ext fpdc, sc in next st, [ext fpdc around each of next 8 ext fpdc, sc in next st, ext fpdc around each of next 2 ext fpdc, sc in next st] across, sc in last st, turn.

Row 13: Ch 2, hdc in each st across, turn.

Row 14: Ch 2, ext fpdc around each of next 2 sts, sc in next st, [sk next 2 ext fpdc, ext fpdc around next sc 2 rows below, ext fpdc around next ext fpdc, working over last 2 ext fpdc, ext fpdc around each of sk 2 sts, sk next ext fpdc and next sc 2 rows below, ext fpdc around each of next ext fpdc, working behind last 2 ext fpdc, ext fpdc around each of last 2 sk sts, sc in next st, ext fpdc around each of next 2 ext fpdc, sc in next st] across, sc in last st, turn.

**Rows 15–130:** [Rep rows 11–14 consecutively] 29 times. Row 131: Ch 2, [sm cable, sc in next st] across, sc in last st, turn.

Row 132: Ch 2, hdc in each st across, turn.

**Rows 133–137:** [Rep rows 131 and 132 alternately] 3 times, ending last rep with row 131. At end of last row, fasten off.

#### Side Border

**Row 1 (WS):** With WS facing and working down side edge in ends of rows, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) in end of first row, ch 2, evenly sp 141 hdc across, turn. (*142 hdc*)

**Row 2 (RS):** Ch 2, [sm cable around sts of last row, sc in next st] across, sc in last st, turn.

Row 3: Ch 2, hdc in each st across, turn.

**Row 4:** Ch 2, [sm cable, sc in next st] across, sc in last st, turn.

Row 5: Ch 2, hdc in each st across, turn.

**Rows 6–9:** [Rep rows 4 and 5 alternately] twice. At end of last row, fasten off. Rep on rem side.

#### Finishing

Block lightly if desired. C!

  - 2 skeins each #885 delft blue and #624 tea leaf
  - 1 skein each #886 blue, #360 café latte, #324 bright yellow and #336 warm brown
- Red Heart Light & Lofty super bulky (super chunky) weight acrylic yarn (6 oz/140 yds/170g per skein): 1 skein #9376 wine
- Size J/10/6mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle

#### GAUGE

7 sts = 2 inches; first 6 rows = 2 inches

#### **PATTERN NOTES**

Row 1 is right side of work.

Row 2 is beginning of established pattern stitch repeated throughout.

Work from bottom to top.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

## AFGHAN

4 🔊

**Row 1:** With blue, ch 152, working in **back bar of ch** (*see illustration*), sc in 2nd ch from hook, [ch 1, sk next ch, sc in next ch] 3 times, \*[ch 2, sk next 2 chs, sc in next ch] twice, [ch 1, sk next ch, sc in next ch] 3 times, rep from \* across, turn.

Back Bar of Chain

**Row 2:** Ch 1, sc in first st, [ch 1, sk next ch sp, sc in next sc] 3 times, \*[ch 2, sk next ch sp, sc in next sc] twice, [ch 1, sk next ch sp, sc in next ch sp] across, turn.

**Rows 3–6:** Rep row 2 for pattern. At end of last row, fasten off.

**Row 7:** Join café latte with sc in first st, work in pattern across, turn.

Rows 8–10: Rep row 2. At end of last row, fasten off.

Row 11: With bright yellow, rep row 7.

Row 12: Rep row 2. Fasten off.

Row 13: With delft blue, rep row 7.

Rows 14–20: Rep row 2. At end of last row, fasten off.

Row 21: With tea leaf, rep row 7.

Row 22: Rep row 2. Fasten off.

Row 23: With warm brown, rep row 7.

**Rows 24–26:** Rep row 2. At end of last row, fasten off.

Row 27: With blue, rep row 7.

**Next rows:** Continuing in pattern st, rep rows 2–27 consecutively 6 times, then work rows 2–20 for total of 202 rows.

#### Weaving

Cut 24 lengths each 68 inches long of wine and 48 strands tea leaf each 68 inches long.

Leaving 1½-inch ends at beg and end of each row where there are ch-2 sps between sts, loosely weave wine over and under chs on each side of sts from top to bottom and with 2 strands of tea leaf held tog weave under and over chs to right and left side to side of wine.

#### Border

**Rnd 1:** With tea leaf, join with sc in end of row 12 at bottom right edge, which should be in end of 2nd row of yellow, \*[ch 1, sk next row, sc in end of next row] across, ending with ch 1, sk last row\*, (sc, ch 2, sc) in top right corner *(corner)*, work in pattern across sts, ending with ch 1, sk last ch sp, (sc, ch 2, sc) in top left corner *(corner)*, rep from \* across rem side, (sc, ch 2, sc) in bottom left corner ch *(corner)*, working in starting ch on opposite side of row 1, work in pattern across, ending



**Rnd 2:** Working in **back bar** (see illustration) of each st around, pull up lp in any st on rnd 1, ch 1, sc in each st around, **join** (see Pattern Notes) in first sc.

**Rnd 3:** Ch 2, sk first 2 sts, (sc, ch 7, sc) in next st, [ch 2, sk next 2 sts, (sc, ch 9, sc) in next st] twice, ch 2, sk next 2 sts, (sc, ch 7, sc) in next st. (4 ch-2 sps, 2 ch-7 lps, 2 ch-9 lps)





Fasten off. (32 dc, 4 ch-3 sps, 40 sc)

#### **PATTERN NOTES**

Chain-3 at beginning of round counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

Slip stitches at beginning of round are used to advance the work to the center of the first chain-10 loop and do not count as stitches.



## SPECIAL STITCHES

**Beginning cluster (beg cl): Ch 3** (see Pattern Notes), holding back last lp of each st on hook, 2 dc in same place as beg ch-3, yo, pull through all lps on hook.

**Cluster (cl):** Holding back last lp of each st on hook, 3 dc as indicated in instructions, yo, pull through all lps on hook.

#### **EMBLEM SQUARE**

**Rnd 1:** With jam, ch 8, sl st in first ch to form ring, **beg cl** (*see Special Stitches*) in ring, [(ch 2, cl—*see Special Stitches*) in ring] 7 times, ch 2, **join** (*see Pattern Notes*) in top of beg cl. (8 *cls*, 8 *ch*-2 *sps*)

**Rnd 2:** Ch 1, (sc, ch 10, sc) in first cl, [sc in next ch-2 sp, (sc, ch 5, sc) in next cl, sc in next ch-2 sp, (sc, ch 10, sc) in next ch-2 sp] 3 times, sc in next ch-2 sp, (sc, ch 5, sc) in next cl, sc in next ch-2 sp, join in first sc. (24 sc, 4 ch-10 lps, 4 ch-5 lps)

**Rnd 3: SI st** (*see Pattern Notes*) in next 4 chs, sl st in ch-10 lp, ch 1, [(sc, hdc, sc) in ch-10 lp, ch 3, 7 dc in next ch-5 lp, ch 3] 4 times, join in first sc. (8 sc, 4 hdc, 8 ch-3 sps, 28 dc)

**Row 2:** Ch 4, sk 1, \*dc in next ch sp, ch 1, rep from \* across, ending with dc in last st, turn.

**Row 3:** Ch 3, \*dc in next ch sp, ch 1, rep from \* across, ending with dc in last ch sp, dc in last st, turn.

Rep rows 2 and 3 until piece from 2nd Armhole measures  $15\frac{1}{2}$  [16,  $16\frac{1}{2}$ , 17,  $17\frac{1}{2}$ , 18] inches. Fasten off.

#### Sleeve Make 2.

**Row 1:** Ch 39 [39, 41, 41, 43, 43] loosely, dc in 4th ch from hook, dc in each of next ch across, turn. (*37 [37, 39, 39, 41, 41] dc*)

**Rows 2–4:** Ch 3, dc in each st across, turn.

**Row 5:** Ch 3, \*dc in next dc, ch 1, sk 1, rep from \* across, ending with 1 dc in last st, turn.

**Row 6:** Ch 3, dc in st at base of ch, ch 1, sk 1 st, \*dc in ch sp, ch 1, rep from \* across, ending with 2 dc in last st, turn. (*39* [*39*, *41*, *41*, *43*, *43*] *sts*)

**Row 7:** Ch 3, \*dc in next ch sp, ch 1, rep from \* across, ending with dc in last ch sp, dc in last st, turn.



**Rnd 4:** Ch 1, sc in same st, 3 sc in next hdc, sc in next sc, \*2 sc in next ch-3 sp, ch 3, sk next 3 dc, sc in next dc, ch 3, sk next 3 dc, 2 sc in next ch-3 sp\*\*, sc in next sc, 3 sc in next hdc, sc in next sc, rep from \* around, ending last rep at \*\*, join in first sc. (40 sc, 8 ch-3 sps)

**Rnd 5:** Ch 3, dc in next sc, \*3 dc in next sc, dc in each of next 4 sc, 3 dc in next ch-3 sp, dc in next sc, 3 dc in next ch-3 sp, dc in each of next 4 sc, rep from \* around, ending last rep with dc in each of last 3 sc, join in first dc. Fasten off. (72 dc) **C**!



Rows 8 & 9: Ch 3, dc in each st across, turn.

**Row 10:** Ch 3, \*dc in next dc, ch 1, sk 1, rep from \* across, ending with 1 dc in last st, turn.

**Row 11:** Ch 4, sk 1 st, \*dc in ch sp, ch 1, rep from \* across, ending with dc in last st, turn.

**Row 12:** Ch 3, \*dc in next ch sp, ch 1, rep from \* across, ending with dc in last ch sp, dc in last st, turn.

Rep rows 8–12 for pattern and **at same time** work **inc row** (*see Pattern Notes*) on row 13 and every 6th [5th, 5th, 4th, 4th, 3rd] row 5 [7, 7, 8, 9, 10] more times. (*51* [*55*, *57*, *59*, *63*, *65*] *sts after final inc row*)

**Last row:** Ch 3, work dc in each dc and ch sp across, turn.

Rep last row until Sleeve measures 1914 inches.

#### **Cap Shaping**

**Row 1:** SI st in first 4 sts, ch 3, continue in established pattern across to last 3 sts, turn, leaving rem sts unworked. (45 [49, 51, 53, 57, 59] sts)

**Rows 2 & 3:** SI st in first 3 sts, ch 3, work in pattern across to last 2 sts, turn, leaving rem sts unworked. (*37 [41, 43, 45, 49, 51] sts after row 3*)

**Row 4:** SI st in first 4 sts, ch 3, work in pattern across to last 3 sts, turn, leaving rem st unworked. Fasten off. (*31* [*35*, *37*, *39*, *43*, *45*] sts)

Sleeves should measure approximately 22 inches for all sizes.

### Collar

**Set-up row:** With RS facing, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) in upper corner of either Front, ch 3, evenly work 156 [164, 170, 184, 194, 202] dc across upper edges of Fronts and Back. (157 [165, 171, 185, 195, 203] dc)

**Row 1 (WS):** Ch 3, \*dc in next dc, ch 1, sk 1 st, rep from \* across to last 2 sts, ending with 1 dc in each of last 2 sts, turn.

**Row 2:** Ch 4, sk 1, \*dc in next ch sp, ch 1, rep from \* across, ending with dc in last st, turn.

**Row 3:** Ch 3, \*dc in next ch sp, ch 1, rep from \* across, ending with dc in last ch sp, dc in last st, turn.

Rep rows 2 and 3 until Collar measures 9 [9½, 10, 10, 10½, 11] inches, ending with WS row.

**Last row:** Ch 3, dc in each dc and ch sp across to last ch sp, 4 dc in last ch sp. Do not fasten off.

## Left Front Edging







**Row 2:** Work row 8 of **Front Lace Panel** (see Stitch Patterns).

Row 3: Work row 1 of Front Lace Panel.

**Rows 4–110 [4–114, 4–114, 4–118, 4–122, 4–122]:** Continue to work in Front Lace Panel. At end of last row, fasten off.

## 2nd Half

Row 2: Work row 8 of Front Lace Panel.

Row 3: Work row 1 of Front Lace Panel.

**Rows 4–110 [4–114, 4–114, 4–118, 4–122, 4–122]:** Continue to work in Front Lace Panel. At end of last row, fasten off.

## Side Panels Right Side

**Foundation row:** First foundation sc, 72 [84, 94, 106, 116, 128] next foundation sc, turn. (*73 [85, 95, 107, 117, 129] sc*)

**Rows 1–79 [1–77, 1–75, 1–73, 1–79, 1–77]:** Work in **Herringbone dc** (see Stitch Patterns).

## Armhole & Neckline Shaping Back Section

**Row 2:** Ch 1, dc in first st, **dc dec** (see Stitch Guide) in next 2 sts, work in established pattern across, turn. (*16* [21, 25, 31, 35, 41] sts)

**Row 3:** Ch 1, work in established pattern across to last 5 sts, [dc dec in next 2 sts] twice, dc in last st, turn. (*14* [*19*, *23*, *29*, *33*, *39*] *sts*)

**Row 2:** Ch 1, work in established pattern across to last 3 sts, dc dec in next 2 sts, dc in last st, turn. (*16 [21, 25, 31, 35, 42] sts*)

**Row 3:** Beg dc, [dc dec in next 2 sts] twice, work in established pattern across, turn. (*14* [*19*, *23*, *29*, *33*, *39*] sts)

#### Rows 4 & 5 [4-7, 4-7, 4-9, 4-9,

**4–9]:** [Rep last 2 rows alternately] 1 [2, 2, 3, 3, 3] time(s). (*11* [*13*, *17*, *20*, *24*, *30*] sts at end of last row)

**Row 6 [8, 8, 10, 10, 10]:** Rep row 2. (10 [12, 16, 19, 23, 29] sts)





Projects that utilize a wide variety of stitches and techniques such as those noted above, as well as detailed colorwork, shaping, construction and finishing.

**123456** CHALLENGING

Projects that require an intuitive understanding of a pattern or chart, and that also include advanced stitches and techniques, as well as intricate methods such as intarsia, cables, lace, stranded colorwork with numerous color changes, and advanced shaping and construction techniques.






